# Bienvenue to our Twinning Friends from La Murette

It's finally here! The twinning week starts on Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> July, and 19 French visitors will be coming over and staying with various people in the village. The Scouts have kindly let us use the Scout Hut for the whole week, and this will be used as the main hub / meeting place for meeting each morning and some meals etc. We have 11 teenagers coming over this year, 12 years and older, and so we have a fun-packed, active week organised. Each day we will muster at the Scout Hut, and then go on to the planned activities via minibus / cars. Picnic lunches will be provided by the hosts for each day. The week's activities are as follows:

## 20mph speed limit through Overton

Legislation was approved on July 22 2022 by the Senedd, who gave these reasons why they wanted to introduce a 20mph speed limit on residential roads and busy streets in Wales.

Introducing a 20mph default speed limit on residential roads and busy pedestrian streets across Wales will:

- Save lives and reduce the risk and severity of injuries from collisions between vehicles & vulnerable road users.
- Make streets safer for playing, walking and cycling
- Encourage more people to make more sustainable travel choices
- Make Wales more attractive to our communities
- Bring physical and mental health benefits
- Reduce noise pollution, promote cleaner air and be better for the environment

Welsh government public health study estimates that the 20mph default speed limit could result in: 40% fewer collisions saving 6-10 lives and avoiding between 1200 and 2000 people being injured every year. This would save about £92m prevention in the first year alone.

Special exemptions can apply and Wrexham CBC are starting to publish details on DataMapWales, with more roads to possibly follow and I will keep you informed if any are in this ward.

Very basically - from September 17<sup>th</sup> ALL 30 mph roads in Wales will be defaulted automatically to 20mph and be signed accordingly. If there are exceptions being left at 30mph, they will likewise be signed. My general advice from September 17<sup>th</sup> is, if it was 30 mph it is now 20mph, unless signs tell you otherwise.




# Seeds from St Mary's

# **Art Exhibition, Bangor on Dee, 26**<sup>th</sup> **August** – **3**<sup>rd</sup> **September**

Following last year's tremendously successful art exhibition, Wrexham Art Group together with Malpas Fabric Art Group are holding their annual Art Exhibition once again at the beautiful and historic location of St. Dunawd's Church in Bangor on Dee.

Founded in the late 1940s by the students of Wrexham Art School, Wrexham Art Group continues to flourish and encourages amateur artists of all abilities to develop their artistic skills and to exhibit their work at local art exhibitions. Tutorials are held monthly during the Winter, followed by outdoor painting days during the Summer. Meeting at Bethel Chapel Hall in Garden Village, Wrexham, the artists enjoy their painting in a friendly and relaxed atmosphere.

Malpas Fabric Arts Group has been meeting on alternate Monday evenings for over 25 years. Techniques include patchwork and quilting, together with a wide variety of textile art such as machine embroidery and mixed media textile collage. Presentations by guest speakers relating their own artistic journeys are often given and very much enjoyed. The majority of members prefer to concentrate on patchwork and quilting but there are several who do like to experiment with various textile arts. Many examples of their beautiful and stunning work will be on display.

This year's joint art exhibition will be held from the 26<sup>th</sup> August through until the 3<sup>rd</sup> September, admission is free of charge and the exhibition is open from 10.00am until 4.00pm daily with the exception of Sunday mornings. Much of the work on display will be for sale and stewards will be in attendance throughout the exhibition to help and advise visitors.

#### Farmer's Corner

Pen-y-Lan Pork, now based just outside Overton, has been established for nearly 20 years. Mike Ford is the proprietor of the business and has always had a passion for animals and especially pigs. We asked him to describe his farm and his personal involvement.

"I started off with just a couple of pigs and fed them on the waste from the cereal production plant where I was working as an engineer; however it wasn't long before I realised this wasn't as easy as I thought it might be. We quickly built up a herd of up to 120 pigs, some of which would often be seen making great escapes and subsequently found heading towards Overton school. Luckily we have some good friends who would rally them back in.

Once I realised that I had a real passion for pigs we decided to concentrate on quality and specialise in the production of sausage, bacon etc. using old breeds such as Saddlebacks and Gloucester Old Spots, to name just a couple. However, in 2008 I suffered a serious accident resulting in initial paralysis from the waist down, scary times! This put a hold on everything for approx 12 months, but then thanks to the Orthopaedic and Wendy, I was soon chomping at the bit, ready for pigs again !! I left the well-paid

factory life and made the precarious decision to concentrate on the development of "Pen-y-Lan Pork"!!!

Once again we started from scratch and built up the herd with 5 breeding sows and 1 boar (name of Barry, pure Saddleback) and it wasn't long before we were back to 150 pigs. The sows have 2 litters per year and the average litter of piglets varies between 12 – 17, with a gestation period of exactly 3 months, 3 weeks and 3 days. If they don't give birth by then that usually means there's a real problem.

All our pigs are outdoor reared but do have the option to go inside as needed, then 3 days before they are due to give birth we separate the sows from all the other pigs until they have farrowed, then we leave the piglets with the sow for 8-9 weeks. We let nature wean them from the sow, and what we have found is usually the sows have had enough of them anyway and the piglets are wanting something more substantial. From birth to time for market they are all one big happy family, kept outdoor in all weathers!

Unlike other animals in the farming sector that can just be put out to graze, pigs are extremely intelligent, affectionate animals who need a lot of attention and I soon realised there was a real skill and art to the breeding, rearing and farming of pigs.

Their diet is consistent throughout their lives, they just eat more as they get older and although it is commonly thought that pigs will eat anything, this is incorrect! Among other things they won't touch citrus, onions or garlic and they will rout through the feed and leave it. Pigs need to be fed directly from a mixed bag of pellets and cereal based product with added soya to aid growth (and quite a lot of it) but, since Covid this has all become extremely costly. We also supplement with spent grain from a brewery and waste veg etc.



Pigs were, and still are, associated with a pungent smell but you soon get used to it. However, the assumption based upon the smell, that pigs are dirty animals is completely untrue. They are extremely clean and keep their bedding area clean and dry.

The timescale from birth to when they join the sausage production is 17 months if they are female and 9 months if they are male. Any longer and the meat can end up with Boar Taint, which won't make you ill but does not have a nice taste! Obviously something that we need to avoid to maintain our rating as Wales Finest Sausage Producer!

Unlike other farmed animals, pigs are not subject to mandatory inspection, but we do need to maintain high hygienic standards and we are regularly inspected for Health and Safety etc.






#### Getting crafty
