Ramblings From the Reverend **by Rev'd David Child**



I love football, and as many as you know I'm a Wrexham fan, and yes I was there at Wembley – a few seconds in the 86th minute – a simple defensive error and all was lost. Football can be a cruel and unnerving mistress at times, and with Wrexham, in particular, you never quite know if you'll wake up the morning after in joy or despair. But then again, who would have it any other way?

We may sometimes wish that we could guarantee a result before it happens, whether in football or more widely in life, but we simply can't, in either.

Life is so beautifully yet often so agonizingly unpredictable. As the great Algerian goalkeeper and sometime philosopher Albert Camus once suggested, it can seem positively "absurd".

The writer of the Old Testament Book of Ecclesiastes – a book to which I've referred to in a previous 'Ramblings' uses a similar word - *hebel*, or 'meaning-less', to describe the randomness of our human experience. Good things happen to bad people, and bad things happen to those who are good. Stuff happens.

Reading Ecclesiastes is a bit like watching football. They both make you realise that life doesn't work out exactly as you prayed or planned. And that, I think, is why it's good to have a book like Ecclesiastes bang in the middle of the Bible. It's not that everything is pointless. It's that we miss the point if we become too attached to whether things go according to plan or not – whether it's in our work, our home life or indeed in winning that game of football.

Because if we do we can end up waiting so long for the 'right' result, the 'right' outcome that life passes us by. I may never live to see Wrexham lift the FA Cup; but in a sense, it's liberating to admit that, because then I might just begin to appreciate the football more, including the opposition (well done, Newport County!) instead of holding my head in my hands when the match isn't going our way.

If we learn to relax our vice-like grip on what we think should happen next, perhaps we'll prepare with more grace, humility and courage for whatever the result.

COUNTRY BEAT

Hello again,

I am happy to say that this has been a very crime free month; however there has been a report of Anti-Social Behaviour in the car park to the rear of the Doctors surgery. This involved some youths drinking and being very rowdy. Officers did attend, however the youths had made off.

This will not be tolerated, any youths found to be drinking and causing Anti-Social Behaviour anywhere in Overton and surrounding areas will be dealt with promptly. Police have the powers to confiscate alcohol, and will make the youths known to the Youth Offending Team. If the youths are under 18 then we will investigate where the alcohol has been purchased from.

If we discover that the alcohol has been purchased by a proxy person (someone who buys or supplies alcohol for youths) they will be given an £80 fine. Yellow cards (Anti-Social Behaviour warnings) will also be issued by a PCSO. The cards are recorded on the Police Computer. If we see that a person is "collecting" yellow cards for Anti-Social Behaviour then we will forward their details to other agencies that will carry out further investigations.

There has been suspicious activity in the church grounds where damage has been done to the boiler house. Any suspicious person seen in the grounds will be stop-checked by a PCSO or Police Officer, they will be asked why they are in the vicinity.

After working hard to organise a recent bike marking and community safety event held at the Overton Village Hall, myself, PCSO Lynne Maurice and PCSO Bethan Large Community safety were disappointed at the very low attendance. These events were publicised in the local paper, the Overton Oracle and in shops and notice boards, however only one person turned up. These events are for you the community and are aimed at protecting your belongings. We will be organising further events and hopefully more people will turn up.



Mystery solved

The photograph in last months Overton Oracle showed Overton School children and teachers in the late 1880s. However there was a question as to what the building was in the background. Alan Jones, ex Overton resident who reads the Oracle on line, has solved the mystery.

He remembers that in fact the building was the school master's house which was originally built as a single storey building. An upper floor was added in round 1900, but however the foundations were never strengthened. Alan lived in the house for about 7 years and remembers that because of the lack of adequate foundations, the house had "wonky doors and windows".



The house in the picture was built in 1852 by money donated by Mary Ann Bennion who lived at 'Fairfield' on Salop Road. She handed over the house to the school trustees "*house built by her on land belonging to and adjoining the National School used for the residence of the school master*". Both house and school were demolished in 1987 and replaced by Old School Mews.

There are also a number of other websites that can be used to report problems with potholes, dog fouling, graffiti etc. My favourite is www.fixmystreet.com which allows you to report a wide range of issues and see all the problems that have been reported locally. I've reported the potholes on Turning Street/Bangor Road so hopefully they should be repaired soon and last months contributor won't be woken up at 5:30am for much longer!



Tribute to Mr. Pratt

Tributes have been paid to Derrick Pratt who died at the end of April aged 81. He taught at the Maelor School Penley for 31 years, teaching geography, German and boys' PE and was Deputy Head.

Mr Pratt also managed to find time to write countless books on local history including three volumes on flying during the Second World War called 'Wings Across the Border', 'A Millennium History of Penley' many contributions for the Denbighshire Historical Society and a regular column for the Wrexham Leader. He also taught swimming at Oswestry Leisure Centre over two decades and was secretary for the Amateur Swimming Association.

Born in Acrefair in 1931, studied geography and German at Aberystwyth, and later read medieval British History. He did National Service with the Army in Malaya and lectured extensively on local history. He published 19 books plus 131 articles in learned journals, and 704 columns for the Wrexham Leader. He was twice winner of the Bishop David Bartlett Memorial Prize for ecclesiastical history, had written extensively on the history of aviation in NE Wales and adjacent counties - the 4th volume of Wings Across the Border was in preparation. His interests and publications stretched to canals, tramways, railways, markets, lead mining, the Home Guard, decoy sites and much more!
