Seeds from St Mary's

Are you taking a holy-day? This is the time of year when people start to plan or even to take their holidays, a break from routine and a change of scenery. Aren't we fortunate? For many of us it is something we take for granted, but I remember the struggle we had to afford holidays when our children were young, and for members of our farming community, as well as for other self-employed people, it can be very difficult to get away.

Even in this secular age, times of holiday are linked with the Christian calendar and originated as holy days. In France, where we have spent many family holidays, Easter and Christmas are marked with holidays, as in the UK, but so are Ascension Day (a Thursday) and Pentecost – which sometimes caught us out when supermarkets were shut on those days. It's a reminder that in the past the only time that working people had to rest and to celebrate was when it was a holy day – and on a Sunday, the Christian 'Sabbath'.

In the first book of the Bible, the creation story reminds us of the importance of Sabbath, taking rest (even God puts his feet up once a week!); in the New Testament, Jesus participated in a pilgrimage to Jerusalem when he was a boy and took part in the Passover celebrations in the days before his death.

Modern life cuts across the religious rhythm of work and worship that has been the tradition in many cultures for thousands of years. We seem to have lost the fight to keep Sunday special and one of the challenges for our churches is to consider how we can meet the needs of people for whom Sunday morning is no longer an appropriate time to worship or to meet for fellowship. But all of us need to take time out; moments in the day, for prayer and reflection; weekly encounters with our living God; and rest – on weekly Sabbath days and at other holiday times.

If you are taking holiday in the next few months, can you make that time holy? Perhaps you enjoy visiting churches or other holy sites when you are away; perhaps the countryside or the beach create a sense of peace and God's presence in you. Why not use this holiday season to enrich your spiritual life?

Crisp packet recycling

Crisp packet recycling has long been a difficult subject. As crisp packets are made from a metal and plastic composite they cannot be recycled at the kerbside. However a recent campaign against Walkers has brought about a new recycling scheme through Terracycle. Through this scheme individuals can sign up via the Terracycle website to collect packets and post them in bulk to the recycling plant, raising money for a charity of their choice by the number of crisp packets they send in. The Overton Wildlife Group is setting up a crisp packet collection point at the Cheese Vending Machine, where villagers can drop off their empty packets. These packets will be sent off in bulk to raise money for the North Wales Wildlife Trust to carry out vital conservation work.

Playground Bug Hotel

To compliment the mini meadow created in the playground, which benefits insects by allowing more flowers to bloom in the area, a bug hotel will be created for insects to live and hibernate in. The structure has been made of reclaimed wood donated by people in the village. We are now looking for donations of old bamboo canes, old plastic pipes (of varying sizes) and roofing felt to add to the structure before it goes up in the park. The last two WWI names remembered on Overton War Memorial

The last two Overton men who died as a result of World War I, passed away one hundred years ago this month, in June 1919.

Joseph William Wainwright 1894 – 1919

Joseph was born in 1894 in Overton. His family were father, Nathan Wainwright, a gardener and mother Eliza, with children Joseph b1894, James b1896 and 2 other children who died young. In 1901 they were living in Salop Road in a cottage 4 houses to the left of the Bryn y Pys pub. By 1911 they had moved to a cottage in Lightwood Green, Nathan was by now a woodman and Joseph and James were working as clerks on the railway, presumably at Overton-on-Dee station as their cottage is listed in Station Road, 3 houses away from the stationmaster's house.

Joseph enlisted on 10 May 1915 at Aberystwyth, age 21. He was Private 48939 in the 17th Royal Welsh Fusiliers. In the army he was known as John. In May 1916 Joseph had spent 7 days in a camp hospital with scabies but on 7th October 1916 he was sent to France.

In 1917 the Battalion was in action in the Third Battle of Ypres and in August 1917 Joseph received a gunshot wound in his right leg. He was in hospital and was then granted leave to the UK (presumably to Overton) 26 Nov to 5 Dec 1917. In April 1918 he was promoted to Lance Corporal. In 1918 the Battalion were in action on the Somme. On 31st August Joseph was wounded again. By 12th September 1918 Joseph was admitted to the 3rd Northern General Hospital, Wharnciffe War Hospital, Sheffield, with gunshot wounds which caused wasting of the right arm and little movement. He had also experienced gas poisoning and was found to have Pulmonary Tuberculosis. He was discharged from hospital and the army on 14 February 1919. Joseph came home to Overton but died on the 4th June 1919 and was buried in Overton Cemetery on 17th June 1919. His gravestone says

IN / LOVING MEMORY / OF / CORPL J. W. WAINWRIGHT / 17TH BATTALION /
ROYAL WELSH FUSILIERS / AGED 25 YEARS / BELOVED SON OF /
NATHAN AND ELIZA WAINWRIGHT / DIED 4TH JUNE 1919 /

FROM WOUNDS RECEIVED IN ACTION / AT ALBERT, FRANCE ON 31ST AUG 1918 /
FOR HONOUR, LIBERTY AND TRUTH / THE SACRIFICED IN GLORIOUS DEATH
[and below the details of the burials of his parents]. He is also remembered on Overton War Memorial.



Alfred Roberts 1882 - 1919

The last man to die as a result of World War I, and to be remembered on Overton War Memorial, was Alfred Roberts. Alfred was born in Overton in 1882, the son of Alfred Roberts b1850 farm labourer and his wife Sarah b1840, both born in Overton. Their children were George b1869, John b1873, Sarah b1876, Ellen b1878, Alfred b1882 and the family lived in a cottage in Back Lane (now called Church Road). By the 1901 census Alfred age 18 had left home and was living at the Boat Inn, Erbistock where he was ostler/groom. His father was now a road-mender and with his wife had moved to live in a cottage on Salop Road; son George, his wife and their children also lived with them. Like many young men at the time Alfred must have seen no future in horse transport and sought a job with the railways, possibly starting at Overton-on-Dee station.

Alfred married Catherine Roberts b1886 (from Minera) in 1905 and their children were Alfred b1906, John Edgar b1907, Winifred b1910 and George b1911. By 1906 the family had moved to Crewe where all the children were born. By 1911 the family were living at 2 Wood Street, Crewe, close to Crewe Station where Alfred was a Railway Goods Porter.

Alfred enlisted on the 1st September 1914 shortly after war was declared, No.274910, 10th Royal Welsh Fusiliers. He was promoted to Lance Corporal and went to France on 27th September 1915 till 2nd June 1916. However, he continually suffered from ill health, from 'myalgia' (muscle pains) and was in and out of the Field Hospital from 1915 – 1916 and it seems that by then he had contracted T.B.

He was before the Medical Board at Worcester. "He states that he was admitted to Napsbury Hospital in July 1916 for Bronchitis remaining an inpatient for 2 months & was recommended for substitution in Category Cii but was eventually transferred (15th May 1917) to 424 Agricultural Co. at this Depot." He was said to have developed Rheumatism after coming out of the trenches, so was removed to the base and invalided to the UK on the 3rd June 1916. He also had Bronchitis and Asthma every winter. He was in camp from June to September then Knowsley Park and transferred to Heaton Park Manchester on the 22nd November 1916.

He was discharged on the 24th November 1917 because of a disability "aggravated by ordinary Military Service". It is presumed he was too ill to return to his old job and that he came back to Overton, living in a cottage on Tanners Row, Bangor Road. Alfred died from consumption/TB on 27th June 1919 age 36.

Alfred was buried with his parents on 1st July 1919 in Overton Cemetery, Plot A304 which is an unmarked grave but Alfred is remembered on Overton War Memorial.
