The new Rector was getting bogged down with administration. The Ro-

man Catholic Deacon and the Methodist Lay Preacher felt sorry for him and they wondered how they could cheer him up. Perhaps at this stage, I should reassure you that, 'all characters in this story are fictitious and any resemblance to real persons, living or dead is purely coincidental'.

Anyhow the Deacon and the Lay Preacher were keen fishermen and they decided to ask the Rector if he'd like to join them on a fishing trip. Although he had never fished before the Rector was pleased to accept their kind offer and the following Saturday there they were fishing from a little boat in the middle of the lake. After a while the Roman Catholic Deacon said 'I'm cold, I'll go back and get a sweater'. He got out of the boat, walked across the water and returned with his sweater. Soon the Methodist Lay Preacher said, 'This bait's no good, I'll go and get some more'. He climbed out of the boat and walked across the water and returned with the bait. The new Rector wasn't going to let the others think they had more faith than him, so he said, 'I'm getting hungry, I'll go and fetch my sandwiches.' He climbed out and started to sink – glug, glug, glug! As they hauled him out, the Roman Catholic Deacon said to the Methodist Lay Preacher, 'Perhaps we should have told him about the stepping stones'

Do you remember the story of Jesus walking on the water? The disciples had gone fishing, all night long their boat had been battered by a storm, but early in the morning Jesus comes walking towards them across the water. He calls out, 'Don't be afraid, it's me.' Peter asks if he too can walk on the water. He gets frightened and begins to sink, but Jesus holds him up and when they get back into the boat there is peace and the disciples realise that Jesus is the Son of God.

You'll miss the point of this story if you concentrate on trying to work out what exactly happened and don't ask what it means. Justin Welby in his first sermon as Archbishop of Canterbury tells us that what this story means is that each one of us needs to listen to Jesus and to 'get out of the boat and go to Him.' That means getting out of our comfort zone, taking risks, speaking and acting as Jesus wants us to. Every time we leave the comfort of our own traditions and places, every time we go into the waves and reach out for the hand of Jesus, the world slowly but surely changes for the better.

Hi, welcome to this month's Beat Report

I've no doubt that you heard the Police Force Helicopter overhead recently. Times like this are very scarce in the village, however on this occasion there was a requirement for it. You may have heard in the press that 2 vehicles were entered that were parked near the Bangor Road area of Overton. A male was seen in the area wearing a balaclava, he ran off and a thorough search of the area was carried out, unfortunately on this occasion he was not found. You can rest assured that the Police response to these incidents is very swift, the Force helicopter only takes minutes to arrive at Overton if such incidents happen in the future. Officers are despatched immediately, including the dog section if required. However, as I say, these incidents are very rare and this occasion was big news as it doesn't happen here very often.

I keep going back to personal security of your homes, vehicles, sheds, garages etc. Make sure you take necessary steps to secure your property, make sure if you have remote central locking that you remember to lock your cars, these remotes are very good these days so you won't even have to leave the house to lock your vehicle. As it gets a bit warmer people leave windows open in their homes. Remember if you go out to lock your windows; don't make it easy for offenders!

I again have noticed vehicles travelling too fast through the village, especially on Station Road past the Police Station towards Penley! The problem of speeding motor bikes through the village has increased with the recent nice weather. They <u>will</u> get caught and <u>will</u> get dealt with accordingly.

Anti-Social behaviour has stopped so that's very positive, let's keep it that way.

PCSO Stephen O'Connell has now moved to another area to serve, I would like to thank Steve for all his hard work in the area and wish him good luck in the new patch. We have a new PCSO starting at Overton Station. Her name is Robina Ahmed who is transferring from Wrexham Town. I've no doubt she will witness a big difference with Rural policing, however, I'm sure she will fit in well with the Overton Policing team. Robina will be covering Cross Lanes, Bangor on Dee, Worthenbury, Tallarn Green, Bronington and sub hamlets in-between.



Rag Rugging is an old skill that has been used for hundreds of years to turn old, unwanted textiles into hard-wearing, decorative rugs. It was particularly popular in the UK in the 19th and early 20th centuries, when most people could not afford to buy carpets or rugs and needed to make their own floor coverings.

Today the tradition of Rag Rugging is being kept alive by craftspeople, who use the technique to make decorative wall hangings as well as rugs.
