## Seeds from St Mary's

The Overton parade and fete on June 29th was a great occasion, bringing the High Street to a halt as parade participants and spectators enjoyed the procession to the playing field, where many different stalls were available to tempt and to entertain. As a newcomer to the village, I was very impressed with all the work that had gone in to creating the parade with its mythical water creature and other floats, and I was interested to see so many different organisations represented on the field. My impression was that Overton punches somewhat above its weight as this was a fine achievement for a village of this size.

There is something very special about being part of a community. In towns and cities it can be difficult to feel connected to the place where you live; in a village like ours, it should be easier. That doesn't mean, however, that everyone feels accepted or cared for. Some people do get overlooked. Society feels more fractured than it once did, even in a village like ours.

Having conducted two weddings in July and celebrated my own son's wedding, St Paul's words about love are very much in my mind. When he writes that "love is patient, love is kind, love keeps no record of wrongs" he isn't thinking about a couple making their marriage vows. He isn't writing about romantic love. He is writing to a small community of Christians about how they should care for each other. He is writing about a commitment to love, not an emotion.

What can we do as a community to show love for our neighbours? Traditionally, the church has been a focus for pastoral care. Let me know if there is anything we can do for you or someone you know. Or, even better, let me know if there is something you would like to offer to do for others. Doing for others what we would like someone to do for us – that's a good principle, a practical way of showing love.

And may our community flourish!

## Country Beat

Through community engagement, North Wales Police have received reports of problematic parking of vehicles.

Inconsiderate or illegally parked vehicles are a potentially dangerous street obstruction which can force pedestrians to walk along the road to bypass those vehicles. This is especially problematic for pedestrians who are blind or visually impaired, wheelchair or mobility users, people with pushchairs, the elderly and the emergency services.

Reports include vehicles parked near school entrances (zig zags), across drop kerbs, too close to other street furniture, parked half on pavement and roads and in some cases vehicles parked fully on pavements.

The following Highway Code information should assist with any confusion regarding parking regulations. You MUST NOT stop or park:

- near a school entrance
- on a pedestrian crossing, including the area marked by the zig-zag lines
- anywhere you would prevent access for emergency services
- at or near a bus or tram stop or taxi rank
- opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space
- near the brow of a hill, hump bridge or on a bend
- opposite a traffic island or (if this would cause an obstruction) another parked vehicle
- where the kerb has been lowered to help wheelchair users and powered mobility vehicles
- in front of an entrance to a property
- on a cycle track where you would obstruct cyclists' use of cycle facilities except when forced to do so by stationary traffic.

PCSOs have also been doing speed checks in Overton village, on Station Road and Salop Road. These were done on the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> July as part of a high impact awareness operation. In July we had some help from the local Cub pack who assisted with capturing the speeds of the motorists with the handheld speed gun and letting drivers know if they were driving sensibly within the speed limits with cheers and thumbs up or down. North Wales Police would like to thank them for their help on making the village a safe place to live. Officers will be doing spot checks in the area and warning motorists to be aware of their speed.

PCSOs have been dealing with some antisocial behaviour in the village which resulted in damage to the cricket club pavilion. Home visits were conducted by officers with parents present to those involved and letters of apologies have been written by a number of youths involved. Officers have noted no further reports of antisocial behaviour since the home visits were conducted.

## Quarter Peal at St Mary's Church

On Saturday 31<sup>st</sup> August 2019 a Quarter Peal is to be attempted at St Marys Church, Overton, between 10.00 and 10.45am. A Quarter Peal is comprised of 1,260 changes, or permutations of the 6 bells. The method that will be rung is Plain Bob Doubles and two regular Overton bell ringers will be joined by ringers from the neighbouring towers of Chirk, Llangollen and Oswestry.

Looking at the Overton bell ringing records dating back to 1881, there has only ever been one Full Peal, lasting 2 hours and 49 minutes rung in 1976, and eleven Quarter Peals rung in 1924, 1967, 1975, 1978, 1979, 1986, 1990, 1993, 1995, 2000 and 2004. The Quarter Peal attempt has been organised to coincide with normal practise on Saturday mornings but will last approximately 15-20 minutes longer than usual.

If the attempt is successful and meets the strict guidelines outlined by the *Central Council of Church Bell Ringers*, it will be recorded in *The Ringing World* as only the twelfth Quarter Peal to be rung in Overton.

## Bee Friendly

Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> June saw the arrival of some welcome but problematic guests to the village. A swarm of bees decided to make its new home in one of the vents near the Village Hall entrance. The honey bee still faces a number of challenges despite the surge in bee keeping popularity (in 1900 there were over a million hives in the UK, in 2015 this numbered just 270,000) so the Village Hall was keen to see these bees removed humanely and rehomed to a more suitable location (especially with a wedding due to be held at the hall on 29<sup>th</sup>...although you couldn't make it up...the theme of the wedding? Bees!).



Two local bee keepers were called in and Operation Extract the Bees commenced. A small hive was set up to trap as many of the bees as possible. This has now been rehomed along with the majority of the bees to the Brymbo Heritage Project where they are establishing an apiary to encourage people to learn how to keep bees and to help pollinate their orchard of heritage apple trees. A swarm is how bees increase their numbers by sending a queen off to establish a new hive along with some worker bees. When bees swarm, they are docile as they will have gorged on honey in order to take enough supplies with them to establish a new home. They are reluctant to sting in this state. It's a bit like trying to do karate after a big Sunday dinner! Whilst if a swarm lands in your garden, it needn't be a cause for panic, do exercise caution and call your local bee keeper to help safely remove it <https://scbeekeepers.co.uk/swarms/>.

### Want to do your bit to help the UK bee population? Top tips for a bee-friendly garden:

- Let your lawn grow: wildflowers rich in pollen such as dandelions, clover, daisies and plantains will thrive.
- Choose a range of flower shapes to suit different bee species, as their foraging methods and feeding techniques can vary.
- Provide water for bees to take back to the hive.
- Ensure year-round planting so bees have a source of flowers in the winter.
- Avoid the use of pesticides.
- Provide a bee house for solitary bees: make from a block of wood with holes drilled in it, or bamboo, or buy one.
- Focus on cottage garden flowers, eg lupins, hollyhocks, delphiniums, foxgloves, wallflowers, roses and honeysuckle.
- Encourage your local council to plant pretty drifts of wildflowers in public places: they are low-maintenance and very bee-friendly.

## The Overton on Dee Branch of the WI visit the Wynnstay Hunt kennels

The Wynnstay hounds welcomed a very interested party of friends from the Overton branch of the WI in July, led by their president, Margaret O'Neill. They were met by Harry Williams-Wynn, a Joint Master in charge of the kennels who told us all a little of the history of the building built in 1788 by his ancestor, Sir Watkin Williams Wynn.

The huntsman, Chris Woodward and the whip, Thady Duff were also there explaining how all the hounds are looked after and exercised every day. The dogs and the bitches are kept separately, as are any bitches in season. They are taken out for fitness and obedience training every morning, with the hunt staff on bikes at this time of year. The hounds are fed on fallen stock supplied by local farmers, which is both a service and the best way to feed them. The terrier lives in with the big dog hounds and is 'the boss'! When they are fed, the more shy will be let in first to make sure everyone gets their fair share.



In the afternoons they are taken out into the paddocks to relax and play. The recent puppies are sent out to family homes to be 'walked' or educated as to the sights and smells of the world before coming back to the pack.

The hounds belong to Sir Watkin and are bred in the Old English tradition as opposed to the lighter weight 'modern' foxhound. The blood lines are highly documented and can be traced back many decades, with their traditional names starting with the letter of their sire or dam.

The champion hound at this year's Great Yorkshire Show, Chairman, was introduced, he is highly sort after as a stud dog by other hunts .

Just outside is a smart lawned area with some stone flags where each year the puppies who are the 'new entry' for the year are shown and lots of prizes are given out to their walkers who have been looking after them.

Afterwards everyone came back for tea and to look at some old photographs of the hounds meeting in Bryn y Pys park in the 1930's together with a scrap book diary compiled by Lady Kenyon which had documented visits from Hanmer WI.

### Postscript to the visit:

It was remarked by the visitors on the hounds' high standard of care, with everything kept immaculately clean and washed down. It was also said that the building itself is beautifully preserved.

## Overton Community Council

### Feasibility of placing a pelican crossing on the High Street.

Overton Community Council (OCC) received a request from a resident of Overton as to the feasibility of installing a pelican crossing on the High Street.

Members of OCC met with Graham Lloyd from Wrexham County Borough Council. The purpose of the meeting was to identify suitable sites on the High Street for the location of a crossing and then to consider the cost implications. The findings suggested that the High Street is not suited for pelican or zebra crossings for the following reasons:

- The location of bus stops
- Width of the High Street, which would need to be reduced to support a crossing
- Parking issues – the installation of a crossing would significantly reduce the parking spaces available on the High Street.

As this was disappointing, we examined another possible location: installing a crossing close to St Mary's Church. This also proved unsuitable because:

- the required distance from any junction must be 8 metres; and
- installing a crossing in this location posed a problem for those using the church i.e. for funerals and weddings.

OCC was also advised that any costs incurred would be borne by the community and would be in the region of £25,000 to £50,000.

We queried the possibility of speed restrictions being placed on the High Street i.e. 20mph. This type of traffic calming is sited only outside schools, not on through routes, such as the A528.

Overton Community Council has considered the request very carefully and has had to conclude that at present, the installation of a crossing on the High Street is not feasible.

## Come and have an amble

The Overton Amblers, dedicated to keeping Overton's Public Footpaths accessible, will be going out again to explore and enjoy Overton's footpaths on Saturday August 10th and on Wednesday August 21st. We will be looking out for problems on the paths while enjoying the walk and the scenery. Any problems such as inaccessible paths or broken stiles will be reported to the footpath officer at WCBC.

A recent walk set off down Musley Lane and on to Overton's public footpath number 14 to Queensbridge Dingle. From there we followed footpath 15 to Lightwood Green where we accessed number 41 returning to the village along footpath 12. We came across 3 broken stiles plus a place where there should have been a stile but we were forced to negotiate a fence instead. These problems will be reported. ## Wildlife News

### Mini Meadows

A big thank you to everyone who has been out and helped with the mini meadows surveys. (see photo right) In all over 30 wild flower species were found across the three sites, with more species found to be flowering in the uncut areas compared to the cut areas. Both the playground and cemetery mini meadows showed good numbers of wildflowers including wild carrot, cuckoo flower, yarrow and ribwort plantain, however the millennium meadow was much more impoverished, probably due to its history as a cow pasture.

Now that the mini meadows have done their job in providing nectar for pollinators throughout the summer they will be cut back for the winter and the cuttings raked and removed. If you would like to assist with this work please get in contact.

### Bug Hotel

To help offer homes to all manner of insects we will be building a bug hotel in the playground.
