Ramblings From the Rectory

Dear Friends,
Lots of people like to start Good Friday with a breakfast of hot cross buns-delicious spicy buns, marked with a cross and served hot with butter. My taste buds are tingling at the thought of them! Street criers used to walk through the streets very early on Good Friday, selling freshly baked buns in baskets covered with a white clean cloth. They knocked on the doors or rang hand bells to rouse people to buy. They would loudly cry

*'One a penny buns, Two a penny buns,
If you have no daughters, Give them to your sons
One a penny, two a penny, Hot Cross buns!'*

Nowadays of course people eat them long before Good Friday. I think I saw my first hot cross bun the week after Christmas! But not long ago they were kept as a special symbol of Good Friday. But of course, like so many customs, hot cross buns originated long before Christianity.

The bun, in pagan times, represented the moon, and the cross divided it into four quarters. It is believed that buns marked with a cross were eaten by the Saxons in honour of the Goddess Eostre, from which some say we get the name Easter. For Christians the cross serves as a reminder of the crucifixion of Jesus and the first recorded use the word hot cross bun is in 1733.

There are many superstitions surrounding the hot cross buns. One of them says that buns baked and served upon Good Friday will not spoil or go mouldy during the subsequent year, though they never hang around enough in our house to test this! The buns, if shared with another are supposed to guarantee friendship throughout the coming year, especially if shared with the rhyme *'Half for you and half for me. Between us two, goodwill shall be'*.

For me the buns are a wonderful symbol of the cross, which unites us as Christians and reminds us that even in the darkest of situations there is the hope of the resurrection.

Have a Holy and joyful Easter.

Overton is one of the few areas still to enjoy having a police station within the village. I know it is not staffed 24 hours a day but most days you will find someone here. I can't argue against peoples' perception that the police are never seen, however I hope the following will give you an indication of our responsibilities and hopefully have an impact on your views.

What I can tell you is that along with me, you have two PCSO's based at Overton. We are also supported by members of the special constabulary. We also have response officers who patrol the area on a regular basis.

I think part of the perception problem is that people assume that we are solely the officers for Overton. We are not. We police an area which is known as Wrexham Maelor section. The population for this area is in the region of 8,000 residents. Other villages which form part of our patrol area include Cross Lanes, Bangor On Dee, Bronington, Penley, Hanmer, Worthenbury and Tallarn Green plus all the little hamlets in between.

OVERTON MEDICAL PRACTICE

We do have some rather sad news, Dr Bloom is leaving us, possibly at the end of this month, depending on when a new doctor is recruited. He is taking up a post on Anglesey and has already moved house as his wife has been working in that area for several months. The distance to travel makes it very difficult to continue at the Overton Practice and he will be missed by both patients and staff alike. We wish him and his family every happiness in their new home and for him in his new job.

Another medical student begins his work experience with us from March for a six week period. Paul Hanlon is in his final year at Cardiff so we are responsible for showing him what life as a rural GP is like, we hope he finds his time with us both enlightening and beneficial.

Test results are a very important part of surgery life, we know how anxious patients are to know what is happening. In 2009 we made and received over 70,000 calls. To ensure that we are able to give you the correct information without having to rush we ask that you do your very best to ring after 11am. This enables us to get over the initial morning volume of calls and surgeries are well underway. Please retain the slip you are given which states which tests you have had and then you have the knowledge to ask exactly which results you require and we have the time to talk to you properly with less interruptions from phones ringing waiting to be answered.

More and more medical work comes under the jurisdiction of 'Private non NHS'. We realise that this is part of modern life with Insurance Companies, Solicitors, Police and employers etc asking for medical information. Whilst the doctors accept this as part of their working life we have to charge for any work done by a GP which is not NHS. A doctor's signature is now £15.50, the very basic cost and we have a rising scale which covers all the other requirements. Some patients are very annoyed when told this but we are an NHS practice and not private like the Nuffield or Yale. Please ask what the charge for any particular work you might require is prior to confirming that you want it done, e.g. HGV medicals, Travel Claims and To Whom It May Concern letters and suchlike.



85 Years of WI in Our Village

As we celebrate another birthday of Overton WI, I tried to think what it must have been like back in March 1925 when Overton had it's first meeting. I hope to find out about its history over the coming months so watch this space! As coincidence has it, just like now, the late 1920s was a time of severe worldwide economic depression, known as the Great Depression. How Overton, with it's rural and farming life, was affected I do not know, but I'm sure some of you know much more than I do.

The WI was set up to provide an educational and social organisation for country women, giving them the opportunity of working and learning together to improve the quality of life in their community and to enable them to develop their own skills and talents. The aim is as valid today as it was then and has been extended to include women who have an interest in country matters but who do not necessarily live in the country.

It was Adelaide Hoodless in Ontario who first inspired the founding of the WI when her youngest child died at the age of 14 months caused by contaminated milk, it seems. When she spoke to a meeting of farmer's wives, campaigning for domestic science to be taught in schools, the women decided that if the men had a Farmer's Institute where they met together to listen to lectures which helped them to do their jobs better, then the wives should set up a Women's Institute where they could meet together and have their own educational programme.

Now of course, there are so many opportunities for women in all areas of life, but, I believe the learning and sharing of skills and ideas, new and old that take place in the WI still has a vital role in our community. Younger women with their vitality, enthusiasm and modern ideas can teach us new skills and new ways of doing things. Older women, with their wisdom, experience of life, and knowledge of traditional skills can inspire the younger women. The WI is a place where all ages, and all sorts of women can join together to pool their skills and become friends. This has happened in the past, lets hope we can keep it going well into the future.

Road Safety Campaign

You may be wondering what has been happening since the Public Meeting held on 6th October 2009? Members of the community decided to hold a Traffic Calming Meeting once a month to keep the impetus for change to the local speed limits ongoing. Members of the Community Council attend to offer advice to this working party.

To date, a petition has been organised (with approximately 420 signatories) and some of the working party filmed a DVD showing the problems on the A539 Wrexham to Whitchurch route. Council members devised a covering letter requesting a 40 mph buffer zone and these, with copies of the DVD, have been sent out and responses have already been received from some of the recipients.

During the Public Meeting held in October. A show of hands from the attendees implied that they would like to consider the purchase of a speed gun. This has been superceded by the following information from Wrexham South Police Authority: -

PC Evans has advised us that the area speed gun used for this neighbourhood is available at very short notice. The two PCSOs are now scheduled to use the equipment once a week for the foreseeable future and PC Evans will utilise the gun, but due to his high workload and the very large area that he has to cover, it will be approximately three times during the next two months and then this will be reviewed.

As many of you will be aware the Overton Community Council has been campaigning on our behalf for the best part of a decade. They have had some success i.e. chevron signs placed on some bends, white and red warning posts positioned in dangerous areas, new larger speed limit signs installed and the dragon's teeth warnings on the four main entrance/exit roads. With a change in the regulations recently passed by the Welsh Assembly Government we are optimistic that the time for change has come.

The dates for the next traffic calming meetings are Monday 19th April and Monday 17th May in the Parish Room at 7pm.

View from the Village Vets

It is often said that a week is a long time in politics and had I written this piece about proposed changes to the Dangerous Dogs Act last week, I would now be out of date. The Government has once again done a U turn on it's proposals.

Nevertheless, there are some good reasons to update and modify the Dangerous Dogs Act. The bill was introduced hastily in response to the introduction of the American Pit Bull Terrier into the UK and in many peoples view was poorly thought out. The definition of the dangerous breeds was so vague that a number of animals resided on 'death row' for many months whilst the courts argued as to whether they were on the banned list or not.

However, the death of a number of small children following attacks by pet pit bull terriers, the rise in the number of so called 'status dogs' used to intimidate and threaten people together with complaints from unions about the increase in attacks on delivery drivers and postmen and women has prompted a number of people to call for compulsory micro-chipping of dogs and compulsory third party insurance.

As with any piece of new legislation, the majority of law abiding citizens are always penalised in order to try to clamp down on the small number of people acting irresponsibly and the Dangerous Dogs Act is no exception. However, there are many good reasons to consider having your pet microchipped and it might also be worth checking the small print of your household insurance policy to see if you are covered if your pet runs out into the road and causes an accident or bites someone.

Last year we ran a discount microchipping month in June and we hope to do the same this year, so if you would like to make sure that you dog is permanently identified ask at the surgery.
