Beginning of an Era



Rev'd David Child is congratulated by Bishop Gregory

Congratulations to Rev'd David Child who was Licensed as Priest-in-charge of Overton & Erbistock at St Mary the Virgin, Overton on January 11th. The services was conducted by the Bishop of St Asaph and attended by a large number of clergy from the diocese and parishioners from Overton and surrounding parishes.

Bishop Gregory said "I am delighted that David Child has accepted my invitation to take up the post of Area Dean of the new Dee Valley Deanery. David has had a faithful ministry as an NSM for eight years, and is taking up House for Duty ministry in Overton, and will bring considerable skills to bear as Area Dean also."

On January 6th a special Epiphany service took place at St Mary's, Ruabon to merge the two Deaneries of Bangor and Llangollen into the brand new Dee Valley Deanery. At the service to mark the union of the Bangor and Llangollen deaneries Revd David Child was installed as the new Area Dean, taking over from Revd David Lewis who had been Area Dean in Bangor and Revd Andrew Sully who served as Llangollen's Area Dean.

First of all, I should like to take this opportunity of thanking you for the tremendous welcome you gave me at my Licensing Service on January 11th. It is indeed a great privilege to serve as your Parish Priest.

In the Church February 2nd is Candlemas. Long ago Christianity recognized the need for a festival of light to break up the monotony of the winter months and to remind people that spring would soon reappear. Pagan Festivals traditionally celebrated light and newness at this time of the year and Christian Candlemas draws on these ancient rituals as it remembers Mary and Joseph bringing the new born Jesus to the temple where the old prophet Simeon recognises in the baby 'a light to lighten the nations.'

In America and Canada February 2nd is Groundhog Day. According to folklore, if it is cloudy when a groundhog emerges on this day, it will leave the burrow, signifying that winter will soon be over. If it is sunny, the groundhog will see its shadow and get back into its burrow, and the winter weather will continue for six more weeks.

Some of you may have seen the film 'Groundhog Day'. Bill Murray plays a self-centered TV weatherman who when on an assignment to cover the annual Groundhog Day in a small town in Pennsylvania finds himself repeating the same day over and over again. He decides to take advantage of this and so without any fear of long-term consequences learns the secrets of the town's residents, seduces women, steals money, drives recklessly, gets thrown in jail and attempts suicide more than once. His attempts to get closer to Rita (Andie MacDowell), however, repeatedly fail.

When Phil explains the situation to Rita, she suggests that instead he should try to improve himself. So he tries help the townspeople, saves lives and gets closer to Rita. Eventually the time loop is broken and everyone lives happily ever after.

Overton Medical Practice

We believe we have now changed all patient prescriptions to one month's supply. We know this has taken some time to adapt and would like to express our gratitude to you all for your support. As you can imagine, the change to monthly prescription has caused a considerable increase in the number of scripts being processed at any one time and has placed an additional strain on the local chemist.

Due to this increased workload, it is really important that patients are fully aware that all prescriptions take 48 hours from leaving the surgery to being dispensed at the chemist for collection. Please allow us 48 hours us to get them processed, checked and signed by the Doctors. To make sure you have your full compliment of medications you should be putting your request in at least 1 week before you run out. We do not accept prescription requests over the phone, but can offer you the services of the online EMIS Access facility. This allows you to book Doctors' appointments and to place your repeat prescription requests using your PC.

Recently Sandra Griffiths, our Lead Receptionist, was presented with her 10 year service award. Sandra is the 8th member of the Practice Team to attain the award. She joins the "club" containing Dr Myres, Dr McNeill, Denise Ford, Helen Lewis, Liz Catherall, Gwen Griffiths and Diane Jamieson. Medical Student Carl Parfitt will be with us from 10th January for a 6 week training period. We hope he finds the experience both enjoyable and beneficial.

Camembert fondue to share

- 1 Camembert
- 2 tblsp olive oil
- 1/2 tsp rosemary
- crusty bread
- 50g(2oz) walnuts (chopped and toasted)
- 2tblsp clear honey

Put Camembert in ovenproof dish. Make a few cuts in top and drizzle with the oil and add rosemary. Cover with foil.

Bake in preheated oven, 200°C, gas mark 6 for 5-10 mins until gooey. Sprinkle with walnuts and honey.

Serve with lightly toasted crusty bread. Also fingers of raw vegetables makes a delicious stick to dip.

Selling with us

Selling at our Nearly New Sale is the ideal way to recycle your well-looked-after or little used baby and children items; and make some money for yourself in the process. We will be selling to a strong and dedicated crowd of expectant parents, new parents, parents of slightly older children, childminders, grandparents and nursery managers, so your items will quickly find happy new owners.

The sale will take place at **Overton Village Hall** On **Saturday March 17th** and we will lay out all sale items as if it were a huge department store - they are displayed in age and gender clothing sections, toys, games, books, parenting equipment, maternity wear and so on... this makes it so much easier for our buyers to find what they're looking for.

As a seller you will be able to label and price up your items at your own pace Just sort through your items, label them up, put them into categories, drop them off on the day of the sale, and pick up your unsold items afterwards. Easy!

To register as a seller with us please send an email to OvertonNNS@hotmail.co.uk or phone/text us on 07730 237278. Please include your full name, address, email and contact number. In good time before the sale you will receive a seller's pack including a number, tickets and some sale guidelines. Following the sale we process the labels from your sold items and work out how much money you have made. We deduct a 30% commission from your total as a donation to Overton Playcentre and a £1 admin charge towards helping us cover the running costs. We then pop a cheque in the post to you. That is all there is to it - unless you can **volunteer** on the day. Many of our sellers find that being a volunteer on the day makes them become better sellers, as they can see which items sell at what price, and which ones don't.

How to Buy

Buying at one of our sales is really quite simple. Buyers generally arrive nice and early and join the queue - first in the queue gets in first (There is a way to get in before the public by **volunteering** for the day, see details below). We have hundreds of items up for sale, so don't worry about missing out on bargains if you are not at the front of the queue. At the entrance there will be an entry fee of £1 per adult - children are free.

When you arrive you will be handed a large shopping bag to fill. More bags are available if you need them, just ask one of our volunteers. Items will be easy to find - they are clearly labelled into sections. We cannot sell mattresses, car seats and mains electrical items. Some other items may be sold separately on our large items notice board in the refreshments area – make sure you have a look. When shopping you may also like to enjoy a well deserved cuppa and a home made cake!

Once you've found everything you need, and even more things you want, you'll go through our tills section where items will be delabelled and bagged for you. We can accept payment by cash or cheques (supported by a cheque guarantee card).

Volunteering

We need volunteers to help us between the hours of 10am and 4pm. They help us place all the rails and tables in the venue before the sellers arrive with their items. Our wonderful volunteers then lay out the items in the correct areas in the venue, and make everything look orderly and nicely presented. We then break for lunch and after that the excitement starts - the volunteer's pre-sale! A whole hour of shopping for what you want before the general public are allowed in, what a bonus! Once the general public come in, it is all hands on deck. We have dedicated volunteer roles (e.g. large items, refreshments, tills) but we will guide you through every bit of the sale. When the public has gone, every volunteer helps to sort any unsold items into seller numbers and to dismantle rails, before going home for a well-earned rest.
