Frank (age 92) is now in a care home in Canada but talks all the time of when he was a POW working on a farm near Overton and how he would like to find the family who were so kind to him.

Readers quickly identified the farm as Cloy Farm run by the Darlingtons, and Dave Austin even found photos of Hector Darlington's daughters Jill and Rachel, copies of which were sent off immediately to Canada. And then Jill got in touch and said she was willing to talk to Frank. Within hours she received a call from Canada and as you can see from the note (*below*) Frank and Jill had a long conversation.

Dear Editor,  
My father phoned Jill last evening and had a wonderful conversation. From what I over heard, they chatted like sixty years ago was like yesterday. I learned more about my father's life in fifteen minutes than in fifty years. Thank you for all your help and everyone that called Jill  
Darlington and the Overton Oracle.

Karl and his family had no knowledge that his father had been a German POW in WWII. He says that the knowledge helps to explain so many things in his parents life that he did not understand.

Cars are so filthy that we are ashamed to drive them, but also afraid to wash them just in case it's the dirt and the grime that's holding them together. No wonder then that some people experience what's called Seasonal Affective Disorder or 'Sad' as it's sometimes called.

Some people think that the Old Testament Book of Ecclesiastes must have been written in February. It makes for dismal reading. Its punch line is. 'Vanity, all is vanity' or in a more modern translation, 'Meaningless, everything is meaningless' – you get born, you live, you die and after a passage of time no one will remember that you even existed. You begin to wonder how a book like this got into the Bible in the first place – but I suppose it does make you think.

## COUNTRY BEAT

Hello, my name is Phil Jones and I would just like to take a moment to introduce myself as the new PCSO for Overton. I have been a PCSO in NWP for the past 4 years covering Gwersyllt, so moving to Overton is a complete change from what I am used to. However I am looking forward to the challenge of covering a rural location and being involved with community events. I am very much looking forward to meeting everyone in the village and I will be attending as many community events as possible so you can all get to know my face.

I'm glad to report no crime has been reported to NWP for the past month. But I do want all members of the community to report anything suspicious to either myself or my colleagues at Overton station, via the non-emergency number 101 or, in an emergency, 999. With your help we can continue to keep crime in the village low.

I've only been in the village a couple of weeks but already I've had a few people report issues to me. Dog fouling seems to be on the increase, especially outside people's homes. This is completely unacceptable and if caught, offenders will not be given a warning, they will be issued with a £75 fine. Fines can also be issued retrospectively, meaning that if someone has witnessed your dog fouling and reports it either to Wrexham Council on 01978 298989 or myself (see my contact details below), a £75 fine can still be issued. Please make sure you clean up after your dog. Overton is a beautiful village, please help to keep it so.

Car parking problems have also been passed to me. Double yellow lines have been painted in the village along Wrexham Road and Pen-y-Llan Street. Unfortunately, some people have ignored these new lines and I have witnessed vehicles park on the lines outside the pharmacy; in some cases blocking the whole path for people walking past. There are plenty of parking spaces in the Doctor's Surgery or public car park. Parking on the double yellow lines outside the pharmacy is not only illegal but also hazardous to other road users and increases the risk of road traffic collisions.

I was pleased to meet several of you at the Drop In session that was held on the 16th of January. I will be out around the village so feel free to come up to me and say hello. I am also available on the below numbers and email.
