Reflecting on the year Father Jeremy Dussek

My New Year began with a visit to see the film *One Life*; Anthony Hopkins starred as the figure of Sir Nicholas Winton, who as a British stockbroker and humanitarian, helped to rescue Jewish children who were at risk of being murdered by Nazi Germany during the Holocaust. It's a deeply moving story that needs to be heard especially as the number of Holocaust survivors diminishes 79 years after the end of the 2nd World War. Winton rescued 669 children and some came to thank him on a special edition of *That's Life* in 1988. In his response, Nicholas was humble and only wished he could have rescued more children, citing the frustrating bureaucracy that led to delays and obstacles being put in place preventing trains from leaving Prague, especially on the first day of World War II. I was deeply moved by the story as my own family originates from the Czech Republic and came over from there via Paris in 1786, fleeing Revolutions. The film seemed to touch everyone as the 'issue' of refugees and those seeking asylum are of national concern; as people left, comments such as *what are governments doing to try and help those facing persecution today?*

Reflecting on what 2024 will bring, there will be the Olympics in Paris in July, which I guess we're all looking forward to! Less exciting are elections in the US in November and a General Election sometime this year or in January 2025 at the latest. The subject or 'issue' of refugees is likely to be a hot potato. It's something we should all be concerned about - Christ and his parents were refugees who had to flee to Egypt escaping the wrath of Herod and the massacre of the Innocents.


Refugees are often sadly used as scapegoats by politicians, the media and extremists. Having visited parts of the world where people have to escape violence and war (nowhere more than the ongoing situation in Ukraine at the moment), *One Life* can prompt us to ask who needs rescuing and what barriers are preventing genuine asylum seekers from being given decent hospitality and care?

February brings the season of Lent for Christians and everyone to ask '*who is my neighbour?*' and '*what is my duty of care to those in need?*' Valentine's Day also calls us to show and give 'secret' love. As Winton's love was given unconditionally to strangers treating unknown fellow beings with saving care and compassion, may we find his example one that can influence and shape the attitudes of our communities and country in how we treat the needs of others in a human and decent way. May those seeking election also have the decency to reflect this in their responses, in tackling the terrible gangs involved in scandalous trade, but also the bigger issue of war and human rights which people rightly seek to escape from. (*The Swimmers* (2022) is also another brilliant example of how responses are needed too.)

Travels with my music case

I became a music examiner for Trinity and Guildhall colleges around 20 years ago, grading all instruments, from church organ, to piccolo, to drum kit, to guitar,, to Scottish fiddle and everything in between. In that time, I have examined across the UK and have also been asked to travel to various parts of the world, such as Japan, Malaysia, Thailand, Istanbul, Borneo, and Singapore to name but a few.

A memorable tour was two weeks examining in various parts of Italy, such as Rome and Siena. However, part of the examination consists of asking the candidates questions about some musical terms within the piece. The only issue was that most musical terms are written in Italian, so there I was asking Italian students what Italian words meant; needless to say, they all got full marks for that section! Another favourite was a tour to Cape Town, wonderful climate, food and with even a Welsh connection. In the past, so many Welsh people emigrated to South Africa that on the outskirts of Cape Town is a village called...Llandudno.

I do though have a massive soft spot for India where I have been lucky enough to travel to 9 times. As I am sure you are aware, there is shocking poverty there and it can be incredibly noisy and smelly, but the people are perhaps the warmest and friendliest in the world and I just love the fact that the place is barking mad. To give just a few examples: I have been driven around Lucknow at break-neck speed, dodging tuk-tuks, cows and startled looking pedestrians in a retired Indian General's car whilst stopping off to sample wonderful street food, invited to the rooftop of an apartment block for the kite festival, where families and neighbours all crammed together having the time of their lives and I have been brought along to various weddings, one of which had 21 very enthusiastic drummers (yes, I think my hearing has just about recovered!).

My last trip did though make for one of the best stories. I had just survived a 4-hour car journey through the usually mad Indian traffic and so, upon arriving at the hotel, I headed straight for the bar for a well-earned glass of wine. Indian hotels usually have a '2 for 1' drinks system where you pay for one drink and get the second one free.

Therefore I called the waiter over and said, "2 for 1?". "Yes of course, sir", came the reply and sure enough a brimming glass of red wine was soon placed in front of me. However, soon I was also being supplied with delicious

hot snacks, which seemed strange at first as everyone else in the bar just had the usual boring peanuts. After finishing my first glass it was immediately replenished and when I finished that one the waiter went to top it up yet again. At this point I stopped him and asked for the bill, "Oh no sir, there is no bill" came the reply. An alarm bell started to sound in my head, so I went to the reception to find out what was going on. Upon explaining what had just happened she burst out laughing. She then explained that the waiter had obviously thought I was in 'room' 241 which was one of their Master Suites where everything is inclusive in the room rate! Luckily, she and the manager saw the funny side of the mix up and didn't charge me.

Hey, that gives me a thought.

I might try that the next time I am in the Recreation Club or The White Horse!

Overton Village News from February 1884

"The December bazaar was an unqualified success. It was not possible to say anything last month, as the printers require their materials early [nothing has changed in 140 years!]

Happily we had a fine afternoon on Friday, which brought many people to welcome the Duke and Duchess of Westminster, who came at two, and opened the bazaar with some very kindly words, and also bought a number of things from the stalls. In the two days' sale between £150 was realised. The money will first be spent in paying off the debt on the organ, then on the churchyard; and then whatever is over will be expended on the restoration of part of the old oak screen which had been long absent from the church.

The Christmas Midnight Service was the first that has been held in the church.

On Monday, the 14th January, a miscellaneous entertainment was given in the school to provide a new banner for the Temperance Society, the chief attraction being a representation of the story of Whittington and his Cat. The performance was well done by a number of young people from Overton Hall and the Rectory.

Afterwards those who had been for three years members, received a medal."

Attention All Responsible Dog Owners


