

The Overton Oracle has reached 20 years of publishing the village's FREE newspaper; that is 240 editions, never missing a month!

The Newspaper was launched by Overton Community Council in January 1999. A request was made for suggestions for a name and from those submitted the 'Overton Oracle' was selected, and has remained the same ever since.

It was in November 2008 that the Oracle separated itself from the Community Council because of issues to comply with Codes of Conduct, although the OCC has continued to support the Oracle with grant aid ever since. The first colour edition was August 2009 and in November 2014 the Oracle launched its own website with editions always available in colour, an archive of old editions, and a month by month Gallery of village photos. And from feedback we know the Oracle is now read all over the world.

The Oracle is very grateful to Sandra and Steve at Business Print & Design who have supported the printing for many years. The Oracle is written and distributed by volunteers and it would not be possible without their generous commitment of time. And thank you to YOU, our readers and contributors, who send in the letters, the birthdays, the reports, the photos, the news - that for 20 years has made the Oracle OUR village newspaper.

Memories of Queensbridge

I am now 65 years old, soon to be retiring from social work. In the summer of 1963 when I was 8yrs old my mother Emily May and my 3 siblings Susan, Peter and baby David moved to Queensbridge Villa, rented from farmer Mr Evans who lived in the adjoining farm house. There was also Queensbridge Manor that was home to an elderly lady who liked gin and little dogs.

My childhood memories of living at Queensbridge Villa and attending Overton Primary school, albeit just for a couple of years, are happy ones. Mr Evans was a kind man, helping my mother furnish the house from a local auction rooms. I remember he had very rosy cheeks and smelt of cows. We liked him.

My mother was a widow. There was no support for single parents in those days, her income was made up of War Widows pension, Child Allowance and our pocket money sent weekly from grandparents. It was

mainly my older sister Susan (12 yrs old) who would go on the bus once a week to Overton Post Office and collect weekly grocery essentials. We had lovely days playing inside and outside of the house. We picked apples from the orchard and had a den in the old dairy building. We enjoyed the company of Mr Evens son who was of similar age to my sister. I recall lots of snow and a cold winter. Coal and logs were delivered to the cellar underneath our house and it was the children's job to fill up the coal scuttle. I remember me and my brother Peter using the farm hand cart to collect logs from down the lane when the lorry could not drive up to the house due to ice and snow.

The sitting room seemed enormous to me with a beautiful fire place and big windows. Fire lit and Christmas tree lights on, the room was transformed. We made gifts out of felt as opposed to buying Christmas presents to post to my grandparents. My mother sold her fur collar coat for £5 and that bought the tree and food for Christmas.

Times were hard however my mother was a good cook and we had a weekly staple diet. One day lentil soup made with bacon bones from an Overton butcher (we had to ask for bones for the dog) another day baked potatoes or beans on toast, not forgetting boiled farm eggs and lots of hot buttered toast or crumpets, never margarine. I recall walking down a pathway, sitting on the bench where milk churns were picked up, waiting for the old school bus to take me and Peter to Overton Primary school - now demolished. My teacher was very proud of a miniature model of the school in our classroom. On Wednesdays a lady turned up in a bubble car and took me and Susan to the Girls Guildry in Overton.

The Beatles featured in the news and I remember a Beatles night in Overton where we all dressed up as the Beatles. Our unpractised miming and tennis racket 'guitars' gained us last place. One morning in the summer of 1964 out of the blue my mother asked us if we would you like to go to school that day or go back to Plymouth. Needless to say we were back in Plymouth that very night but that is another story. I have happy memories of our short time at Queensbridge Villa. We were real 'Railway Children' without the railway of course. The experience of living at Queensbridge Villa and living next door to a farm was incredible. My mother taught me to embrace change and enjoy adventures on the way.

Home Security

INSPIRING WOMEN

Frank Howard 1900 - 1919

Although World War I finished in November 1918, soldiers continued to die. 100 years ago this month Frank Howard, age 18, died in Overton.

He was born Francis Arthur C Howard, the son of Arthur and Annie Howard. They had 2 children, Frank b1900 and Mabel b1906. Frank was born in Newmarket where his father worked in the racing stables. By 1901 the family were living at Adderbury near Banbury where Arthur was a groom to noted racehorse breeder Major James Larnach whose horse Jeddah won the Derby at 100-1 in 1898, and also won at Ascot. But soon after the Howard family moved to Overton, living in Penyllan Street in the cottage immediately to the left of Gwydir House, with father Arthur working as Stud Groom for Major Hugh Peel at Bryn y Pys. When a lodge came available the family moved to Argoed Lane to be closer to the stables.

Major Hugh Peel was also a racehorse breeder and in 1910 gave his Stud Groom Howard one of his young horses which one presumes he saw no hope for. The horse was called Poethlyn. Arthur Howard then sold the horse to Reg Parry of the Black Lion Hotel, Ellesmere for £5. Mr Parry then sold him to Mr Davenport of Whitchurch Farm, Alkington for £7 where he stayed for 4 years, and so the story goes, was used as a milk horse. In about 1915 Major Peel's wife Gwladys, bought Poethlyn back to the Bryn y Pys stables for £50.

On leaving Overton School it is likely Frank worked for his father at the stables but on reaching his 18th birthday in the spring of 1918 he was conscripted, Private/Trumpeter 20823/10823 a Bugler in the Welsh Horse 9th Lancers 1st Reserve Regiment. This was just as Poethlyn won the 1918 Grand National held, because it was war time, at Gatwick airport.

But before the war ended in the following November Frank became ill and he died on 24th January 1919 from Cerebral Spinal Meningitis having had 3 previous attacks. He was only 18 years old.

It was just 9 weeks later that Poethlyn won the 1919 Grand National. at Aintree. Major Peel invited the artist Alfred Munnings to Bryn y Pys to paint Poethlyn with, on the left of the painting, the groom, probably Arthur Howard. A time that should have been celebration but Arthur had just buried his only son.

Frank is buried in Overton Cemetery; his grave says 'GOD TAKES OUR LOVED ONES FROM OUR HOMES, BUT NEVER FROM OUR HEARTS!'. Frank is also remembered on Overton War Memorial.

With 35 years management experience don't expect him to fail. He has spent December stocking up and organising the business so that from January he will be operating his normal hours, 5.30am to 11pm seven days a week.

Remembrance Day

On November 11th, 100 years after the end of World War I, Overton remembered all those who gave their lives in that conflict. The turnout included the Royal British Legion supported by Overton Scout Group, Brownies, St Mary's School, The Community Council and Police. Wreaths for the Royal British Legion were laid by Major Ivan Osborne and his daughter, Private Danielle Osborne and by Mark Kelly, veteran of The Household Division of the Guards and John Wall, a serving MOD Fireman, who laid a wreath in memory of those who died in Iraq & Afghanistan. The number of villagers was the largest for some years and the Church was packed for the Service of Remembrance. In Church the Act of Remembrance was highlighted by members of the Scout Group planting named crosses, for everyone who died in both World Wars as their names were read out by the Legion. The crosses have now been placed behind the stones at the Cenotaph, placed there by the children of the village. The Legion thanks everyone who took part and attended. The Poppy Appeal raised a total of £3247 including a £500 donation from Branch funds.
