Ramblings From the Rectory

Dear friends,

You have probably been in a restaurant and asked, 'Can I warm up your coffee for you?' The cup may be half-full and cold after sitting on the table for a while. When she pours the new coffee in, she refills and warms up the cup. Life is a very stressful business and even the best of us at times can feel tired and worn out. It is the same with our spiritual lives. In June we celebrate Pentecost. It celebrates the descent of the Holy Spirit on the disciples with wind and fire. The Spirit transformed a group of frightened men into Apostles: people who were sent out to tell the Good News to the whole world. If we are open to God he will fill and refresh us with his Holy Spirit.

I read this inspirational story the other day. Mitsuo Fuchida was the pilot in charge of a squadron of 360 specially selected pilots. On Dec 7, 1941, his squadron bombed Pearl Harbour and he became one of the most highly decorated pilots in the Japanese air force, and the one most hated by the American forces. That included Jacob DeShazer, a young B-25 bomber pilot who longed for the day when he would be able to pay Japan back for what they had done.

One day that opportunity arose as DeShazer became a part of the very first bombing raids over Japan. But after dropping his bombs on the city of Nagoya, DeShazer lost his way in the heavy fog & was forced to bail out when his plane ran out of fuel. He was quickly taken prisoner, & for almost 2 years, DeShazer suffered from hunger, cold, dysentery, & watching his fellow prisoners die. And the more he experienced this treatment the deeper his hatred of the Japanese grew.

Then, in 1944, someone gave DeShazer a Bible. He started at Genesis and read on and on, barely sleeping. And by the time he had come to the Book of Romans he had surrendered his heart and life to Jesus as his Saviour and his Lord. Immediately Matthew 5:44 became a crucial challenge to him, "Love your enemies, bless those who curse you, do good to those who hate you and pray for those who spitefully use you and persecute you." Because of it DeShazer's attitude toward his Japanese guards began to change. His hostility evaporated & every morning he greeted them warmly. He prayed for them & sought to witness to them. Slowly their attitude toward him also changed & some of them even began bringing him extra food & supplies.

Finally, the war was over & DeShazer was free. Returning home he studied for the ministry & decided to return to Japan as a missionary. After establishing a church in Nagoya, the very city he had bombed, he wrote a pamphlet entitled, "I Was a Prisoner of the Japanese." It wasn't long until thousands of Japanese wanted to see & hear the man who could forgive & love his enemies. The transforming work of the Holy Spirit changed that young man's life, bringing love where before there was hatred.

God's spirit working in peoples lives can change and transform situations. Maybe you are spiritually cold and empty. Maybe you are finding it hard to forgive. It doesn't have to stay that way. Quit trying to live in your own power and strength. Ask God to fill you with the Holy Spirit right now! And you will know peace and love. That is the great message of Pentecost for each one of us.

What's a Mellista?

Overton Scouts entertained themselves and the crowd at the Party in the Park by designing and building a medieval ballista. Designed to fire melons they named it the MELLISTA. It was built from pioneering poles lashed expertly together by the scouts and using bungees to provide the catapult power.

The question was, how far could the Mellista fire a melon? The scouts asked partygoers to guess the distance – anything from one metre to over 136 metres at a cost of a pound. After a couple of practice firings of the Mellista, a honeydew melon was propelled all of 22 metres and the winning guess was made by Lyn Evison who won a £15 voucher for food in the White Horse.

A week later, the Scouts erected the Mellista one more time and managed to propel a football all of 38 metres, before dismantling it completely. We have no fear that the Scouts will pose any threat to any of the Welsh castles.



History Group

The May History Group meeting brought together lots of information, memories, photos and even a model engine of the rolling stock that once travelled the line from Wrexham to Overton from 1885 to 1962.

It is the coming of the railway that changed the name that many people call our village. So our Overton Station became known as Overton on Dee.

Medical News

As we have over 5600 patients, we are processing a very large numbers of prescription requests on a daily basis. As a result of the immense volume, it is **ESSENTIAL** that you give us 48 hours, i.e. 2 working days, to process your request, resolve any queries, print the prescription, allow time for review by a clinician and to obtain an authorising signature. You should allow the pharmacy a **FURTHER** 24 hours, i.e. one working day, to dispense the medication.

Samples handed into reception need to be received by 12:15pm at the very latest. Do not bring urine samples into the surgery during the afternoon unless expressly told to do so by the Doctor, as it is too late to send them off to the lab for testing.

As part of our continued effort to improve the care of our patients, we are taking part in the Welsh Clinical Communication Gateway (WCCG) initiative to electronically transmit some referrals directly to the Wrexham Maelor Hospital. The process has been operating in Scotland and Sth Wales for a couple of years and will be rolled out to other Nth Wales' hospitals and Medical Practices later this year. Benefits include improvements in patient safety, speed and the consistency of data being sent by all practices.

We have also joined the Individual Health Record (IHR) project. During this summer, all patients will receive a leaflet from the Local Health Board explaining that a summary of your medical records will be uploaded to a secure central computer that can be accessed by the Out of Hours service, (and at some point in the future, by A&E). When you need to attend the Out of Hours service, you will then be asked for permission to access a summary of your medical record to aid the clinicians in your treatment. More information to follow.
