'Winslow Boy' a triumph

Was it the comfortable new chairs or was it the quality of the play and acting that meant there was no wriggling during the 4 acts of Overton Am Drams production of the "Winslow Boy"? Terrance Rattigan's play, set just before the first World War, shows middle-class society on the eve of disintegration. The author asks two pointed questions, firstly when does the quest for justice turns into an exercise in pride and self-interest, and secondly how does what's right differ from what justice demands?



First impressions of a professional set led the audience to rightly expect that they were in for a good evening. Sheila Miller's skilful direction led a strong cast. Alan Farley's fine portrayal of Mr Winslow supported by his protective 'wife' masterfully played by Joanne Kember, and their eldest son (Stephen Deyes) led the audience through an evening of quality drama. The pivotal figure in the story, Ronnie's suffragette sister, Catherine, was competently played by Roxanne Haynes. She sacrifices her fiancé (a convincing upper class twit played by Mike Done) to the family cause, but was doted on by ex-cricketer and squashed solicitor (Mervyn Haynes).

Stephen Sorfleet played a not surprisingly most convincing portrayal of the star barrister, Sir Robert Morton. The cast was supported by superb cameo performances by Cynthia Davies, David Hughes and most importantly the family stalwart, Violet the maid (Ann Kynaston). But the focus of the play was 'the boy' himself and Luke Haynes' excellent debut with the society was hopefully the first of many.

Whatever justice was achieved for the Winslow Boy, justice was certainly done by Overton Amateur Dramatic Society for Rattigan's play in its centenary production.

Ramblings From the Reverend by David Child



Eleven years ago I was lucky enough to be invited to attend a Medical Congress in Jerusalem. On the last day at the end of the conference I hailed a taxi and asked to be taken back to my hotel. The taxi driver asks if I've been to Bethlehem and then suggests that he can take me there. I think to myself can I trust this man? But it's the only chance I'll ever get. 'Take me to Bethlehem.'

So he gets on his mobile. We drive out along a desert road and through an Israeli and a Palestinian checkpoint and we soon reach the outskirts of Bethlehem. But then something very unnerving happens. He turns off the road on to a dirt track; he drives into a car park outside a run down supermarket, parks and turns off the engine. 'What are we doing here?' 'We are waiting.' 'What are we waiting for?' 'We wait for Palestinian taxi.' A few minutes and there's a Palestinian taxi. And so I go with the Palestinian taxi. The driver gets on his mobile. And we drive into Bethlehem. He stops his taxi, turns off his engine, someone opens my door. 'I am your Bethlehem guide, come with me'.

And so we walk through the streets to the Church of the Holy Nativity. I'm introduced to a priest and I'm shown around. The Church of the Holy Nativity is built on top of the cave where tradition has it Jesus was born and there's a way down into this cave from inside the church, but there's a long queue and it's late. My guide reassures me and takes me down through the exit.

I stand and watch. It's a small cave. People are coming down one flight of steps and leaving via the other. In the centre of the floor there's a silver star marking the exact spot where it's believed Jesus was born. Some people are bowing, some are kneeling, some are kissing the star. But it doesn't mean a thing to me. May be I'm anxious about getting home, no-one knows where I am.

And then my guide taps me on the shoulder. He tells me to look where no-one else is looking – into the dark recesses of the cave. And when my eyes get accustomed to the darkness I see it, a feeding trough, a manger hewn out of the solid rock. And I want to stay. After a few minutes my guide taps me on the shoulder again. 'You go home now, doctor'. And so I'm passed down the line like a parcel; Palestinian taxi, Israeli taxi, my hotel and early the next morning I'm on my flight back home.

COUNTRY BEAT by PCSO Stephen O'Connell

Winter is truly upon us! It'll soon be dark at 4pm. Before the snow and ice start it's an ideal time to check that your car is in top condition. Please carry out checks on tyres, oil, lights, etc. Make sure that you have a spare tyre in the event of a break down and it's a good idea to keep a torch in the car. When going out to work, the shops or taking the kids to school, I recommend taking a fully charged mobile phone in case of an emergency.

With Christmas just around the corner, Nth Wales Police will be carrying out our annual drink driver checks. Officers from our Roads Policing Unit will be out on a daily basis around Wrexham County Borough stopping cars and carrying out breath tests. I can't emphasise enough NOT to drink and drive over the festive period. Even one drink is maybe enough to put you over the limit. Always have a designated driver or arrange for taxis and lifts home for after the 'work's Christmas do' or 'a quick one down the pub'.

I would like to pass advice to the elderly people in the village to be wary of strangers knocking on your door. With the cold weather, these people may call to offer cheap double glazing, cheaper gas and electric, thermal loft insulation, etc. Whilst the majority of these will be legitimate, there are rogue people out there who will use these types of reasons to carry out distraction burglaries and rogue trader offences. Always ask for identification, refuse entry or contact the company they claim to be from to confirm their identity.

We have received several calls reporting anti-social behaviour regarding kids playing 'knock and run' or 'jack knock' around the village. It is not fair to disturb elderly people. Friendly words of advice were given at first but this has been ignored. In future, we will not be giving out friendly warnings but issuing yellow cards to all involved. The children will also be escorted home by the Police. If you ever need to speak to any of us at Overton station please do so on the numbers below.

90th Anniversary

This year the numbers who gathered at the Overton cenotaph, both at 11am on 11th November and on Remembrance Sunday, were most impressive.

This year was the 90th anniversary of the unveiling of the Overton cenotaph. In 1921 after negotiations, conducted mainly by Major Hugh Peel on the community's behalf between the local Council and Flintshire County Council, permission was given to erect a Memorial on land opposite the Church with the proviso it be 8 ft from the highway. At the same time it was decided to provide, at a cost of £113, a footpath and kerbing from the corner of Overton Hall (Willow Street) to the Rectory. Public subscriptions raised £170, and Ernest Jones whose premises were at the rear of the Cocoa and Reading Rooms, was commissioned to construct the Memorial.

The Unveiling and Dedication of the War Memorial took place on Thursday 10th November 1921 at 2.30pm. The ceremony included the children and teachers of Overton School plus a muster of ex-Servicemen led by Major Hugh Peel and Col. Lord Southwell of Knolton Hall, the local Foresters (Friendly Society) the parishioners, Inspector Owen Jones and the Maelor Constabulary and the relatives of the fallen,

The Service was conducted by Rev F.J.Okell; Rev G. Osborne and the Rev Harrop Williams. The MP for Flintshire, Lt. Col. T.H. Parry, DSO then unveiled the Memorial saying at the start of his address that it was a great privilege to be allowed to unveil a Memorial which expressed in permanent form the high regard, affection, and esteem, in which the memory of the men of Overton inscribed upon it were held in the parish.

Though sadly more names were to be added after 1945 it is good to know that Col Parry's words still hold true 90 years later.

Sponsor a chair?

We have seen many improvements to the Village Hall during the past year. But after a recent break-in to the Hall and the Library we must now consider installing CCTV. This year, in response to the requests of several regular users, our focus is to replace the stock of 180 chairs with comfortable, yet storable ones. We have taken delivery of 70 new chairs so far at a price to be held for a few months.

Overton Am Drams have given a substantial donation towards the first order and we have been fortunate to be promised a grant from the Community Chest thanks to the Community Council. Playgroup has indicated its intention to sponsor a chair (or two) and this article is a plea to other organisations, clubs, businesses and individuals to help us to reach our target for the purchase of all new chairs during the coming months. The cost of each chair including VAT is £30 which makes it a huge financial project. We then plan to re-cycle our existing stock of chairs within the community. Medical Practice

When you have blood tests please retain the paperwork given to you after the test. This will itemise which tests you have had taken. The tests are processed by the pathology department at the Maelor, sent back to us and then reviewed and commented upon by a clinician. You will **NOT** be rung up with the result of any blood tests, so please remember to ring the surgery after 5 working days, from 11am onwards, armed with your paperwork, to request the results. If there is a cause for concern over a particular result the doctor may decide to ring and have a word, or raise a prescription to deal with a problem.

Public Consultation on Overton public toilets

Dear Residents,

Wrexham County Borough Council are currently reviewing their **2012/13 budget** and are considering the closure of the public toilets located in Overton. They have approached Overton Community Council and requested that we consider taking over the running and maintenance of the toilets. Overton Community Council need to know your views as there will be an increase in your council tax charges should we proceed:

Below is a chart showing the current community council precept charge for residents of Overton (**Row 1**) based on the current tax base. **Row 2** shows the additional charge of running and maintaining the public toilets at the higher tax base of 685 for 2012/13.

Below are points you may wish to consider prior to making your decision.

- This is much valued service for members of the public travelling through Overton.
- These members of the public may use local shops and facilities.
- Should the public toilets close, the building may become unsightly/vandalised.
- There may be issues with people urinating outside the closed building.

If residents were in favour of Overton Community Council running the public toilets it would on the understanding that regular reviews of the running/maintenance costs would be carried out and should it prove too costly, residents will be consulted again. It is hoped that our estimated running costs would be lower than we have stated.

Closing date for this consultation is Monday 12th December 2011.
