## Seeds from St Mary's

.....  
with Rev'd. Peter Mackriell



If you're a driver, what is your attitude to your fuel gauge? Do you perhaps fill up at every opportunity, stopping at every petrol station to top up the tank, or do you wait until you see the sign that says 'last fuel before the motorway'? Do you tend to refuel when your gauge drops into the red, or as soon as the tank is half full? How low can you go? Personally, I often have the fuel light on, but I have never broken down because of a lack of fuel. I suppose that means I like to live dangerously.

Some of us like to live dangerously when it comes to praying – or, not praying - pushing ourselves to the limit and running on low. Prayer should support our relationship with God, it's the way we stay in touch with him, but some of us live in the red all the time. Weekly worship, in church on Sunday, can be like a fuelling station, a regular 'top up'. And just as some cars run on diesel, and others need unleaded, whilst some call at the garage for oil or windscreen wash, we probably find ourselves at church topping up on different things; God's love, a sense of his presence, guidance, hope, fellowship, worship, silence. But if we attend less regularly, if we go just a bit longer between visits to church, we might find ourselves running low on some of these things, even dangerously low. Indeed, weekly worship may itself not be enough to sustain us.

Prayer is a vehicle that keeps us in tune with God. Not praying has the same impact on your relationship with God as not speaking to your wife (or husband) would have on your marriage. And yet, even if we know what prayer should be like, we struggle to do it. We drive round and round, running out of fuel, and one day we will break down.

So, what can we do?

- set aside 10 minutes a day specifically to pray; if you don't know what to do in those 10 minutes, read on...
- come to Evening Prayer at 5.00 p.m. on Mondays, or Morning Prayer at 8.30 a.m. on Thursdays, in St Mary's
- read a book on prayer and apply it – try Philip Yancey's "Prayer", for example, or Henri Nouwen's "The only necessary thing"
- get an 'app' for your phone or tablet – try Daily Prayer (from the Church of England) or get the Bible Society app and follow the daily "Lyfe" readings

### The Rainbow Centre becomes a Living Wage Employer.

Over the past two years the Rainbow Centre has been working towards becoming a Living Wage Employer and are very proud to confirm that they have achieved this milestone! As one of nearly 7000 UK employers who have proudly committed to pay a real Living Wage to their staff, the Rainbow Centre believes a hard day's work deserves fair pay. Their accreditation as a Living Wage Employer means that every employee under contract for the Rainbow Centre will earn a real Living Wage.

The real Living Wage is higher than the government's minimum, or National Living Wage, and is an independently calculated hourly rate of pay that is based on the actual cost of living. It is calculated each year and is announced by the Living Wage Foundation as part of Living Wage Week. It is currently £9.50 in the UK, with a higher rate of £10.85 for London. Chief officer Caroline Tudor-James says: "I'm absolutely delighted that the Rainbow Centre is now a real Living Wage employer, this is a proud moment for us as we have been working towards this for the last 2 years.

All our staff have worked relentlessly since the Covid pandemic started, so this rise in pay matched with additional bonuses that we have paid, is well deserved. Thanks to the support of most of our local Community Councils, including Holt, Marchwiell and Maelor South, we were able to include our team of Community Agents in the scheme too. We believe that by raising standards the whole community benefits."

## Overton's Bell Ringing Update

This month I thought I would begin with a little bell history and facts. There are 6 bells in St Mary's, although originally there were only 3.

The treble (bell 1) is the smallest, lightest bell and dates back to 1912. Bells 2, 3, 4 and 5 date back to 1826 and the tenor (bell 6), the biggest, heaviest bell (7cwt 3qr 9lb) dates back to 1615!



They are all hung in an oak frame built in 1826 by James Jacques, carpenter and joiner of Hereford. His name and date are carved into the frame (*Photos left and right*). It is thought that James has only built 3 frames before he died in 1837 aged 32 in Llangarron Lunatic Asylum.



It is a tight squeeze moving around the bells as they sit snugly in the wooden frame. Bells 1 and 2 are positioned near the front of the tower and the ropes go through a complicated pulley system to avoid the clock, making them 'unusual' to ring. When allowed, we hope to start a 'tower tour' where you can walk up the spiral staircase to see the clock room and the bells for yourselves. It is possible, with suitable ear defenders in place, to watch what happens when the bells are actually rung, but that is a story for another day.

Since my last update, ringing for Sunday Service recommenced on March 14<sup>th</sup> and on May 3<sup>rd</sup> the regulations were eased to allow 6 ringers to ring the 6 bells (but there are only 4 of us!). To mark the funeral of His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh, one bell was rung half muffled for 10 minutes. In June we held our first Saturday morning practice session for some time to ensure we were "wedding ready". Finally, we have 3 new learners ready to start bell handling training again, one of which is so excited to start, she brings her young son on a Sunday morning and sits in front of the church on the gravel watching and learning. Now that is keen!

## Jo is ordained

Revd Jo Mackriell, who lives at The Rectory in Overton with her husband, Revd Peter Mackriell, was ordained as priest in St Asaph Cathedral on Saturday 26 June; she was ordained deacon, under strict Covid restrictions, in July last year, and has been serving as curate at St Margaret's, Garden Village, and St Mark's, Caia Park.



Jo was born and grew up in South Derbyshire before going to university at Westminster College, Oxford to study theology. She had grown up in a Methodist family and became a lay preacher in her twenties. When she met – and, later, married – Peter, she knew that he had a calling to full-time ministry in the church, and he was ordained 27 years ago, in 1994. Jo says, "Who would have guessed it would have taken me over 30 years to get to the point of being ordained, from the time of those early preaching appointments in the Methodist Church?"

For nearly 20 years, Jo worked in adult education, teaching English and Maths to those who didn't manage to gain qualifications at school; she thoroughly enjoyed being able to give people a second chance and felt very proud of her students when they gained a qualification for the first time. Jo and Peter have three adult children; their two sons live in north Wales and their daughter is in York.

This last year has been a strange time to be starting out in a new ministry, with only online worship at first. But Jo has been tremendously heartened by the way in which churches have risen to the challenge of the lockdown and thinks this is a great opportunity for the church to be more inclusive. In her spare time, Jo does a lot of textile crafts, including knitting, embroidery, spinning and weaving and she is looking at how we can include more visual arts in our faith journey.

how many miles of bunting adorned Overton in the end! Stallholders arrived to pitch their stalls and Overton positively bustled with activity. And still it did not rain.

10.00 arrived and with it the official start time of 'Fete Lite'. The array of produce on offer on the 32 stalls dotted around the village just goes to demonstrate the amazing creativity of the mostly local businesses and organisations in and around Overton. There were stalls selling everything from cakes to cider, bird boxes to chopping boards, with quizzes, tombola, treasure hunts, bacon butties and everything else in between.



Gradually the streets of Overton thronged with people visiting the stalls, enjoying the 'walking market' feel and – most importantly after these past difficult months – relishing the chance to be out and about and chat with each other after such a long time locked in their houses. And still it did not rain.



The stalls closed at 1pm and, whilst these were being packed up, the action moved to the football pitch for the Community Picnic which was another happy community event. Everyone gathered in their appointed socially distanced groupings dotted around the football pitch, spread out their picnic rugs and munched happily watching children playing in the playground and relaxing for what may have been for some the first time in months.

## Was your bin not emptied?

From WCBC: Our refuse crews are still reporting cases where they haven't been able to access a street because parked cars were causing an access issue. Please consider how you park your car, especially on collection day. Our wagons are heavy and wide, so our drivers need to be certain they can manoeuvre without causing any damage. If parked cars are preventing our crews from accessing your street, unfortunately they will have to leave without removing waste or recycling. We know it's really important for all of us to get our bins emptied and have our recyclables collected on time, and for most of us this happens pretty smoothly. If parked cars are preventing access to your street, unfortunately they will have to leave without removing waste or recycling. All our vehicles are fitted with in-cab technology including CCTV, that allows the crews to record any instances where bins have not been put out before 7:30am, or if there are access issues, which prevent our crews from making the collection.
