Watch out for our next fund raiser, it has a Royal connection!




WI Update

Return to Conducting

On April 1st, Overton resident, Polina Horelova, from Mariupol, will conduct two Ukrainian songs performed by new Sinfonia orchestra's community vocal ensemble, NEW Voices, as part of the "We Rise Together" concert which will be staged at St Giles Church, Wrexham on April 1st at 7.30pm.

Polina, her husband, Volodymyr, and their four children, Anhelina, 12, Oryna, 11, Liubomyr, 7, and Volodymyr, 3, found a safe haven in Overton thanks to their sponsors Edgar and Elizabeth Coward, to whom Polina says they will always be grateful. She still has family and friends in Ukraine including her brother, Daniel, who was injured when a Russian missile fragment pierced his leg. Polina's husband still returns regularly to Ukraine transporting and distributing vital aid packages to families who have lost their homes and livelihoods. His farm, including land and livestock, was destroyed in the Russian advance on Mariupol and the family's city apartment was annihilated by relentless bombing.

Polina's passion for music was rekindled after joining the ensemble which meets on Saturday mornings at Tŷ Pawb in Wrexham. Polina studied at Mariupol Music College, qualifying in conducting but until she joined the choir she had not sung or made music since escaping to the UK.

Polina said: "Music has always been at the heart of my family, but even before the war I had stopped working professionally after having children. It was difficult to raise a family and continue a career conducting. But after I was introduced to the community choir here it reignited my passion for music. It became a source of joy at a heartbreaking time for us." Polina will conduct the choir for two songs well known in Ukraine, one a traditional

prayer and the other is a dance tune hailing from the Carpathian mountains.

Elizabeth thanks the people of Overton and surrounding villages for all the aid donated to Volodymyr to take to Ukraine, and says she is still collecting aid.

Relieving the problem

Housing developments across Wrexham CBC have stalled following the introduction of new environmental targets and new planning applications have slowed to a trickle.

Last year Natural Resources Wales (NRW) published new targets to reduce river phosphate levels in special areas of conservation (SAC) across Wales, which includes the river Dee. It follows concerns about an increase in phosphate

concentrations – which can cause water pollution. Sewage is often seen as contributing to raised phosphate levels in rivers.

To reduce the quantity of sewage, residents are being encouraged to reinstate the tŷ bachs in their garden or build their own earth closet. If you would like to join the scheme please apply by April 1st to ugot2laff.com

Wrexham CBC Revenue Budget 2023/24

The Provisional Local Government Settlement was announced on 14 December 2022 and resulted in an increase in grant support of 8.4% for Wrexham compared to the average increase of 7.9% across Wales. This higher level of settlement is welcome but only recognises half of the pressures that councils are facing across Wales.

The proposals for next year recognise demand pressures in Social Care and inflationary cost increases including pay and energy for all Council Services including Schools. For example pay has increased by £9.7m next year and energy by £2.7m.

Extra investment has been provided for Highways Maintenance & Resurfacing plus Public Transport Bus services. In addition, an amount has been allocated for investment in Council Plan Priorities. The headline investments are as follows:

- £7m for Social Care
- £5.2m increase for schools
- £1m investment in Council Plan Priorities
- £1m additional for Highways Maintenance & Resurfacing
- £200k Public Transport Bus Services with a commitment for a further £200k
- £900k for other service pressures including:
 - £300k Homelessness £200k increased cost of temporary accommodation due to new legislation and £100k to Accommodation move on crisis (deliver secure "move on" accommodation to those who are owed a homeless duty)
 - £250k additional ICT capacity and resilience, including disaster recovery arrangements
 - £100k Leisure support to ensure sustainability of the remaining contract term

There are no service cuts proposed as part of the 2023/24 budget, though a level of service efficiencies of £300k have been included and are deemed deliverable. The proposals assume a 6% increase in Council Tax. It is proposed as a reasonable balance between ensuring we have a financially resilient Council and recognising the burden of increasing costs to local taxpayers. We have to remember that our level of Council Tax is starting from a lower position than the average in Wales. We know that future years are going to be more challenging and we must use this next year to plan to so that we can continue to deliver services in a financially sustainable way.

The Rainbow Foundation strives to connect older people with their local communities.

For people who live in rural communities, community transport services provide a lifeline, allowing a freedom and level of independence which would otherwise be out of reach. The Rainbow Foundation have been addressing this need for more than 27 years and today have a fleet of three minibuses which provide transport links to and from their Penley, Chirk and Marchwiel Care Hubs. The charity – who operates across South Wrexham – believe that there is more that can be done and are striving to connect even more people in rural communities with local services and attractions.



Volunteer Coordinator Rebecca Griffiths says: "the reality is that many older people who live in rural communities are becoming more and more isolated as public transport services continue to be cut. We are in a position now where even getting to their local supermarket has become a challenge for many people. Especially in the face of a continued cost of living crisis where calling a taxi to help them is no longer affordable."

This is why on Monday 20th March 2023, The Rainbow Foundation launched a new weekly transport service to Stans Superstore in St Martins. Leaving the Penley Rainbow Centre at 11:30am each Monday morning, the service will collect from the Cocoa Rooms in Overton at 11:45am before travelling on to Stans Superstore in St Martins. The service will leave Stans at 2pm, returning to the Rainbow Centre via the Cocoa Rooms. This gives anyone who would like to come along around 2 hours to shop or enjoy some lunch.


Rebecca believes there is more that needs to be done though. She says: "We are looking to extend our community transport service even further to include more trips to local services and attractions to enable people to not only meet their basic needs when it comes to accessing local services, but also provides a social and human connection to others. To do this though we need volunteers across South Wrexham to come forward if they have a few hours each month spare to help us support older people in our local communities."

At a time where rising prices have further limited the lives of the people living in our local communities, The Rainbow Foundation are working to bring people together to support one another. Have you noticed the amount of litter on all our road verges? We are litter pickers for Keep Wales Tidy in and round the Overton. We are shocked by the amount of



From 2020 to 2023 we have filled up over 1,000 red bags full of items thrown from vehicles. That works out on average 150,000 people have thrown a piece of litter in the Overton area, breaking the law by throwing litter from a car or dropping it in the street. We are seeing a total disregard for this law every day. We also now find lots of E cigarette vapour cases, they are everywhere - toxic waste.

We are asking, if you see the shocking amount of toxic litter along the road edges, please think that it takes one second to throw litter but it takes hours and a lot of effort to pick it up. Please let us respect where we and other people live. Make a difference today - take your litter home and put it in your free recycle bin provided by your council. The road side is not an open dustbin please don't treat it as such. Please write to your MP, or the Welsh Assembly, if you want to see more done to stop people from throwing litter from their vehicles. So much more could be done.
