Gate issues!



Good news At long last the new fence which divides the Wrexham Road play area from the playing fields car park has been updated, the entrance near the gate to the main road has been blocked and a new gate installed much further along the fence. All this is to make sure that children do not run out from the play area into the path of cars driving in or out of the car park or turning in from Wrexham Road.

Bad news But within a week the gate was vandalised and pulled from the gate-post. Cllr Lesley Pugh collected comments

from local people. Generally people were quite incensed and expressed disbelief that it has happened and so quickly after the gate was installed. There were comments on how well designed for purpose and nice it looked and appreciation that the Overton Community Council had taken on board the urgency of providing safety, but dismay that others had destroy the safe guard. All mentioned that some sort of reparation should be paid to the community if the perpetrators are found. One did mention it was a pity we still didn't have the village stocks.

One cannot understand why in a village which has known the tragedy of a child killed by a car, other people should destroy a way to protect children from cars..

Good News Meanwhile the approach to the village has been enhanced by the new-



ly installed gates to the Wrexham Road cemetery. The original gates which probably dated back to when the cemetery was opened in 1872, had rotted away. The new gates have been made to a similar design to the original by Mike Lawrenson (pictured right). He has made them from African hardwood and has reused the original hinges.

Many thanks to Mike and to the team from Bangor Racecourse who transported them and lifted them into position.

We did not weave the web of life; we are merely a strand in it.


Whatever we do to the web we do to ourselves. Every part of the earth is sacred for all belongs to our Creator."

Hello and thanks for reading this month's beat report. Firstly I would like to point out that there has been some

feedback from my last report that there had been No Anti-Social Behaviour in the village.

The feedback was that there <u>has</u> been ASB and mentioned areas that have been affected. I can assure you that <u>nothing</u> was reported to North Wales Police hence my statement to that affect.

I have since discovered that yes there have been some minor incidents. However these were not called in to NWP therefore no action can be taken if we don't know about it.

It is <u>most</u> important that any crime or ASB is reported to us ASAP on 101 if non urgent, or 999 if there is an emergency. It may be a case of persons not wanting to get involved. However, unreported incidents will not be followed up and therefore the persons committing the offences are getting away with it.

Unfortunately there has been a repeat burglary of a house that was burgled in June. This has been thoroughly investigated and a result is imminent. Again please make sure your homes, sheds, garages and vehicles are all secure.

I am very happy to report that we have a new PCSO at Overton station who replaces PCSO Stephen O'Connell. She is PCSO Robina Ahmed and has been a PCSO for 8 years so has a wealth of experience.

The event I mentioned in last month's report is gathering pace. There are positive responses coming in from our partner agencies who are looking forward to attending. 

My Kilimanjaro Adventure by Jenny England



On June 30th I began one of the most intense physical and mental challenges of my life. I was terrified as I stepped onto the plane at Heathrow, I had heard many stories and advice but still had no real idea what to expect. My only comfort was the 18 other Nottingham students surrounding me, all quiet and slightly pale; my new team mates! After our long journey we had 1 night's rest before arriving at our starting point. We were climbing the Machame route, or "Whiskey route", the most difficult route up Kilimanjaro that tourists can climb without a permit but the most popular due to its stunning views and varied landscapes. The first day was an 11km trek through rainforest up to Machame Camp, at 3026m. The rainforest is beautiful and contains lots of wild-life including indigenous flowers and black and white monkeys! The next day was a shorter trek to Shira Camp at 3766m. Leaving the forest behind, we trekked through moorland with some actual climbing but mainly a relatively gentle and enjoyable hike. None of the group had shown signs of altitude sickness but we were told this would

change soon! As we arrived in Shira Camp we received a warm welcome from our guides and porters, singing songs and dancing until nightfall. We briefly admired the beautiful night sky before rushing into our tents to escape the cold!

The next morning we saw the summit of Kilimanjaro for the first time, an awe inspiring view which had been hidden by clouds the previous night. It certainly brought home how challenging this trek was going to be. Day 3 was just that, a 10km trek through alpine desert, known as "Judgement Day" was where altitude sickness became a real issue, ascending to about 4695m to "Lava Tower" the group struggled with nausea, exhaustion and headaches. We were all relieved as we descended to Barranco Camp (~3900m) and were able to rest, but it was bittersweet as we realised it was only going to get harder. Day 4 began by climbing up the 200m vertical Barranco wall. We kept a steady pace, heads down and walked the 9km to Barafu Camp. We ate dinner in a nervous silence then went to our tents, hoping for a couple of hours sleep before we began the final ascent.

At 10.45pm we woke and started walking again. Already exhausted from the last 4 treks I focused on my own pace and breathing and tried not to fall asleep on my walking poles! We were told that this was going to be difficult but if we were determined, we could do it. The trek was extremely steep and looking up I couldn't tell if it was the stars or people's head torches above me. By sunrise we were still climbing, which although beautiful,

highlighted how far we still had to go. As the ground began to level at Stella Point, the desert retreated and we were walking amongst huge ice glaciers, an interesting sight in July! At around 7am I reached Uhuru Peak, the highest point in Africa (5895m) I know that I wouldn't have made it to the top without the wonderful guides encouraging us to keep going, they truly were an inspiration. It was incredible reaching the top, we were so proud of each other and what we had accomplished. I know I will never forget my achievement and also that many members of Overton village helped me to reach my goal by supporting the charity. Once again, I am truly grateful for all your help! I have seen how it is changing lives in Tanzania and am so happy to have helped continue their valued work! Clearing river banks



Over the last 2 years, members of the Bryn y Pys Angling Association have under the direction of Head Bailiff Chris Derwent, undertaken extensive work clearing the banks of

the river Dee between Overton Bridge and Bangor on Dee of Himalayan Balsam – an invasive plant which is rapidly taking hold and preventing native natural species colonising the banks of the river. The club has received support and funding from both The Welsh Dee Trust and Keep Wales Tidy Campaign and has been so successful in eradicating the balsam that Keep Wales Tidy Campaign has recently submitted a report to the Welsh Government outlining how successful the club has been in dealing with the balsam.

Neil Smith of Natural Resources Wales (formally Countryside Council for Wales) has stated "This is a great example of how angling clubs and those with an interest in the river can take positive action to protect their local river. Non-native, invasive plant species such as Himalayan Balsam and Japanese Knotweed out compete our native plants, causing them to decline. This can affect habitats for local wildlife and can also block access to footpaths, limiting our access to the countryside. The Bryn y Pys Angling Association have shown great enthusiasm in tackling this problem and their efforts will make a huge difference to the area. The work undertaken by this group goes to show that individuals and small groups really can make a difference."

Bryn y Pys Angling Association controls approximately 4½ miles of the river Dee between Overton Bridge and Bangor on Dee Bridge and offers fishing for brown trout, grayling and coarse fishing. Dear Editor,

I have been informed by our local PCSO that I have been illegally parked on the High Street in front of our home, Church Cottage for the last 20-25 years. Yes I have checked, it is true. "It is against the law to park within 10 metre (34ft) of a junction". This may sound like sour grapes but it does have serious implications for other villagers especially the Corner Shop and the people who park at the end of Turning St near the junction with High Street. I am lucky that I can park off road but this will drastically effect the number of people that will be able to park in the High Street as if I can't park in front of my house then no one can and I will ensure that the police are informed every time I see someone parked illegally.

On a similar note I am pleased that the speeding through the village is being discussed. From a High St residents point of view it is the volume, size and speed of vehicles through the village 24 hours a day that concerns me most. A 20mph limit in the High St enforced by traffic calming measures, ie. a narrowing of the road in two places over its length, the most urgent need. This may solve the previous problem at the same time by putting large flower planters on the junction of Dark lane and High St and outside the Corner Shop thus reducing the width of the road and creating a chicane of flowers, forcing the HGV's and cars to slow down.

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
