Musings from the Manse

Dear friends,

Two months ago I wrote an article for the Oracle reflecting on the aftermath of the bombing in Manchester. My hope was that we would not see such events repeated in the near future. However, sadly, the intervening weeks have seen further attacks, in London and more recently in Barcelona. Also in the news recently have been white supremacist marches in Charlottesville, Virginia, and the escalating tension between the United States and North Korea, carrying with it the dreadful threat of possible nuclear war.

As Christian people we condemn as pure evil all that seeks to deepen divisions and promote hatred and violence between the world's different nations and races, and our basis for doing so is the Bible's own teaching.

The early chapters of Genesis tell us of the world's creation, and while it is more usual to understand these chapters of the Bible in a poetic rather than a literal sense the lessons they teach us remain as important as ever – including the truth that all people are created in the image of God. We all have within us that spark of life which comes from him, and so no matter where we come from in the world we are brothers and sisters, all together in God's big family.

In addition the New Testament teaches us that Christ died for all people. His body was broken and his blood was shed for everyone in the whole world.

These things mean that in any Christian view of the world there can be no 'them' and 'us' – there is only 'us' in the widest sense. We all come from the same place and we are all in the same need of God's grace and forgiveness.

Let us commit ourselves to work and speak for understanding, tolerance and co-operation between nations, and to being the ones who make the first move to cross the divides and heal the breaches and befriend and love our neighbours. Let us examine our own hearts, turning away from prejudice and hatred and instead choosing the path of humility and love. And let us echo the prayer of Fred Kaan, the 20th Century hymn writer who wrote:

For the healing of the nations,
Lord we pray with one accord;
For a just and equal sharing
Of the things that earth affords.
To a life of love in action
Help us rise and pledge our word.

Perhaps then the world will begin to be the One World God wants it to be.

I would like to inform residents that there has recently been a spate of thefts from vehicles in the Wrexham town and rural areas, from hotel car parks, industrial estates and also outside homes. Please make sure you don't leave valuables in your vehicle overnight or even if you are just popping into a shop, it only takes seconds for someone to smash a window and grab whatever from the seats. Also Transit vans are being targeted and tools stolen. So we are advising anyone who has work tools to remove them and store in a safe place at night.

On this note, PCSO Mike Simister and I recently carried out vehicle checks around the village and it was amazing how many handbags, purses, phones etc were left in full view in vehicles parked on the High St. outside shops, and outside the school whilst mums just popped in to pick the kids up. Please take all your valuables with you or put them out of sight. Another thing we came across were how many windows were left open. This could be a profitable days work for criminals, so don't make it easy for them.

I would like to add that since the monitoring of the junctions of High Street and Turning Street, which is still ongoing, it has been much improved of late, so please keep up the good work and help us to keep the village parking issues down to a minimum. Your assistance is much appreciated.

Also on a brighter note North Wales Police would like to invite you to take part in the following scheme.

NWP have introduced the Ride Along Scheme (RAS) which provides an opportunity for individuals to gain a practical insight into the nature of police work across a range of routine patrol activities within Local Policing Services, primarily centred around stop and search. The following principles will form part of the scheme in connection with Stop and Search.

- Members of the public can see stop and search in action;
- The police have the opportunity to demonstrate their use of stop and search;
- The public has the opportunity to provide feedback to the police on their observations; and

Once again as hosts we planned a simple but varied week of activities. Our aim is to encourage the friendship between both villages and over the years this has been a great success. La Murette has a very



active group of young families, and with 9 children visiting we planned activities that were very child friendly. We welcomed everyone on the Sunday lunch time at Overton Scout Hut which has been the ideal venue for hosting our communal meals and as a back up for bad weather. We were able to have a selection of board games and a general meeting place for people to sit and relax after the busy day whilst the children played on the park.

We spent Monday around the village with a Treasure Hunt, a visit to the bowling club and a visit to both the Peel Chapel and then onto St Mary's

church to see the bells being rung. On another day we visited the aqueduct at Trevor then up the Horseshoe Pass and back to Llangollen for a picnic on Panorama. On one evening we visited the White Horse for fish and chips and sticky toffee pudding, a great success and we took them to Chester to visit the falconry and Chester Cathedral, plus allowing 3 hours for shopping!

One of our full days included a visit to Chirk Castle followed by an afternoon at Cloy Lane thanks to Fred Edwards who opened his field. We provided afternoon teas for 45 people with 'Giggles and Games' in attendance to occupy the children and adults alike.

We had a barrel of beer and later tagine and paella cooked over an open fire, then at 9.30pm we lit the bonfire and the fireworks. A trip to Snowdon for those capable and a more leisurely stroll at Erddig was followed by our Saturday night feast with 56 in attendance, a 3 course meal with wines and music from Russ Latham. We visited locally, ate locally and sourced entertainment locally, showing the very best of Overton and its surroundings. How lucky we are to have so much on our doorstep.

Skip Steps Down

1st Overton-on-Dee Scouts' David Burton stepped down as Group Scout Leader at the Group's AGM at the end of July. David, who has been involved with Overton Scouts since 1982, has served as GSL twice from 1986 to 1995 and 2001 to 2017 a total of 27 years!

David admitted there were times when he feared the Group would close when numbers went down to just 9 scouts! Since then things have dramatically changed. This happened after David sought help from Wrexham District to start a Beaver Colony in 2009 for 6 to 8 yr olds, which led to the re-starting of Overton Cub Pack and the addition of a second Cub Pack in Bangor-on-Dee. This resulted in steady growth in numbers and this year the Overton Group has a total of 82 Beavers, Cubs and Scouts with a leadership team of 12 adults together with many parent Occasional Helpers.

David has handed over the reins of Group Scout Leader to Bangor's Cub Scout Leader Dave Huyton and said that he is happy to be handing over the Group in a strong position to an experienced leader who was previously GSL at Gwersyllt before moving to Bangor.

Although stepping down as GSL, David is not giving up completely! He will continue for the time being as Explorer Scout Leader to Bryn-y-Pys Explorer Scout Unit, and remains as a County Training Adviser and member of the District Appointments Committee. He has also taken on the job of Group Treasurer, from Mike Marshall who has also stepped down after nine years in the job. David paid tribute to Mike for the excellent job he has done. The Group had two words to say to David "Thanks Skip!"

Our MP's update

Susan Elan Jones MP continues to fight for improvements to the 146 Bus service on behalf of concerned Maelor residents. Following an email from independent public transport watchdog, 'Bus Users', who are investigating the issues raised by the campaign, the Clwyd South MP said:

"I'm pleased by the news that 'Bus Users' have been working with the bus company to canvas the opinions of regular users of the service, and credit should go to 'Bus Users' and our excellent local campaigners for a better 146 bus service. I think that the proposed 'surgery' with constituents from the area is a fantastic idea. The importance of reliable public transport in rural areas, like the Maelor Villages, should not be underestimated. I welcome the advice of Bus Users and that of the Transport Commissioner for Wales. I have made formal representations to the bus company and Wrexham Council and will continue to campaign for the bus service that my constituents deserve".


