## Green bins - message from WCBC

As you'll be aware, we've been facing significant disruption during the period of industrial action from Unite. During this time, we've been focusing the resources we have available on collecting black bin waste and recycling (including food waste). We simply haven't had enough resources to allow us to collect garden bins as well. We know this is causing concern and frustration for people who have signed up for this service prior to, or during the strike. Therefore, we've taken the deci-
 sion to extend the green-bin collection period until the end of February 2025.
We'll resume collections from February 2024, and your subscription period will run until February 2025. So, if you've already subscribed, your subscription will continue until February 2025 (you will not be required to renew in September 2024 as your sticker will remain valid until February 2025). Depending on resources, we may also be able to do a green bin collection sooner than February (which will be included in your current subscription), but as resources are changing daily and we approach winter weather challenges, we can't be sure this will be the case, and so we'll communicate with you nearer the time about whether this is possible.

## And from Cllr. John McCusker

I will put a notice on Facebook if things are likely to alter with refuse collections (see dates back page). I have managed to get Council bins emptied recently in my Ward.
Feedback on the 20 mph which affected $35 \%$ of all Welsh Roads: Welsh Government have stated they did not anticipate everyone to instantly obey the new law and drop from 30 mph to 20 mph overnight on the 17 th September and have announced people will only get prosecuted for going 26 mph (FOR NOW) while the public get used to it. GoSafe apply the NPCC guidelines which outline the enforcement thresholds of an extra $10 \%+2 \mathrm{mph}$ so will reduce to 24 mph . A random sample of 10,000 vehicles in the first week showed average speeds on affected roads had only resulted in a speed drop of 3.1 mph and that is now higher at only a 2.3 mph reduction. I must admit I am more wary now as I have been tooted and given hand gestures driving at 20 mph through the village before the " lunatic " screeches past at horrendous speed so very much look both ways if crossing the road.

## Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day 2023

As the days get shorter and colder, we come around to that time of year again when we remember those who were lost in World Wars 1 and 2, and other conflicts.
Remembrance Sunday this year falls on $12^{\text {th }}$ November. Members of the Overton Branch of the Royal British Legion, together with representatives of other local organisations and the general public, will gather at the Village War Memorial to pay tribute to the fallen and observe 2 minutes silence at 11 am .
This will be followed by a Service of Remembrance in St. Mary's Church led by Father Jeremy Dussek. All are welcome to attend this service.
On Armistice Day Saturday $11^{\text {th }}$ November, members of the Royal British Legion will be at the War Memorial to observe 2 minutes silence at 11am.

## The Royal British Legion has a new recruit!

So why would a lifelong motorcyclist, with no military background, want to join the local Royal British Legion group? The story starts back in late 2016 when I decided to try and purchase a rare motorbike from France (a 1988 Honda Africa Twin 650, if anyone’s interested). Briefly, I located a suitable bike near Paris, did a deal with the owner, Bernard, and my brother and I hired a van and drove over to collect it. Bernard and his family made us so welcome that I kept in touch with him, regularly sending him pictures of his old bike enjoying life in North Wales. I promised that one day I would return to France and visit Bernard on his old bike.
Fast forward over six years and in early 2023 the planets aligned -
 Covid was no longer an issue, Bernard retired and moved to Dieppe with his wife, I retired and had the time to tour. Plans were made, tickets booked on the Newhaven-Dieppe ferry and myself and two friends set off to visit Bernard in his new home.
Again he and his family could not have made us more welcome and after spending two thoroughly enjoyable days with them, we took the opportunity to head along the coast and visit the Normandy landing beaches.
Time was limited but we headed for Omaha Beach then spent the rest of the day at the nearby American Cemetery which proved to be one of the most moving experiences of my life. Knowing that we were going to visit the Beaches I had read extensively about Operation Overlord before the trip so I had an understanding of the cam-
 paign but when we arrived, nothing could have prepared me for the scale of loss; there are 9,387 graves and 1,557 names of the missing who are known to have been lost but have never been identified. The most sobering fact is that the average age of those who died was just 23. The physical and mental suffering of those who survived is beyond comprehension.
When I arrived home I felt compelled to join the RBL and assist, even in a small way, to raise funds for the invaluable work that goes into supporting those who have fought in conflicts all over the world.

## St Mary's School News - Exciting Eco Adventures \& Spanish Fever!

As part of our topic on Biodiversity, Year 6 went on a trip to Talacre Beach to explore this unique habitat. In class we had learnt about the history of Talacre (we were fascinated that the sand dunes had once been home to Liverpudlian evacuees during WW2) and that it is now a designated Site of Special Scientific Interest, being home to several protected species such as the natterjack toad, sand lizard and little tern. Our visit was led by Kim Norman, ENI Land Management Officer, who is one of the many people who are working hard to manage this conservation area and help protect the ecosystem. We learnt about the impact of coastal erosion and explored the sand dunes and
 strandline to identify some of the species that live there and learn more about Talacre's endangered species. As the sun shone, we connected with nature in this beautiful place and Year 6 pupil Annie summed up what we all felt about the day: "It was amazing, and Talacre is a very special place!"
For our 2nd eco-adventure, Year 6 visited Xplore in Wrexham to participate in their 'Wild Watch' Day. We took part in a workshop to learn about habitats, food webs and the importance of biodiversity in ecosystems. Pupils then engaged in the 'Citizen Science' scheme to survey biodiversity around Wrexham town centre. We then had plenty of time to play with the interactive science exhibits in Xplore's spacious Discovery Centre. Amy said her favourite exhibit was an interactive computer game where the competitors had to learn about ways to reduce our carbon footprint to save the world. We are grateful to Natural Resources Wales, whose funding helped make both of these trips possible.
In the second week of October, we held a 'Spanish Week' to celebrate Spanish as our chosen international language for the new Curriculum for Wales. We participated in all things Spanish to immerse in the culture and language of the country, including learning Spanish songs, flamenco dancing, creating art in the style of Pablo Picasso and participating in an interactive quiz on Spain. Pupils enjoyed tasting some typical Spanish tapas and pinchos such as olives, tortilla, chorizo, Manchego cheese, and sweet delights such as palmeritas and churros. Across the school, pupils have learnt various Spanish greetings
 and phrases, counting and colours. Year 1 and 2 learnt a song called 'Los Colores' to recognise the colours in Spanish, which they shared in our final celebration assembly. Mrs Lawrenson told us the children loved the tongue twister of anaranjado - the adjective for the colour orange that has a shortened version for the name of an orange fruit: Naranja [nah-RAHN-hah], Anaranjado [ah-NAH-rah-HAH-doh] - why not have a go!

To answer some questions regarding the importance and history of Barton's Bridge which is Cadw listed, 'A good example of a small stone arched bridge'. I don't suppose any of us really gave a thought to it being particularly important.
Barton's Bridge is said to have been built in 1819 by Thomas Telford when he was County Surveyor for Shropshire. It carries the B5069 carriageway over Shell Brook which forms the border between Wales and England in the counties of Wrexham and Shropshire. Located approximately 4 km south west of Overton, it provides a vital link for local communities. The masonry parapet constructed from large red sandstone is an integral part of the structure providing strength to the deck; it provides vehicle containment to help prevent vehicles from leaving the carriageway, as proven by the road traffic accident which damaged the bridge.
Once repaired the parapet performance will have improved.
A combination of original masonry and new masonry was required to reconstruct the parapet so that it best matches the existing bridge. This minimises the visual impact on the structures character while still providing minimum vehicle containment so that the carriageway can be safely reopened to two way traffic for years to come..
They knew how to build them in those days, it stood for 204 years, let's hope the rebuild will do as well.
It is named for the Barton family who lived at Knolton Hall in the 18th century

You may have noticed in the Oracle and on the village notice board that there is a vacancy for a Councillor on the Overton Community Council (OCC).
Councillors are volunteers and the OCC is non-political and non-secular, concentrating on helping to keep our lovely village ticking along.
There are certain things that the OCC have no control over, for example, I would be a very rich man if I had a pound for each time I have been asked "when is the Community Council going to sort out the potholes, the hedges as you come into the village, the road signs, the speed of traffic going through, the volume of the traffic" etc. These are the responsibility of the Welsh Government, Wrexham Council or the Police.
However, the OCC does take care of, amongst others, the cemetery, the public toilets, the playing field, having the grass areas in the village cut, the June Fete / Street Market, Christmas lights and trees etc.
It also gives financial support to many of the organisations in the village, such as the Twinning Association, the Playcentre and St. Mary's School as well as giving of their time to help at such events as the upcoming Remembrance Sunday service.
I have only been on the council for just over 2 years but in in that time, to name just a few -

- more benches have been placed around the village,
- the council have been involved in keeping the village informed and involved in the proposed housing development,
- the Trim Trail has been installed, along with further play equipment,
- the Community Hub on Monday afternoons, has been set up,
- and of course who could forget the fantastic Jubilee weekend!


Meetings are just once a month, although there is the opportunity to be on other OCC committees as well, such as planning, general amenities and finance. So, do please put your name forward and help to shape the future of this beautiful part of the country
