Message from Overton Community Council

We appreciate some members of the community have already reached out to their friends and neighbours to offer support. It is not surprising that this has happened because of the community spirit in Overton being as amazing as it is. Anything which we are putting in place IS NOT MEANT TO override anything that has been offered already. We want to make sure that everyone knows that there is support now, and in the weeks ahead.

Overton Community Council with the Rainbow Centre has established a support group to ensure that everyone in our community receives the support and assistance they require during the current crisis.

One of the simplest things we can do is keep an eye on each other. We have already contacted people to ask them to consider becoming a Community Buddy to keep an eye on a small number of people in their immediate area. The sort of things we are thinking of are assistance with shopping, dog walking or signposting to other available services as necessary.

Overton Medical Practice

In line with NHS Wales and Public Health Wales direction at time of writing Overton Medical Practice has imposed restrictions in order to help keep patients and staff safe.

Patients can no longer enter the building unless they have been invited to attend following telephone contact (Tel: 01978 710666). Patients will be offered a telephone triage appointment with an ANP or Nurse Practitioner to help us establish whether the patient is safe to visit the practice and whether they need to? Where possible if a GP consultation is required it will be conducted by telephone. Patients are asked to be available to take the clinician's call at the time offered and to expect the call from a 'withheld number' which they should answer. As appropriate a prescription will be offered.

Only those patients that are asked to attend the practice are to come to the practice.

Everyone entering must make use of hand sanitisers provided. The GPs have reviewed routine appointments and only those that are considered essential will be invited to attend. We will call patients ahead to discuss routine appointments already booked. Non-essential care has been cancelled including physiotherapist, counselling, Mind Active Monitoring and Social Prescriber. Patients can continue to engage with these clinicians by telephone if they wish. We are now issuing repeat prescriptions for 3 month duration as 3 x one monthly scripts which are post-dated. Patients can return to their pharmacy each month without submitting further repeat request for the 3 mths. Collection of medication from Overton Surgery is suspended until further notice.

We will be very grateful for everyone's cooperation so that we can continue to deliver essential primary care services from Overton in a safe manner.

Seeds from St Mary's

Dark days are giving way to longer and lighter ones. It may not feel like that. We are living through dark and dangerous times. No-one has experienced anything quite like this. I sometimes wonder if I will wake up and find it has all been a bad dream.

In Holy Week, Christians remember the nightmare of Jesus' last days on earth. He was only a young man aged 33, but the things he said and did, whilst bringing healing and hope to many, brought the authorities and religious bigots down on him. It was a brutal time, and they executed him as a common criminal in the cruellest way they could, on a cross. As he died, Jesus cried "My God, why have you abandoned me?"

Maybe you feel abandoned – are you isolated and alone? I know that many people are anxious and I fear that many will become depressed. For Christians, when Holy Week begins on April 5th, this will be the strangest time - because we cannot gather to worship. Our services have been closed down. We may feel abandoned by God.

But the spring flowers and the blue skies seem to be telling me a different story. As do the kindness of neighbours and the hard work of NHS staff. God's good gift to us in creation tells us that Covid-19 is not the end of the story. Have you heard that the birds are singing again in Wuhan province and the skies are clear where there once was smog? Panic buying is not the whole story when people show compassion for strangers. Being made to slow down may do some of us good and may make others review their priorities.

Even in the darkest times there is the potential for good to emerge, and I am sure many of us will have evidence of that when this is all over, stories to share for years to come. A few days after Jesus' death, the stories that his friends told were very different. They seemed to have forgotten the pain of his death because now they were celebrating his resurrection. Jesus is alive! Dark days gave way to brighter ones.

That is the message of Easter. Whatever we feel, whatever we suffer, God has not abandoned us. There are things we have to go through, but he is with us today and will be with us tomorrow. Easter may be postponed. But it will come – and it will be glorious! Keep safe and keep the faith.

We will be remembering in our prayers those who are sick, in other kinds of need and those who have died. Please specify in which list you would like names to be included. (while church services are not happening, lists of names will be circulated so that people can pray privately)

Church is open During the Covid-19 crisis, as a public health measure, all church services have been cancelled. This means no Sunday services, baptism, weddings or funerals for the time being (prayers may be said at the graveside or at a crematorium). This is unprecedented. Our church at St Mary-the-Virgin's Overton, will remain open unless government guidance changes. I would encourage you to come in to church from time to time, for private prayer (before or after lighting a candle in the lady chapel). I am gradually introducing leaflets and ideas for prayer and there will be a box for prayer requests. During Holy Week (5–11 April) there will be ideas for reflecting on Jesus's final journey and on Easter Day (12 April) we hope to fill the church with light and colour to celebrate the resurrection. We can't all gather at once, and we must keep an appropriate distance, but do pop in to church if you can. A quick and easy recipe with simple ingredients

Salmon Rissoles

Medium sized tin red salmon, drained
2 tablespoons of dried breadcrumbs (& extra)
2 tablespoons tomato ketchup
3 spring onions, finely chopped
2 tablespoons sunflower oil for frying, 1 beaten egg

Tip all the ingredients into a bowl. Mix well and form into rissoles. Coat the rissoles in beaten egg and extra breadcrumbs. heat oil in pan and fry for 2-3 minutes each side. Serve with vegetables of your choice.

Overton Community Growers

At least we now have the time to spend in our gardens The Overton Growers can help with any advice, and we still have 2 mini plots left for anyone who wants them. Contact us on overtongrowers@gmail.com. Here are some April ideas



1. **Weeding.** Get on top of weeding out perennials like docks, nettles, bindweed & couch grass. Perennial weeds come back if you don't dig out the whole root, so identifying them properly & forking them out now properly is well worth it and it helps prepare the soil for planting. Keep these dug out weeds in a separate compost bin, in the dark or they will re grow and ruin your good compost.

2. **Build a compost bin.** If you don't already have one it's an essential bit of gardening infrastructure and you now have to pay for green waste collection so it could save you money. The composting process needs air to work properly, So don't make anything to airtight, which makes repurposed old pallets ideal.

3. **Grow your own vegetables.** Start with your favourite veg to eat. Even the humble home grown carrot tastes twice as good as anything in the supermarket. Home grown veg has also been proven to be higher in nutrients, particularly important for bolstering the immune system, especially at the moment. Hardier plants like potatoes, carrots, beetroot, peas, spinach and broccoli can all be sown directly into the soil (if it ever dries up!) Other, more tender veg like tomatoes, courgettes and beans can be started off inside a greenhouse or on a sunny windowsill and planted out at the end of May when all danger of frost is past. Work out what you need & don't sow too many, eg: one courgette plant will feed a large family, but it's tempting to plant loads of seeds, but the plants will eventually overwhelm you. Always grow a few spares though to guard against a slug attack & you can always give any extras away to the Growers!



3. **Sow wildflower seeds.** April is a good time to sow wildflower seed, dig up a bit of your lawn and do the bees a massive favour. De-turf the area first (like the wildlife group have done on the Millennium Meadow) because otherwise grass will overwhelm any wildflower seedlings, dig out any perennial weeds then rake over and sow.

Mini Meadows - A big thank you to Overton Primary School and Overton Nursery, as well as to all the adult volunteers who helped to peel off the turf at our meadow test plot. The good news is we've done the hard work now and the meadow just needs some time to recover from the stampeding of many tiny feet before we spread the wildflower seeds. Because of the nature of the lowland hay meadow mixture we are spreading it is likely that we won't see a big display of flowers this year, but fingers crossed next year might begin to show us how well the flowers like their new home. For the other mini meadow locations we'll be leaving them to grow long again this summer, and looking to see what turns up naturally.

Saving the planet during self-isolation If you are one of the many people who has been forced to self-isolate it may be hard to feel that anything good can come from being cooped up at home. Yet there are a surprising number of ways to help the planet without stepping foot outside.

1. Become a Nature Recorder, Why not sit out in your garden, or watch from a window, and see what birds, bees and butterflies you can spot. Record your findings on <https://www.cofnod.org.uk/Home>
2. Make your voice heard. Signing an online petition can make a big difference. Look out for those to do with protecting rare habitats or calling for action on climate change.
3. Make a nature corner. It's the time of year to tidy up the garden, but leave a pile of twigs and leaves in a corner for wildlife to enjoy, or you can use wooden planks to create a box which you can fill with whatever you can.
4. Give away what you don't need. Sort through your old things put it in a safe place ready for a run to a charity shop in the coming months. Not only will you be helping those in need but by reusing things we can reduce the amount we produce, creating less waste.
5. Repair those tears. Having a go at repairing what's broken can be very satisfying, and lend a new lease of life to something which otherwise would have gone in the bin.
6. Listen to nature's music. Get out in the garden and have a go at learning some bird calls. Go onto the RSPB website or YouTube and listen to some of the more common bird calls. Understanding nature is an important part of connecting to it, and the more connected we are the more we can help look after it.
7. Get crafty. Get out your paints, your wool or your needle and thread and get crafty. Get inspired by the wildlife in your garden, or have a go at making a few handmade presents for upcoming birthdays.
8. Work on your waste. Have a look around your house, looking for where you might be wasting electricity through plug sockets left on standby, water through dripping taps or food through lack of ideas of how to use up leftovers. Once you've identified where you're wasting you can have a go at solving the problem.
9. Give a little. Why not offer a little support by giving to a local business or charity which might be struggling, through buying vouchers or becoming a member.
10. Get growing. Whether you order some seeds online or ask some friends to pop a few packets through the letterbox, now is a great time to plant something new. Big and bold or small and subtle, spread out your seeds and enjoy watching them come to life.

Year 6 Become Scientists for the Day

On 6th March, Year 6 went on an exciting trip to Technquest in Wrexham. The aim of the visit was to experience how it feels to be a scientist and to prepare for transition to secondary school science.

Firstly, the class were met with difficult brain challenges to warm their minds up in the Learning Zones. We interviewed Isabel, age 11, who told us: "The activities were extremely good fun but also quite challenging!" Next, it was lab time. Dressed in white lab coats, the class learnt about colour changing chemicals and how to use key pieces of laboratory equipment. We used red cabbage to create a universal indicator, a liquid that tells you if a substance is acidic, neutral or alkaline. Pupils also had a session on identifying hazards in the laboratory. Our afternoon session was about fire safety and how to use Bunsen burners. Wearing safety goggles, each pupil had the opportunity to safely light and control a Bunsen burner. We also created carbon dioxide to show how it can be used to extinguish flames as part of our understanding of the 'fire triangle'. Technquest staff also created a 'whoosh bottle' where a fire shoots out of a large bottle extremely fast – it was fascinating to watch.



Year 6 pupil, Taylor, told reporters what he thought about the whole trip, saying he thought it was a fun and exciting experience and was a great way to develop labs skills and confidence. Overall, Year 6 had a fantastic day at Technquest. by Jessica Rowley and Ethan Evans, Year 6 Roving Reporters
