WHITE HORSE & JOULES BREWERY WIN NATIONAL AWARD



Joules Brewery are delighted to hear that they have won a prestigious national award for the pub refurbishment of the White Horse, Overton. The award from Cam-RA and sponsored by English Heritage, is given for work which conserves what is good in the pub to ensure its future for generations of customers. The restoration was completed in 2007 and the company went to great pains to acquire the original plans of the pub which were fortunately still at the County Record Office and also appealed to local people for their memories and photos. The original layout was restored, old etched glass and leaded lights reproduced to match the originals and it is now a stunning pub with open fires and authentic old pub charm, a credit to its prominent position in Overton's High Street conservation area.

The judges said "This was a run-down village-centre hotel which appeared ripe for redevelopment for residential or retail use. Instead, it has been saved in a manner that's spirited and individual. The original plan form has been largely retained, and a fine building, very much at Overton's cultural as well as geographical heart, has been success-

fully revitalised.' Steve Nuttall of Joules Brewery comments, "We are delighted with this award and that our approach to pub restoration has been recognised. We love pubs and are passionate about restoring in the very best of the old pub tradition with great local beer in comfortable and cosy surroundings. The company based in Market Drayton owns 14 pubs in the surrounding area. The White Horse Landlord and Landlady Steve and Jane Dodwell travelled to London for the award ceremony



50 year Long Service Award for Tony

At the recent Royal Welsh Show local farmworker Antonio Santosousso was presented with the long service medal for 50 years service at Asney Farm. Antonio (Tony) started work for George Done at Asney Farm on 27th July 1959 and now at 80 years of age he's still there every day. How Tony arrived in Overton is a bit of a love story. In 1950 Tony left Italy to follow his girlfriend Maria Grazia whose family had moved from Italy to work near Bala. They married in 1953 and in 1959 Tony accepted a job with the Done's at Asney Farm. His first wage was £8 per week plus 4 pints of milk per day and they paid 15 shillings (75p) a week for his cottage.

Tony has worked with four generations of the Done family, George, Bryan, Michael and Michael's son Matthew. Tony retired in 1994 and moved to Johnstown but he still comes down to the farm every day at 5.30am and puts in 20 hrs a week. Tony and Maria now have two grandsons, Carl and Paul and the whole family has kept up with the Italian community in Wrexham, but Tony is happiest working with his beloved cows. He knows each by its number and if one is not well he will ring Michael to see how she's doing. When Tony started work for George Done there were 5 cowmen looking after 51 cows, now there is just Michael with help from Tony and Matthew looking after 161 animals. Paying tribute to Tony, Michael said "Tony is a very special kind of person, almost one of the family, and there has never been a cross word in 50 yrs. Nothing gives him pleasure than to help people out. He's a smashing chap and nothing is ever too much trouble for him."

COUNTRY BEAT by Constable Luke Hughes



I'm sure you are aware that our area has always been lucky enough to experience low levels of crime and I am pleased to report that crime is now down by around 23% on the same period as last year. However we must not become too relaxed as this can leave us vulnerable, please have a read of advice and don't hesitate to contact us if you see anything suspicious.

1) Remember to close and lock all windows and doors when leaving the premises unoccupied. If you have an alarm, remember to switch it on.

2) When going to bed at night close and lock all ground floor windows, or have window restrictors fitted if this is not reasonable

3) Make your home appear occupied when you're not in by leaving lamps on in the evening and radios on during the day, you can purchase timers from DIY shops and large supermarkets which enable you to pre-set lamps and radios to go on and off at your chosen times over a running 24 hour period.

4) Consider marking your property with property marking kits and display the property marking stickers in your windows, this does help as a deterrent and reduces the risk of you being burgled. Property marking kits are not very expensive and can be purchased from good DIY outlets.

5) If you see anything suspicious please do not hesitate to call police on 999, you could save someone's property from being broken into or stolen.

OVERTON MEDICAL PRACTICE

The Swine Flu situation - all diagnoses are performed over the phone against a list of symptoms compiled by the Health Protection Agency/Local Health Board. The initial characteristic is a temperature of 38 degrees C or more followed by a combination any 2 of the "normal" flu-like symptoms – sore throat, cough, runny nose, aching limbs, headache, vomiting or diarrhoea. A patient must make contact within 48 hours of the onset of the symptoms and no later than 5 days after symptoms were first noticed.

Particular attention will be given to patients in the "at risk" categories of chronic disease – Heart, Lung, Kidney, Liver - plus Diabetics, Asthma that is being/has been treated by drugs, the pregnant, patients on immuno-suppressant drugs, the under 5's, and over 65's. If Swine Flu is diagnosed, then the GP issues the antiviral. Collection of the medication must be made by the patient's uninfected "flu friend/neighbour".

If a patient is not in the "at risk" category, treatment will be similar to that afforded to a summer cold – i.e. adequate hydration, rest and home isolation until all symptoms have settled.

Patients should NOT go to A & E, nor attend the Surgeries unless requested to by a GP.

Patients can check their symptoms using the Flu Information helpline 0800 1 513 513 or NHS Direct 0845 4647 – but these organisations may be wavering under the pressure of calls.

If in doubt and you think you have swine flu, contact NHS Direct or the Surgery
