The Jubilee Working Party is delighted to be able to announce the outline plans for Overton's community celebrations over the forthcoming Queen's Platinum Jubilee. This is a once in a lifetime event so we hope that as many people in the community as possible will join in the fun!

It will start on Thursday 2nd June with a Beacon Ceremony, the lighting of which forms the official commencement to what will be 4 days of merriment and celebration. This is just the outline - we'll be announcing more details nearer the time!

On Friday 3rd June and following the fantastic success of last year's 'Fete Lite', we're delighted to announce the return of Overton's Street Market! Again, more details of the Street Market and especially how to book your stalls will be announced soon - look out for announcements on Facebook and OCC's website.

Saturday's activities will be in the Village Hall, commencing with a children's party in the afternoon, followed by a dance in the evening featuring music from all the decades of the Queen's reign. We're still working on the details, but we can foresee hog roasts, games and merriment aplenty on the horizon!

The four day fiesta will end on Sunday 5th with The Big Community Picnic on the Football pitch. This will be a bigger and better version of last year's community picnic at Fete Lite. Some may just like to bring rugs, others might want to go the whole hog with gazebos ... it's up to you. Raffle tickets will have been on sale throughout the four day fiesta and the winners will be drawn towards the end of the picnic, at which point the organised festivities will draw to a close.

Refurbishment of Overton Village Hall

Over the last four months, you may have noticed contractors working in and around the Overton Village Hall. The Trustees have commissioned local trades to undertake works, following a buildings condition survey which identified numerous sections of the structure that required urgent maintenance for the preservation and conservation of the buildings. As both the inside and outside of the buildings had not been decorated for some time, the Trustees took the opportunity to refresh the decoration at the

Musings from the Manse

My wife Lisa and I have both spent the last couple of weeks self-isolating at the Manse in Llangollen. I came down with Covid first, without ever being sure where or how I managed to pick it up, and Lisa followed soon afterwards. We both had similar symptoms – headaches, sore throats and bad colds – but nothing too serious or unbearable, mainly thanks to the fact that we've both been double-vaccinated and boosted. We remember having to wait for over an hour in pouring rain outside Plas Madoc Leisure Centre a few months ago to get our booster jabs, but we're so glad that we did and we're grateful, once again, for our NHS and the way it looks after us.

The Biblical book of Hebrews begins by describing what God has done for us in Christ and then asks us in chapter two, "How shall we escape if we ignore so great a salvation?" It's a Bible verse that has been referenced in any number of stories and sermon illustrations. One involves a man who is trapped on the roof of a burning building. He prays for help and the Lord tells him to have faith, saying, "Don't be afraid, I will rescue you." A few minutes later a helicopter arrives, but the man refuses to get on board saying, "I don't need you! The Lord is going to rescue me." Of course we can see that the helicopter was God's way of rescuing the man, but he was expecting something much more unusual and miraculous, and so he missed his chance to get away.

We are each blessed in a million ways, and it's important that we acknowledge God's goodness and gratefully accept the help he offers us, remembering that God's help can come to us in all kinds of unexpected ways. I think the coronavirus vaccine is one example of that – a gift from God that is to be received with thanks. But even more importantly let's remember that God offers us eternal life as a free gift through Jesus Christ. It's an offer of salvation almost too good to be true. We don't have to earn it or deserve it, we simply have to gratefully receive it because God himself has done the hard work and paid the price. That I think is the real point of those words from Hebrews, "How shall we escape if we ignore so great a salvation?"

Never call the number on their I.D card to check them out. Ask the salesperson to wait outside, shut the door and find the company number on the internet; if they're genuine they'll understand.

Wildlife in March

Bird nesting - Did you know that some species of birds, such as rock pigeons, nest all year round? So when we talk about 'bird nesting season', what is meant is the time of year when the most species are likely to be nesting. Some species may start earlier or finish later, particularly depending on the weather conditions. Bird nesting season is generally said to run from the 1st April till 31st August. This is when we need to be very careful to not disturb nesting birds, by avoiding cutting back hedges or clearing dense vegetation such as bramble.

If clearance does need to happen it's necessary to survey the area to make sure there are no existing nests. For most of us the joys of watching a bird building its nest and raising its young is reward enough to put up with a bit of untidiness throughout the summer season.

Flowers for St Mary's - If you shop at the Tesco's in Ellesmere you might have noticed you are able to vote for St Mary's Church with your counters. The Overton Community Growers and Overton Wildlife Group have been working with St Mary's to put together a plan to plant spring flowering plants such as primroses, native daffodils, native bluebells and snowdrops around the church. These spring flowering plants provide a vital boost to early emerging pollinators in spring. Many of these pollinators are coming out of their winter sleep hungry and desperate for food. Native wildflowers are an excellent source of food for them, and St Mary's should soon be a one stop shop for these important insects.

Busy badgers - We are lucky to have a number of badger setts around the village, but did you know that badgers like to move home fairly regularly? Badgers often have several setts, which they move between and some can remain empty for months and years before the badgers return. You can know if a sett is active by looking out for signs of badgers, such as fresh soil outside the entrance, signs of bedding materials being moved in and out of the sett, holes dug in the soil nearby where the badgers have been feeding, or latrines (badger toilets). As with our nesting birds, badger setts have legal protection, meaning work near them needs a license to take place, such as felling trees.

Ringling News

You may have noticed that the bells of St Mary's were silent on a Tuesday evening during January. This was because there was a change to the Covid alert level and the 'rule of six' was enforced. For a bell ringing practice session to be beneficial more than six ringers are required if possible. During January we travelled across the border for a joint practice with Chirk bell ringers at St Martin's Parish Church. We were able to continue ringing on Sunday mornings as usual.

Our brand new and returning ringers are progressing very well. We recently received a lovely comment on the Overton-on-Dee Facebook page. To have support from the local community means a great deal to us all, spurring us on to ring well as we call worshippers to pray.

For this update I thought I would share some information about ringing. The origins of what we call change ringing lie in the sixteenth century when church bells began to be hung with a full wheel (see image) enabling the bell to swing in a full circle and back again. This gave ringers control of their bell, which allowed sets of bells (rings) to be rung in a continuously changing pattern. Music is created by moving bells up and down the ringing order to a defined sequence known as a method. The bells are tuned to a normal (diatonic) scale, and it is usual to start with ringing down the scale, a sequence which ringers call 'rounds'. The order in which the bells sound is then altered to give different sequences called 'rows' or 'changes'. Changes may be called out individually by the conductor, and this style is known as call-change ringing. This is what we normally ring on a Sunday morning. Alternatively, the changes may be made to a pre-set pattern or 'method', and each ringer must learn that method in order to know when his or her particular bell must sound in each row. This style is known as method ringing.

St Mary's School News

Year 1 and 2 have been looking at the story 'Tidy' by Emily Gravett and have learnt about Pete, an overzealous Badger, who becomes a little too tidy and neat in the forest. Pupils have had drawing and painting lessons online from the author herself and have enjoyed experimenting with new techniques. Children have developed an awareness of the importance of taking care of our environment, and have designed posters to remind others about the 'Countryside Code'. They have written postcards and letters to Emily Gravett and her character Pete and will keep you informed if we hear back! In Forest School, pupils undertook a sensory treasure hunt and also learnt a quick way to gauge the age of a tree by working together to measure the girth of the trunk as part of a maths activity. They were amazed at the age of some of the trees in our school playground, the oldest and by far the largest being the Giant Sequoia (Giant Redwood) at the bottom of the field near our pond area.

Year 3 have been thinking about Perseverance, our RE value this term. They thought about what perseverance means and times when they have shown perseverance. Pupils enjoyed leading a virtual assembly in school and sharing a video they filmed on perseverance. Meanwhile, Year 4 have enjoyed a Tudor Workshop to support their topic work. Pupils had a fantastic morning playing Tudor games, learning about Tudor explorers and Tudor medicine, learning a Tudor dance, and looking at replica artefacts. They made Tuzzie Muzzies, which were used as a remedy to combat the Plague!


In Year 5, pupils have been taking part in a series of technology workshops with Will from Technocamps, an educational organisation based at Techniquet in Wrexham. They have had a go at coding and making their own fully functional robots with lights and sensors. Pupils have also learnt about forces and used their knowledge of air resistance and aerodynamics to make rockets which they launched into space. Finally, in Year 6, pupils have been fully immersed in their World War 2 topic, learning about evacuation and the Home Front, writing newspaper reports on the Blitz and making gas mask boxes in DT. They have also been studying the artist Henry Moore and practising the techniques he used in his famous sketches of London Underground during the Blitz, in order to re-create their own artistic representations.


