Ramblings From the Reverend by Rev'd Canon David Child



Recently I was reminded about an interesting fact about Naval Chaplains and it made me think of what happened to me one afternoon when I was a newly qualified young doctor. I'd been appointed house surgeon to the Professor of Surgery and one afternoon he asked me if I'd like to go with him to see a patient on one of the medical wards. Now the Prof was a big man in more ways than one. He was an extreme extrovert. He spoke with a loud voice in a Brummie / American accent (he'd worked in America for some years) and he could put in their place even the most pompous of consultants and often did! He was a great character; I enjoyed working for him and learnt a lot, not surgery that wasn't my forte, but simply how to be a doctor.

We got to this ward, only to find that the Sister was away and the staff nurse had gone for her break. A student nurse was in charge, she looked terrified. But he immediately put her at her ease – he talked to her quietly, he didn't expect her to know who he was, he explained why he was there and asked if it was convenient for him to see the patient. She whispered 'yes' and nodded. He asked if he could look at the patient's notes and if he could use 'her' office. Again a whispered 'yes'. I took in the whole conversation – it was fascinating. He looked at the notes, explained to me the problem and then asked her if he could see the patient. We walked up the long ward together and he asked her some questions. I noticed that they were all very basic and perhaps the most junior of nursing auxiliaries would be able answer them. After he'd talked to patient, examined him and explained things, he then asked again if he could use 'her' office and when he'd finished he thanked her for her kindness and help. She beamed - It made her day. On the way back he asked me as he often did, 'Did you learn anything Dave?' 'Yes sir.'

So what's this to do with naval chaplains? Well unlike the army and the airforce, chaplains in the navy don't have a rank. They assume the rank of the person they're talking to. When they talk to an admiral they're an admiral, when they talk to an able seaman, they're an able seaman. And that's the Christian teaching. Some must of course be leaders, some have to make the big decisions but we are all equal in the sight of God and that is something we should remember in all our dealings.

It's nice to see that High Street and Turning Street are being resurfaced, as well as the installation of speed bumps on School Lane. These measures will improve road safety in the village and also reduce road noise as pot holes can generate noise and vibration through residents homes, especially on Turning Street where large vehicles cause a lot of noise in the early hours.

On 24th April the Overton environmental visual audit was conducted. The audit team walked around the whole of Overton village and noted jobs that required repair or updating, these included damaged road name signs, pot holes in the road, dropped and blocked roadside water gully's and water which was pooling. I'm happy to report that a lot of these problems were rectified very quickly, so thanks to Kevin Watkins who is the new Wrexham Council Street Scene Supervisor for the area.

I have been off recently on annual leave and also on a course, however I'm happy to say that there hasn't been any major problems in Overton. PCSO's Maurice and Ahmed have been covering so thanks to them.

Officers can be despatched to check their details to see if they are legitimate. The majority of legitimate businesses will contact the police to say they are conducting door to door canvassing/sales in the area, however some do not so they need to be checked out.

We are looking forward to attending the forthcoming Overton Village fete. We will bring along a police car and some police uniform for you to try on and sit in the car. We will also be open for any problems you have had, and any information you want to pass to us; its all in strict confidence.

I've had good feedback regarding the measures we carried out by St Mary's school, parking problems have reduced significantly. This will help road safety in the area; the newly installed speed bumps will also help matters.



St Marys Early Years latest addition to their transition project with Overton Playgroup's pre-school children began with the introduction of forest school sessions. The playgroup children are being ably



mentored by our current nursery class, who are experts at exploring the outdoors and not even the threat of rain stopped them from having lots of fun in the woods, along with Playgroup staff, grandparents and our friend Mrs. Richards, LEA link teacher.

The award of £100 from Keep Wales Tidy 'Wild Weekend' initiative has meant the planting of a new hedging boundary for the extension to the forest school site. This, with the addition of a bespoke outdoor classroom, will begin to link the forest site with the pond. Balance Buddies

Early Years at St Marys School have been receiving training by Groundwork Wrexham with their 'Pedal Power' initiative and Balance Buddies. Balance Buddies is a fun and enjoyable way of teaching early years school children how to ride a bike.



Balance Buddies use specialist equipment called balance bikes that have no pedals, meaning that children focus on getting their balance right and gain the motor control skills needed to improve their riding without having to understand pedalling as well. When children progress to pedals they no longer have to use stabilizers as they have gained the balance skills needed to ride a conventional bike and have lots of active fun with their friends too.

One of the many

Edward Haynes of Overton was a Stoker 1st Class on HMS Black Prince which was involved in The Battle of Jutland on 31st May 1916. The cruiser *Black Prince* which, at the first meeting of the two main fleets had followed her flagship, *Defence*, into action had been left behind by the Grand Fleet's turn to the southward after deployment. For some reason which will never be known, she was still at this time far astern of and out of touch with the British fleet; but when a line of battleships was dimly seen ahead, it was no doubt thought that they were the British squadrons. Course was altered to close them. At a bare half-mile range, the German recognition signal flashed out. The horrified Captain Bonham, swung his ship away in a desperate effort to escape, but it was too late.

In the battleship *Thuringen* the same deadly efficient night action procedure that had been displayed at the head of the line went into play. Brilliantly lit by half-a-dozen searchlights, the *Black Prince* was raked from stern to stem by a tornado of shells and lay a helpless wreck before she could even fire a shot in reply. As she drifted down the German line, ship after ship opened up on her, *Thuringen*, *Ostfriesland*, *Nassau* and, finally, as the fleet flagship *Friedrich der Grosse*, added her quota, the *Black Prince* met the same end as the *Defence*, blowing up with a tremendous explosion, vanishing with all hands.. all 857 officers and men.
