Seeds from St Mary's with Rev'd. Peter Mackriell



Soon after I came to Overton, I learned of the historic visit by Her Majesty the Queen - in July 1992 - to mark the 700th anniversary of the granting of a Charter by King Edward I. Memories of that visit, thirty years ago, are still vivid - and the photos show what a splendid occasion it was. Of course, like all royal visits, it was necessarily brief. Her Majesty had other places on her itinerary, and everything was timed to the minute. After all the planning, it was soon over. Just the memories remain - but, in this Jubilee year, it is good to know that we have this link with the Queen.

One of the things that has sustained Her Majesty, throughout her remarkable reign of seventy years, is her Christian faith. Part of her job description as monarch is to be 'Defender of the Faith', as Supreme Governor of the Church of England, but Queen Elizabeth also has a clear personal faith. As she said in her Christmas broadcast in December 2000: 'For me the teachings of Christ and my own personal accountability before God provide a framework in which I try to lead my life.'

It is the Christmas story, so familiar to us all, that reminds us that we have been visited by a monarch. At the heart of the Christian faith is the belief that the King of Heaven once came to visit us - and continues to reign in the hearts of lives of millions of people throughout the world. In the person of Jesus, God came to earth, to live as one of us, experiencing a human life with all its vulnerability and pain, as well as sharing in our joys. His time with us was all-too-short - measured in years, not minutes, but ending in a tragic death. And yet the life of Jesus has continued to make a powerful impact on every generation since - and in the lives of both the poor and the privileged.

I spoke to someone recently who had received an email from the Queen - or from her office, I imagine. After her visit to Overton, a letter of thanks was sent on her behalf. We can communicate with our monarch - and the King of Heaven also invites us to contact him. We can read his words in the Bible, as Her Majesty does, and we can also bring him our personal concerns in prayer.

As we give thanks for the reign of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II - and remember her visit 30 years ago - may we also follow her example of faithful prayer, submission to God's will for our lives, and the service of others.

Overton Recreational Football Club's Home match, May 18th. against Cefn Mawr Rangers was the subject of a football groundhopper's blog.

"This was a very entertaining match throughout with plenty of chances for both teams, and although it took an hour for the first goal to be scored, there was plenty of good football to enjoy before then.

The first half was a very competitive affair with lots of hard but fair tackles coming in from both sides. The quality of football on show was also good to watch and was a great advert for this level of Welsh football.

Overton opened the scoring on 61 minutes with the impressive Massey placing a low shot underneath the away goalkeeper, after some very good build up play. It was 2-0 just 3 minutes later when the number 13 for Overton fired in a great left footed shot from a tight angle into the far corner of the goal. Cefn Mawr rolled their sleeves up and got back into the game on 65 minutes when a cross from the left was turned into his own net by Nelson. The away side were now sniffing a chance of getting back into the game, but their efforts went unrewarded, due to some excellent goalkeeping by McAndrew for the home team.

Overton made it 3-1 in the 84th minute through Mottershead and then wrapped the game up in the second minute of injury time, courtesy of a second goal by Massey.

A fantastic night at the football! Groundhopping is a brilliant hobby, it's nights like this that really back up that statement."

The Platinum Jubilee Pudding

JEMMA'S LEMON SWISS ROLL AND AMARETTI TRIFLE

Although the National winner, Jemma, made a beautiful complicated pudding for the judges of the Platinum Jubilee pudding competition, she has kindly produced an easy version, using ready-made versions for most of the components.

Make the Swiss rolls or buy and spread with extra bought lemon curd. Slice into 1" slices and place upright around the bottom edge of trifle dish. Slice thicker slices to line the base of the dish, ensuring the top is roughly the same level as the slices that line the edge; use off-cuts to fill any gaps. Pour 1 pint lemon jelly over the Swiss roll layer and put in the fridge till set, approx. 3 hours. When set pour over 500ml/18fl oz custard, then arrange a layer of amaretti biscuits.

To make the chunky mandarin coulis, strain two 300g tins of mandarins. Discard the juice and put the fruit into a saucepan with 45g/1 $\frac{3}{4}$ oz sugar and heat gently until broken down. Remove from the heat. In a small bowl, slake 2 sachets of arrowroot with 2 tablespoons cold water then add to the warm mandarins. Add the juice from half a lemon and mix well before pouring into a large bowl. Strain two more tins of mandarins and add the fruit to the bowl then leave to cool completely.

Pour over the mandarin coulis. In a large bowl, whip 600ml/20fl oz double cream until soft peaks form then spoon this over the coulis. Decorate with crumbled amaretti biscuits, mixed peel and 50g/1 $\frac{3}{4}$ oz white chocolate chunks.



Bellringing News

Since my last update in March the St Mary's bell ringers have been very busy. Covid restrictions have disappeared, and everything seems to be back to normal.

Sunday morning ringing continues with either 4 or 5 in the band, and Tuesday evening practice has returned 6.30-7.30pm. Some of you may have noticed that in the last couple of weeks practice began at 6.15pm with only one bell ringing. Pauline, our new ringer, has been learning how to ring a bell up and then ring a bell down.

Let me explain. When we arrive to ring, the bells are 'down' with the mouth of the bell facing downward. The first thing we need to do is ring the bell 'up' with the angle of swing gradually increased until the bell is swinging full circle when it can be balanced mouth upwards on the wooden stay, known as being 'set' (see image). When we have finished ringing, we ring the bells down again, with the angle of swing gradually decreasing until the bell mouth is downward. This is for safety reasons in churches where ringers are on the ground floor, and especially in St Mary's where ringing takes place in the entrance.

If the bells are silent on a Tuesday evening it will mean the practice has been moved to another tower. In May, I was in York with work and joined the practice at York Minster which has 12 bells. Others joined a North Wales Association branch practice St Mary's church, Mold which has 8 bells. On the first Sunday of each month ringers from across North Wales ring on 10 bells in St Giles Parish church, Wrexham.

Overton's other Jubilee celebrations

In the 19th century Overton celebrated 2 Jubilees of Queen Victoria. In 1887 it was Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee and a new pump was built to provide fresh water for the residents of the Station Road and Penyllan Street. It's still there, just to the right of Ego Xcentric hairdressers. (see picture right)

In 1897 Queen Victoria celebrated her Diamond Jubilee and Overton threw a party!

Tuesday 22 June 1897 was a great day of celebration in the village -

"Our festival began on the 60th anniversary of the Queen's accession when the morning and evening services consisted of special prayers and hymns, rendered with great heartiness by the Choir and whole congregation. Tuesday was a day of rejoicing with 'Queens weather' - perfect! with a display of flags, ringing of church bells etc. At 2pm nearly 200 children assembled at the schools. Here they were met by Mr Peel and the Misses Peel who gave each child a Jubilee mug, and with Jubilee medals given by the Misses Peel and Mrs Maude.

A procession then formed and with banners flying and singing, they marched through the village to the Cricket Field where they partook of an ample tea of the usual good things. During the afternoon there was a very large gathering of parishioners and visitors. The Ladies Committee managed the teas both for children and adults, the Sports Committee carried out their programme and Miss Peel distributed the prizes to the winners of the various sports. Dancing to the strains of Mr Morris' band was kept up till 9.30pm, when a cosy happy and successful day was brought to a close."

"The ladies who had charge of the Jubilee festivities managed so economically that there is a balance left of £10. This will be used to erect a lamp over the door of the Cocoa House".

(see picture above) It was fueled by gas and later changed to electricity - and it is still there.

I wonder what legacy the 2022 Platinum Jubilee will leave Overton to be talked about 100 years hence?



St Mary's School - Hurrah! School Trips are Back!

Following two years of restrictions due to the pandemic, school trips are now back with a bang at St Mary's. It's been an exciting time for pupils this half-term, with a variety of trips for several classes.

Year 1 and 2 embarked upon a trip to Liverpool Museum, travelling across the Mersey on the colourful ferry, Snowdrop. Children explored the fantastic resources on offer and took part in a workshop looking at a painting by Welsh artist Ben Johnson. Ben Johnson was commissioned to create 'The Liverpool Cityscape' for the Capital of Culture year in 2008 and spent more than three years painting the cityscape. They visited The People's Republic gallery feature windows to appreciate the stunning views of the waterfront. The children were encouraged to spot some of the buildings from the painting and there was an opportunity for the children to pose in front of a life-size replica Liver Bird, which is 5.5 metres tall! The session finished with a fun craft activity where children created an artwork inspired by a building in Liverpool to take back to school. It was a fantastic day and Mrs Richards and Mrs Lawrenson are hugely grateful to our volunteer



helpers who made the trip possible.

Year 5 took a step back in time to the Victorian era when they visited Blists Hill Living Musuem in Ironbridge. To help pupils fully immerse in the period, they dressed in typical Victorian clothes and took part in an authentic school lesson, complete with a strict and very scary Victorian school mistress. The class said they were terrified by her! But it was all in the name of fun and learning, and they had a fabulous day.

Year 6 went on a thrilling, week-long residential to Conover Hall near Shrewsbury. It was a fun, action-packed week with lots of fulfilling activities such as kayaking, climbing and abseiling. We had

an amazing but tiring week with five activities per day. Year 6 pupil, Gwendolyn, told us her favourite activities were Aerial Trek and Laser Conquest, as well as the Silent Disco. She added: "The food was brilliant and my favourite meal was the tomato and basil pasta." The whole class would agree that the entire trip, including food and accommodation was excellent. We all shared dorms and loved playing together in our free time! Everyone had a brilliant time and have come back to school feeling boosted with confidence. This trip really helped us bond as a class before we head to High School.
