The show is open to everyone, absolute beginner or experienced crafter from all surrounding areas and is a great opportunity to display your skills. If you have never shown before, please do have a go—it's great fun. Don't think your work isn't good enough, because whether or not you win a prize, it will certainly give a lot of pleasure to all the visitors who come to see and admire the items on display. Of course there may be some friendly competitiveness, but our show is relaxed, enjoyable and informative, and of course there's always a lot to learn by seeing other people's exhibits. That is what the joy





of showing is all about. This year we have 29 classes, covering most crafts; also Art, Photography, Woodwork, Floral Art & Floristry, plus a Junior section.

So - what happens at the show? The organisers are up at the crack of dawn of course to make sure everything is set up in readiness, and that plenty of delicious cakes have been made for refreshments! Knit and Natter

We are the Overton Knit and Natter groups, we meet every Thursday morning at the Two Doves Café in Overton between 11a,m and 2pm. The group started meeting about 18 months ago. encouraging local knitters and crocheters to get together with a shared interest, but also to encourage anyone who was thinking of learning to knit or crochet to attend. The group currently has 11 members, all with different skills and abilities with knotting and crocheting. Since forming, the group have 'yarn-bombed' the post box in Overton at Christmas time, sold and knitted crocheted hearts for the British Heart Foundation for Valentine's Day, knitted bees and added seeds for the local church of St Mary's. Daffydd our sheep was decorated and currently resides in the Church. We have knitted a King Charles tea cosy for the coronation which was raffled in aid of a Charity called CALM (Campaign Against Living Miserably, supporting families affected by suicide), in November a dress covered with handmade poppies was placed in the Two Doves window and handmade poppies were sold in aid of the Royal British Legion. We have donated knitted teddies, baby hats and blankets to the Special Care Baby unit at the Maelor Hospital, the teddies are given to the babies once they leave the unit, we have knitted hats for the homeless which were donated to the Salvation Armv.

We currently have knitted Easter chicks, complete with Cadbury Crème eggs for sale at the Two Doves Café (40 made so far), proceeds of the chick sale going to Hope House Hospice.

Erbistock Weir

LIFE River Dee is a largescale project, led by Natural Resources Wales, to transform the river Dee and its catchment by restoring the river and surroundings back to a more natural state. This will bring many benefits to the environment, most notably improving the numbers of salmon, lamprey and freshwater pearl mussels to help them become more sustainable in future.



The river Dee is a Special

Area of conservation (SAC), protected under the Habitats Directive because of species and habitats found within the river. Atlantic salmon are the main reason for selection of the 'Afon Dyfrdwy a Llyn Tegid' SAC, and as a result, Natural Resources Wales has a duty to conserve the species at this important site.

Years of monitoring and tracking data has shown that Erbistock weir is the first major upstream barrier on the nontidal section of the river Dee for salmon, sea trout, sea lamprey and river lamprey.

The structure is 80 metres wide and approximately 3 metres high, which makes it very difficult for fish to swim over. You may even have witnessed fish trying their best to swim up the weir, and whilst it can be exciting to spot them jumping. Unfortunately this is a sign that they are using up their energy and are struggling to pass the barrier, often leaving them vulnerable to predation and unable to reach their spawning grounds upstream.

Whilst there is a 'baulk' fish pass on the weir (the stone and concrete wall on the right bank looking downstream), this type of fish pass is only suitable for stronger swimming species such as salmon. Even with this, many fish don't find this fish pass, and spend time struggling to pass the structure.

With European freshwater fish populations in rapid decline, dropping by an average of 83% since 1970 according to the 2022 Living Planet Report, habitat loss and barriers to migration routes (such as weirs) account for around half the threats to these populations.

As part of our project, we aim to remove approximately a 40 metre section of the weir, as shown in the photo, which will allow the river to gradually return to its original width and encourage natural processes and habitat to reestablish. By opening up this section, it will allow fish to pass through freely, and improve river connectivity which is vital for the survival of the migratory fish, whilst also creating many benefits to the wider ecosystem. The weir will be removed down to the natural bed level.

As part of the work, we have been working with the local Archaeological Trust to record the structure. During the deconstruction, archaeologists will record how the weir has been constructed, providing information about the history of the site that otherwise would not be known.

Th work is due to take place this summer during the 'in-river' working period to minimise disruption to wildlife. It will be carried out by contractors who are highly experienced working within rivers and the project team will be on site monitoring the works as they progress.

Chocolate Hot Cross Bun Pudding

Ingredients 6 hot cross buns, halved Butter for spreading 600ml milk 400ml double cream 1 cinnamon stick (or 1/2 tsb ground cinnamon)

4 free range eggs 1 tsp vanilla extract 150g caster sugar 200g leftover milk chocolate egg, broken into pieces vanilla ice cream, to serve

<u>Method</u>

1.Preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas 4.

2.Spread butter on each half of hot cross bun and arrange the buns in a large ovenproof dish.

3.Gently heat the milk and cream together in a saucepan with the cinnamon stick (or add the ground cinnamon). Remove from the heat to cool slightly.

4.Whisk the eggs together with the vanilla and sugar until pale, then gradually pour in the milk and cream mixture, whisking constantly. Remove the cinnamon stick, if using, then pour the mixture over the hot cross buns and allow to soak in for 15 minutes.

5.Place the ovenproof dish in a large baking tray filled halfway up with water. Sprinkle the chocolate pieces over the top and bake for 45 minutes. Serve hot with vanilla ice cream on the side.

Penley Polish Heritage Project

The Rainbow Foundation is an award-winning active ageing charity based in Penley who have been supporting older people in the Maelor south and Wrexham city for nearly 30 years.

The Rainbow Foundation is now looking to celebrate the unique history of the village with the launch of the Penley Polish Heritage Project.

The Penley Polish Heritage Project focuses on the history of the village and surrounding areas after the Second World War and the arrival and resettlement of the Polish soldiers and their families. The timeline of the project will also look at the evacuees to the Madras School and the origins of the camp, that were originally built for and used by US Army troops.

Penley Polish Heritage Project Officer Rebecca Griffiths is third generation Polish and grew up in Penley within a Polish/Welsh family.

Much of Rebecca's childhood was spent with her grandparents on the Penley camp and in the old Polish hospital, where they both worked.

"I feel very privileged to have grown up in such a unique community. That's why I'm so excited to be delivering this project, to ensure the history of this amazing community is remembered and celebrated."

Funded via the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, which is part of the UK Government Levelling Up agenda, we are planning to permanently commemorate Penley's history through developing:

- Memorial garden.
- Walking tour.
- Setting up a History group.
- Temporary exhibition.

• Delivering cultural and heritage events throughout 2024. This is an amazing project offering multiple ways for people to get involved in their local community. It is important to ensure the remarkable stories and memories about the people of Penley and surrounding areas are not lost.


DON'T BLAME THE DOGS
