PEDALLING TO LA MURETTE

This July we are off to La Murette on our bicycles. We start the ride in Overton and legs permitting will cover the 750 miles to La Murette to arrive at the same time as the rest of the group who are travelling by plane. The main purpose of the ride is to raise funds for the Overton & La Murette Twinning Association and The Rainbow Centre, Penley.

- The Rainbow Centre has been housed for over 10 yrs in make-do accommodation dating from World War II. Now, thanks to the tireless efforts of the local community, a rebuilding programme to provide modern facilities has been started. The centre provides an excellent service for the infirm and elderly from our area. Funds have been tight and hard-won so all contributions will make a real difference in ensuring a comfortable and stimulating environment in the new building.
- Our Twinning Association is celebrating its 15th Anniversary this year. Thanks to the foresight of the Community Council, our village extended the hand of friendship to a similar community in S.E. France in the early 90's. All residents of Overton Parish are automatically members of the Association. We feel that encouraging positive attitudes between our two countries is of vital importance and the many strong links and friendships that have been formed over the years are a testament to this ethos.

We ourselves are entitled to bus passes (just!) but these will be locked away out of reach for the duration, so every mile will be covered under our own steam. Every single penny that you pledge will be divided equally between these two local causes. We'll be at the Village Fete on 27th June with our bikes and equipment, so come and check us out. COUNTRY BEAT by Constable Luke Hughes

We welcome a new addition to your local neighbourhood policing team, PCSO 2909 Jemma White has taken the place of Jenna Owen who left to become a Police Constable a few months ago. Jemma's arrival brings us up to full strength and I wish Jemma luck in her new role and I'm sure you will all make her feel welcome when you see her out and about.

I'm pleased to report that a good number of residents took the time to complete last months questionnaire in the Oracle and a meeting has been held to review the results. The Community Council and Local Police team hope to update the community on this matter soon.

Inspector Lisa SurrIDGE, District Inspector for the South Wrexham Area writes

The Evening Leader recently carried out a poll which revealed 70 per cent of people think that crime is a problem in the Borough. I am concerned that some people living in my policing area may have similar concerns. National news and media can also distort the perception of crime. It is important that people in the area I serve are aware of the facts about crime and the challenges to delivering policing in such a large and diverse region, so that they may form a balanced opinion of how safe they feel.

Following an increase of crime in the first half of last year in Sth Wrexham, a dedicated and structured response saw crime begin to fall. This trend has continued so that overall crime has reduced by 15% compared to this time last year. Similarly we are detecting more crime, at our year end in April we had detected 35% of all crime which contributed to Nth Wales Police being one of the top performing forces in the UK. This year we have increased the number of crimes detected by 8.5%, an improvement I will endeavour to sustain & improve on throughout the area. Performance would be higher still but for victims who choose not to support a prosecution.

The Sth Wrexham area covers 150 sq miles with a population of approximately 41,500. It is largely rural with several large suburban towns and villages, plus iconic landmarks and attractions. Balancing the needs of our rural and suburban communities is very important which is why we have Neighbourhood Policing Teams dedicated to responding to the needs of you as an individual. Through continued consultation with your community council and elected members Overton is well covered. The Maelor also borders West Mercia and Cheshire and officers from all three areas patrol the borders throughout the night on the lookout for travelling criminals. This is just one example of our activity which often goes unseen but contributes to making Wrexham South a safe place to live, work and visit.

OVERTON MEDICAL PRACTICE

The Easter stork arrived on 8th April with a baby girl 'Neha' for Doctor Sreeram. Both mum and baby are doing well and we send all our good wishes. Dr Myres has been appointed the Assistant Medical Director at Wrexham Local Health Board, a temporary post as the board will cease to function from October 2009 when all be merged into Betsi Cadwaladr University Local Health Board covering the whole of Wales. Obviously we are very proud of him and congratulate him on the appointment, but it does mean that he will not be able to do routine surgeries from May to October. His patients will be advised to see one of the other doctors in the practice in his absence and the situation will be re-visited in October as to what the future holds.

He wanted to see what the castle **looked like, so an artist drew a picture for him. When Thomas Seymour died he didn't have any family** to leave the castle to, so it was sold for just £5,000.

We learnt that the servants ate and drank from plates and mugs made out of leather or wood while Thomas Myddelton and his guests ate from pewter & silver plates and goblets. Then it was time for us to be lords and ladies, we went to the Long Gallery which was used for parties. The children would play in there if the weather was bad outside and we played with toys that Tudor children used to play with.

After we had eaten our lunch we went to the beautiful garden. We had a wonderful time playing in the magnificent grounds. When we went back to the castle we were shown a big hole in the ground which was the well. We went to a tower and saw holes above us which people used to drop things down - they were called murder holes! Then we went down to the dungeon!! It was very scary!! After that we were allowed to try on the armour that was used in battles and we also pretended to fire the cannon! It was nearly time for our day to come to an end, but before that we were allowed to dress up in rich Tudor clothes, we looked very grand! We made posies which the Tudors carried to try to take away bad smells. We also had a look at leeches, these were used in Tudor times to suck blood out of people who were ill to try to make them better. It was then time to go. We made our final visit of the day to the gift shop before getting on the bus to go back to school. I had an amazing day at Chirk Castle and I **can't wait to go again.**
