# Musings from the Manse by Father Jeremy

One of the things I enjoy listening to is the Daily Service on Radio 4 at 9.45am; it gives me the opportunity to be inspired by faith stories as well as reflections on both current affairs and the liturgical seasons. I first discovered the broadcast when I was ordained in 1997; as the programme has been on Long Wave, a parishioner in Newcastle



kindly lent me her battery powered Roberts Radio when I had flu—I still listen on the same machine today! Long Wave is disappearing and over the last two months. there's been a recorded message at the end of the programme saying from April 2024, the Daily Service will be available on Radio 4 Extra—a digital station which can be accessed online. All good things come to an end and I've just hooked it up on my BBC Sounds app. Saying farewell to a long-established habit or routine can throw up challenges. The switching off of Enid's gift will mean I no longer remember her in the way I've done. The need to dispose of a still working radio is a reminder of our throw away consumer culture. Most importantly there are times when we have to listen to the forthcoming message of change and either adapt for the future or be left behind and lose out.

The Easter Season runs through April into May—when the world hears the triumphant trumpet of resurrection which creates a new future both making heaven on earth and calling us to that destination of eternal life with the risen Christ when we die. Jesus' Disciples could not initially comprehend what this meant and locked themselves away in fear of the future; they didn't believe that there could be a future without Jesus. When faced with change and loss, we can feel the same, when our rhythm or routine in life is altered or threatened by change. Like Mary Magdalene, we can often want to cling on to what we know and are used to. Jesus says to her "do not hold onto me" and calls us to look to the future to receive a new and better life (at Pentecost), that enables God to speak to us in our own language, time and place. It does mean we have to adapt and go forward in a new way; the Easter Season helps us to do that as we hear stories in the Acts of Apostles of how the first Christians developed and changed lives by tuning into a new 'frequency' or 'wave' that brought them to see the resurrection as the new way to lead them to eternal life. As someone who likes familiarity and stability, I wasn't initially taken with the idea of having to change how I will listen to God's word in the future. I'm not however going to get left behind though and have already seen the advantage of being able to listen to the Daily Service when I'm in my car, for example. May the Easter Season be a time when we *can* look forward and move forward. and rise up to the challenges which will bring us new life whether it's with the radio or our relationship with God. How we need that in our broken world today!

# **National Holidays in April**

Whilst we are all aware of the traditional holidays that occur in April, such as April Fools Day, there are a few more unusual ones that we perhaps should observe this year.

National Draw a Bird Day on April 8th has its origins in quite a wholesome event. In 1943 a seven year old British girl went to the hospital to visit her uncle who had lost a leg in the war. At his bedside she asked him to draw her a bird. Even though she found amusement in his limited drawing skills, she hung the picture in her bedroom. From then on, all the other soldiers in the hospital started drawing birds for her, hanging them all around the hospital. 3 years later she was tragically killed by a car and her coffin was filled with the soldiers' bird pictures. Ever since, her birthday on April 8th has been marked as National Draw a Bird Day where people are encouraged to draw a bird as a way of finding the joy in life's simple pleasures. National Tea Day on April 21st, where we can all sit down with our favourite cuppa and take a minute to enjoy a traditional English (or Welsh) beverage. Or possibly we should celebrate International Girls in ICT Day on April 25th (this day will always fall on the 4th Thursday of April). This day is a global initiative to encourage girls to pursue careers in technology, aiming to bridge the gender gap in this field. It highlights the importance of providing girls with the opportunities and skills necessary for a future in ICT. The significance of this observance extends beyond encouraging participation in ICT, it addresses broader issues such as access and safety in the digital world, advocates for equal digital learning opportunities, and challenges the negative stereotypes that deter girls from engaging in tech-related fields. Unfortunately none of these come with an extra bank holiday!

# **Highways Hell**

As we all know, the state of the roads locally and, in fact, nationally are a major disgrace. I had Council approval for sections of road to be totally resurfaced being the A528 section out of the village to the turning for Stan's and also the section past Queensbridge and over the small bridge, where the surface is now nearly non-existent. I also had approval for sections of Bangor Road near the bends, a short distance out of the village. After the first section from the village to the Stan's turning was completed, a hold was placed on further works as the Council had to find savings of £23m, resulting from a lack of overall Government funding. Believe me, these sections are still a priority when funds allow. The road from Queensbridge to Knolton is another major concern with constant flooding caused by water run-off from the fields. This is being investigated currently as a lack of attention to ditches seems to be the probable cause. It is worth noting that the Council do not own the ditches, they are the responsibility of the landowners.

As for the potholes....Over the winter it has just been a matter of filling as many as possible knowing that unfortunately many fills might not last long with the weather and they are likely to need redoing again.

This is just a general overview and if and when I hear further I will let you know, when hopefully this horrendous situation is likely to be rectified.

# **Back to Bowls**





# Bell ringing update

Have you ever wondered what we actually ring on a Sunday morning? It may sound like random bells but we mostly ring call changes (someone calls out the bells that are changing places) until we reach a combination such as 'Queens'. We start by ringing 'rounds', that's bells 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 in order. Bells 2 and 3 swap over, followed by bells 4 and 5 giving an order of 132546; then we swap bells 2 and 5 over giving 135246, the 'Queens' combination. We then reverse it all until we are back in rounds. Listen out next time and see if you can hear the 'Queens' combination.

We are delighted to report that on 2nd March the bellringers from St Mary's Overton, St Dunawad's Bangor on Dee and St Mary's Chirk won a national award! We were awarded ART (Association of Ringing Teachers) Band of Cluster of the year 2024 for the way the three towers work together and support each other. The award is open to any tower or cluster of towers that is focussed on improving ringing standards and developing sustainability of

ringing. They were looking for the band or cluster's commitment, drive and delivery over a period of years. Three ringers attended the award ceremony to accept the award for the cluster (see image). Most of you will not have the opportunity to climb to the top of the church tower and see the bells in action. It is for that reason a video was made to enable everyone who has access to a computer or smart phone to take a look. # St Mary's Pupils Out and About: Learning Beyond the Classroom

This term has seen all classes embark on a range of exciting adventures to bring our learning to life.

Reception, Year 1, and Year 2 took a step back in time to the olden days as part of their topic based on a fantastic book called 'Lost in the Toy Museum'. Our time travellers arrived in Blist's Hill Victorian Town and had a fantastic day experiencing life long ago. Children took part in a range of workshops, including candle making, and even braved the Victorian schoolroom! They exchanged money at the bank and were thrilled to learn there was a real-life sweet shop to spend their Victorian pennies. They had an amazing day.





Pupils in Years 3 and 4 had an exciting visit to the Nantclwyd Y Dre Historic House in Ruthin. They delved into Tudor history foraging and making Tudor herbal medicines, and explored Tudor food, laying the table for a Tudor feast. Children also learnt about Tudor gardens and had a go at making their own mini garden using flowers and herbs from the area. Finally, children were taught about Tudor pilgrimages and the essentials needed to walk and journey such a long way. A very interesting and exciting day was had by all!

Year 5 were thrilled to be invited to Bangor-on-Dee Racecourse supported by the Racing to School charity. Even though rainy weather sadly stopped the racing on the day of the

trip it didn't stop our wannabe jockeys from spending a day immersed in everything maths and horse-racing related!

It was access all areas; from seeing where the horses are kept, to the weigh-in room and changing room; there was plenty to keep the children busy. The class even got to wear their own silks for the day.



Meanwhile, Year 6 pupils were transported back in time to 1941, as they travelled to Stockport Air Raid Shelters dressed in role as WW2 evacuees. They explored the network of underground tunnels, which are the largest purpose-built civilian air raid shelters in the country, excavated into the sandstone beneath Stockport. Children were taught how to be 'good evacuees' and practised household chores, including using the dolly tub and mangle, and how to 'make do and mend'. They learnt about air raid precautions, practised putting on their gas masks and tried a Morrison Shelter out for size. Pupils even brought WW2-style packed lunches for a truly authentic touch—with




learning to life.
