## Seeds from St Mary's with Rev'd. Peter Mackriell



Have you heard about the reduction in the speed limit in built-up areas in Wales? Buckley, Flintshire, has been one of the pilot areas for the scheme to reduce the limit to 20 mph, and the trial has caused some controversy in the town – particularly as cyclists can now travel faster down the hill on Liverpool Road than the motorists can. I'm not sure why cyclists don't have to keep to the speed limit, but they are harder to catch (not having a number plate).

Residents of Overton might welcome the change, when we stand on the High Street and see people driving at speed through the village. It can be frightening to see cars and motorbikes clearly exceeding the current 30 mph restriction and, I have to say, when I hear the statistics about stopping distances and the injuries sustained by people hit at 30 mph compared to 20, I am pretty convinced that this will be a good move (however inconvenient we might feel it is).

But I have a confession to make. I have just received my second speeding ticket – and expect to go on another speed awareness course (the last one was a few years' ago). Why do I tell you this? They say confession is good for the soul (and they are right!) - but should probably be less public than this. Am I proud of driving too fast? No, definitely not. But I am aware that we all make mistakes – even Rectors, Vicars or priests.

The 'driver education course', as it is called, explains a number of things about the roads that I didn't pick up when I first learned to drive – proving that we can all learn something new. But the focus of the course is on awareness, something very familiar to me as a counsellor. Some people might deliberately choose to speed – I've seen a few of them on the A483 and some in the village here – but most of us only speed when concentration lapses and we don't notice a change in speed limit or don't notice that we are slowly accelerating. That's why I use my cruise control a lot – but I know I have to beware of using that as a replacement for paying due care and attention on the road.

It strikes me that a lot of the mistakes we make in life are because we are not fully aware. We don't intend to hurt others, we don't set out to mess things up, but sometimes it just happens. We wander across the line and find that we have trespassed (as the traditional Lord's Prayer says). It is part of being human that we make mistakes. The problem is, the hurt still hurts and the mess remains.

So, I need to take the points, pay the fine – or go on the speed awareness course. And eventually my mistake will be forgotten, my record wiped clean. The great gift that God gives us, in the name of Jesus, is the opportunity to start again. The slate can be wiped clean, our sins (or trespasses) can be forgiven. That is good news!

I know about making mistakes, but I also know about forgiveness. If you want to know more about making a fresh start, please speak to me.

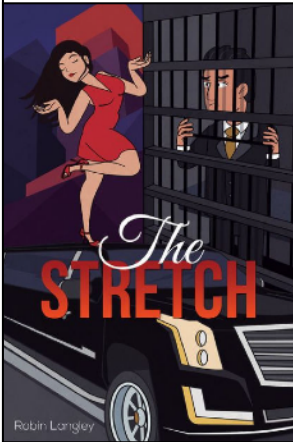

Another of our local authors has had a book published just in time for reading on your holidays or on the beach.

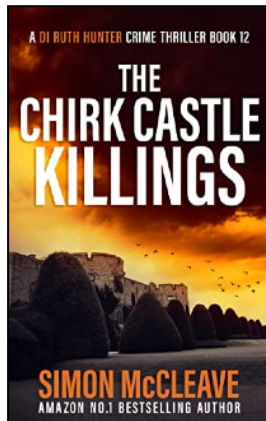
**Robin Langley** (also from Overton's own Ego Xcentric hairdressers) has published his new book "The Stretch".

### Ruth

Ruth Caswell sadly passed away in May. She and her husband Eddie only lived in Overton for a few years but during that time Ruth shared her knowledge and talents to enrich our village life.

Born in Keighley, Yorkshire, Ruth trained as a costume designer at Nathan's in Drury Lane and went on to work at Glyndebourne Opera. At age 22 she became the costume supervisor for Theatre 69, who later formed the Royal Exchange Theatre in Manchester. Ruth worked on such films as "Shakespeare in Love", "Elizabeth", and "Dad's Army" and was textile advisor for "Pride and Prejudice". The clothes she made were sold, first of all on her stall in Kensington Market next to Freddie Mercury's stall, and later from her bridal shop in Yorkshire. Her clothes were photographed for Vogue, worn by Jean Shrimpton, and sold in Liberty's, Harrods and Sach's 5th Avenue.

Ruth was a brilliant and inspirational teacher at Bradford College and was awarded an Honorary Fellowship of the School of Art, having secured the future of Bradford Textile Archive.

After moving to Overton to be closer to children and grandchildren, Ruth gave her time and expertise to the costume department at Wrexham Museum and in organising exhibitions at the Ty Pawb Arts Centre. In Overton, she was involved with the preparations for the Overton Parade and Fete, in 2018 dressing our "local suffragettes" to accompany her 'Votes for Women' banner. In 2019 she was the lead in creating banners for the Twinning and for the Am Dram Associations, which now adorn the Parish Room and will be appreciated by future generations for years to come.

## Overton Wildlife

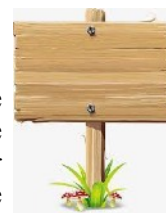
### Mini meadow update

Another summer is slowly slipping away, and it's once again time to cut and collect the hay from the mini meadows around the village. Small signs have appeared this year to show an encouraging shift in the meadows, towards becoming wilder and more thriving spaces. Yellow rattle, known as the meadow maker, has been found growing across all sites. This plant feeds off nutrients stolen from grasses, and therefore cuts back the amount of grass, allowing more space for wildflowers to thrive.

Many of the plug plants have also been seen slowly establishing themselves, with species such as betony, oxeye daisy and chicory all making an appearance. With another winter to grow and establish, hopefully, next year these patches of colour will spread even further. Other encouraging signs have been the wildlife making use of these spaces, from butterflies flitting through the long grass, to swallows swooping down to feed on the insects living in the meadows. While there may still be a way to go to get these spaces as wild and natural as they once were, it's great to see it's already making a difference to our local wildlife.

### Meadow signage Competition

In order to help to educate and engage more people in our work to create wildflower meadows in the village, we would like to put up some signage which includes pictures of the wildflowers we are growing. We are therefore launching a competition for wildflower pictures that we can include on our signs. If you are interested in entering, please draw a picture in any medium of one or more of the following wildflowers; wild carrot, common bird's-foot-trefoil, common knapweed, autumn hawkbit, lady's bedstraw, yellow rattle, red clover and field scabious. The best pictures will be displayed on our new signage, and the winners will receive some wildflower seeds for their own space.
