Overton's towering inferno

The hot weather got hotter in Overton when an electricity pole burst into flames on the corner of Salop Road and Penyllan Street. Flames and thick black smoke could be seen rising into the sky and power was cut to parts of the village. Firefighters from Wrexham and Ellesmere attended and Salop Road was closed all morning. Scottish Power said 'An overhead line is affected. Our engineers isolated the power supply and have carried out repairs'.

R ededication of S cout H ut

A ceremony took place to officially reopen Overton Scout Hut and to rededicate it to the memory of former Overton Scout James Elson. James was a member of 1st Overton Scouts in the 1980s, and became Patrol leader of Cobra Patrol. Sadly James died in 2012 aged 37 after a long and courageous battle with cancer. His family have very kindly donated a considerable sum of money in his memory to Overton Scouts which has been used for a major refurbishment of the building. A project team led by Scouts Committee Chairman, Peter Matthews, have created two new toilet cubicles, with disabled and baby changing facilities, a new kitchen, rewiring, improved drainage, lighting and redecoration.

At a ceremony in front of a good crowd of Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and their parents, James's mother, Mrs Mary Elson unveiled a plaque made of local oak in memory of James. The inscription includes a quotation that is part of the Scout Promise "to help other people", which this donation surely does. The new facilities will be of benefit not only to Overton Scout Group but to those many other organisations that use the Scout Hut, including Brownies, Youth Club, Baby & Toddler group and all those other village groups who hire the building.



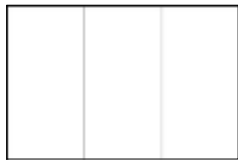

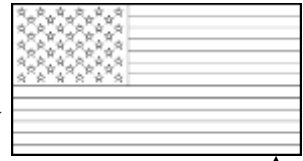

Ramblings From the Reverend

On Sunday August 3rd we will in Overton, as in small parish churches and great Cathedrals throughout our country, gather to commemorate the First World War. In St. Mary's, as in many churches, warfare forms a low-level but constant background to our worship. The plaques, the roll of honour, all call us back to the days of the great wars of the 20th Century. Try and imagine if you can what it must have been like in this village just before the outbreak of the First World War, and then try to imagine again what it was like at the end – thirty young men from Overton did not return.

Those first Remembrance Sundays must have been intensely personal. Then as the years passed Remembrance Day acquired a multiple message: still sorrow for the loss of loved ones, but also a belief that such violence should never happen again, together also with an undercurrent of pride in those wonderful young people who so bravely went off to fight for their country.

Churches are comfortable with the first two messages: sorrow for the loss of the fallen, and resolve that such carnage should never happen again. It is this third element of pride which brings unease to Christians. Violence in the pursuit of any objective does not square well with the fundamental Christian ethic of love.

But we live in an imperfect world and while the Christian may very well be called to accept ill treatment in their own life rather than reacting against it, this is not a moral option in relation to the ill treatment of others. And so as years pass, this sense of pride has been replaced by a sense of thanksgiving. Events in our present world remind us that it will always remain a painful and difficult decision to determine whether any emergence of human brutality requires a forcible and violent response, and we will never forget those who gave up their hopes and dreams in order to oppose naked aggression – even if the only means they had to hand were dreadful and the source of a lifetime of nightmares.

So do join us on Sunday August 3rd at 10.00 am when we will in sorrow remember all those lives lost in the violence of war. And let us then hang on to the truth that ultimately it is the peacemaker who is blessed, and that love is always better than hate, forgiveness is always better than revenge. And let us pray for the day when this carnage will end, when war shall be no more, and the kingdoms of this world become the kingdom of our loving God and Father.

War Diary

At this 100th anniversary of the commencement of the World War I, it is an opportunity to dip into the diary of Ken Farrell's father who joined up at Wrexham Barracks and was a Sapper in the Royal Engineers. He wrote this aged 19 in France, in 1917

Aug 1st *Fritz's usual shots twice a day. Very heavy rain all day.*

Aug 2nd *Fritz shells the neighbourhood again today Very heavy bombardment on our right all night. Still raining.*

Aug 3rd *Very heavy rain again, up to our knees in mud. Fritz shells us at 5pm. One shell dropped in New Zealand camp opposite us and blew one man in the air wounding him in head and foot*

Aug 4th *Anniversary of the 3rd year of the Great war. Raining heavy all morning. Shelling in the vicinity of Canteen Corner (8 shells) Concert held at the Church Army tent in evening - - - - -*

Aug 11th *Early this morning 2am big raid by Fritz. Thought my number was up as his bombs dropped very near our Camp but among transport lines. At 9am all went to see damage and found 80 horses killed. Most awful sight to witness.*

The presenter, Chris Segar particularly wanted to stop at Overton library as it is in the Cocoa Reading Rooms He also spoke to Betty Williams who talked to him about local history.

Your Letters...

Dear Editor,

I'm writing in response to the letter dated 19th June 2014, which promoted opposition to the proposed developments at Knolton Farmhouse Cheese. As a villager, I'd like to respond to this letter adding my views and concerns to this debate which has clearly got residents of Overton talking!

I think it fair to suggest that there may be benefits of the proposed development to our community. Knolton Farmhouse Cheese is a local employer. The expansion of the factory will create up to 12 new jobs in addition to the existing workforce of 40 already employed. In this tough economic climate, businesses need to adapt and diversify in order to survive. It's clear that Knolton Farmhouse Cheese are doing just that by their proposed plans, therefore it's arguable that they're trying to protect and create jobs, people's livelihoods. A change in landscape and view may be difficult to palate by a small minority. But how important is this issue, when measured against a backdrop of unemployment and poverty for the local children and families of the factory workforce, should Knolton Farmhouse Cheese fail and be forced into making job cuts? This possibility is a greater, more serious threat to our community than marginal concerns about 'the view'.

In response to the '*inevitable increase in heavy goods vehicles*', there is actually no evidence that the expansion at the factory will cause this. On the contrary, when I rang the factory to gather information, the facts indicate that over 80% of the heavy goods traffic in and out of the factory traverses via Ellesmere, not Overton, as the writer suggests. Is it really appropriate to blame all the HGV traffic in the village on Knolton Farmhouse Cheese? In my opinion, it isn't realistic to suggest that the development is moved to Wrexham Industrial Estate when it appears that all aspects of production take place on one site. This is like asking teachers and pupils to conduct one aspect of their school day 6 miles away from their school. The expense and logistics of connecting up operations over 2 locations would be prohibitive and wasteful. It is doubtful that the development will create the impending ecological disaster that the writer suggests. The factory, as a legitimate business, is obviously subject to environmental legislation, local authority policy and monitoring by the authorities. The reality is that the factory is bound to processing their waste in safe and lawful ways and to suggest otherwise is unfair. There's no evidence of this development producing potential smells either. But hey, this is an agricultural area, it smells!

What does or does not constitute a threat to the architectural appearance and character of our '*conservation village*' appears to be historically inconsistent and difficult to define in Overton. For example, architecturally important institutional buildings have been demolished in the very heart of the village in favour of arguably less interesting, purpose-built buildings, wildly incongruent with the historical character of our village. With that in mind, should a similar purpose-built piece of industrial architecture in Knolton be criticised? This an interesting and thought-provoking local issue and it is clear that we all have a different view.

Dear Editor,

With reference to the "Is this what we want" letter in the July edition, I would like to make the following comments. It is hard for me to understand the logic of a person that wants to deprive a community of the investment, employment and money into the local economy. I would imagine that the writer has not lived in the village many years, has no interest in employment or the need for it or the wages it provides, a 'not in my backyard' attitude. The person probably wants the village to "die a death" with only houses that working people can't afford, being built.

I have lived in the village all my life 60+yrs and have seen surrounding villages expand and prosper while Overton hardly moved, because very little affordable has been built and the village is becoming a retirement zone. The village needs investment and entrepreneurial vision to create jobs in and around it and not the attitude of the writer. A good clean and relatively obscure plant such as the one in question wants to expand. That's good isn't it? What harm is it doing. The processing plant has been there for many years and expansion comes with the territory. It is a Cheese and Butter Plant processing country products in the country, there can't be much wrong with that can there? The Latham's have been making both on the site for many years.

You don't hear people complain when farmers put grain silo's up, spread muck or cover unsightly silage pits with old tyres and plastic, because it's the country and that's what happens in the country. If the movement of waste from the plant is a problem I've been told this will decrease when the new drying plant is in operation. As for the narrow High Street of Overton, as described by the writer, it's the widest street of any village I know, and as for Salop Road, its had more tankers

.... down it servicing Ellesmere Dairy than this development will ever send down it. If noise is a problem, and I fail to see how size is related to noise output as suggested in the letter, (I have never heard any noise from it and I walk past it often) then, with the management team at the Plant, sort it out with the Environmental Agency. There are laws and limits that have to be adhered to. If people feel so strongly about visual impact it will have on the countryside, or more to the point, their view, some innovate landscaping should be put in place to minimise this, but to scupper a project on these ground is not on. There are always answers to these kind of problems, they occur all the time in industry. That's if you want an answer!

The Latham's have been an integral part of the Overton community for more than 50 years. They have during that time directly or indirectly put many millions of pounds into the local economy through direct wages to their many employees, whole families and generations of families. At one time I used to think half the village worked there one way or another. Money to local contractors, (they always used local labour) or direct purchases from local businesses. They always paid good wages and looked after their employees, that's more than can be said for a lot of other local employers.

It's my opinion that the planning permission should be granted and the letter writer should get a life and move into the 21st century.

What do we do?

As we bid farewell to David Burton we welcome Keith Miller onto the Community Council (OCC).

There should be 11 Council members, currently we only have 9. We are hoping new members will soon be forthcoming. A question we are often asked is what does Overton Community Council do for us?

*Road safety has for many years been a priority issue and constant lobbying has at last resulted in speed limit reductions and safety measures.

*We were asked for additional equipment in the playground to accommodate users of all abilities. OCC applied for a grant to cover the cost. As part of this a public consultation was carried out to gather opinions from residents as to what they wanted in their playground. During one of our regular public drop ins, we heard that members of the public were concerned about the lack of fencing around the playground so we immediately installed a fence and gate. In September we find out if we have been successful with our grant application. A Playing Field committee regularly inspects the area, organises any remedial work in accordance with the RoSPA accreditation. We also maintain the Millennium Meadow with its protected trees.

*Wrexham Council decided to close public conveniences and OCC have taken over the responsibility for our toilets rather than lose them. We are concerned that these should be run as economically and safely as possible and have applied for a grant to help us improve the lighting and install water saving taps.

*OCC maintains the Cemetery and has planted a small wildflower area there. The War Memorial was in need of repair and after obtaining grants the work has been completed.

*The Community Council meet once a month but the Planning Committee meet whenever required; applications often need much research of regulations as Overton is a conservation village.

*The Overton web site is currently being updated and we hope to have this completed very soon. We are grateful for the time and input freely given by James Allwood.

*We undertake to organise the annual village fete, the sole purpose of which is to bring the community together. We have representatives on St. Mary's School Governing Board, Overton Twinning Association, One Voice Wales, Town and Community Council Forum, Community Safety Police Forum and Overton United Charities.

Extra work is being placed upon Community Councils as Borough Councils cut costs by passing responsibility for services to them, and OCC is becoming more involved in consultation papers, forums, legal and health and safety issues. Wherever possible grants are accessed to fund activities undertaken on the communities' behalf.
