Overton Amateur Dramatic Society presents



Set against the strict codes of conduct and manners of the age, the play is based on a father's fight to clear his son's name after the boy is expelled from Osborne Naval College for stealing a five-shilling postal order. To clear the boy's name was imperative for the family's honour; as his life would have been wrecked by the stain on his character.

The 146 bus route review

Wrexham County Borough Council is consulting with users, residents and a wide variety of community groups to seek views on how they should prioritise their spending on subsidised bus services and community transport.

Wrexham County Borough Councils Transformation Programme is working towards making financial savings and looking towards positive changes to deliver services in the future. They are now seeking views on how to prioritise spending on subsidised bus services and community transport. The subsidised local bus services are those that would not normally be provided by bus operators as the fares collected would not cover the cost of running them.

These are typically early morning, Sunday, evening and rural routes. Currently WCBC subsidise 15% of the bus network in Wrexham.

Amongst those routes affected is the No 146 Wrexham to Whitchurch 6.45pm, 8.45pm, 10.45pm from Wrexham to Whitchurch and 6.45pm, 7.45pm, 9.45pm journeys from Whitchurch to Wrexham. Also it could cut the whole of the No 146 Sunday services Wrexham to Whitchurch and return.

Ramblings From the Reverend by David Child



Around this time of the year I cannot help but remember an encounter I had many years ago when I was a senior junior doctor. It was late one night and I was on call. I walked down to the admissions ward to check the progress of the patients. The registrar asked me to see a patient who had just been admitted. She told me he was dying. His death was not unexpected but in those days there was little in the way of facilities or provision for patients to die in their own homes. I examined him – he was drifting in and out of consciousness. I checked his blood test results and agreed with her management plan.

The ward sister asked me if I could have a chat with his wife who was in her office. ‘Yes, of course.’ I entered the office. A woman got up from her chair. She shook my hand. It was a firm handshake, there was something very striking about her. I beckoned her to sit down and sat down myself. I felt that there was no point in beating about the bush and said to her, ‘You know he’s dying don’t you.’ She nodded. I explained that he was in no pain, which she knew already, and that we would try to make his last few hours as comfortable as possible. I told her that she could stay as long as she liked or that she could come and go as she wished.

We talked some more. Then something made me ask her, ‘how did you and your husband meet?’ She smiled, ‘We met in the war or rather after the war. It’s all rather complicated. You see he was a spy. He parachuted into Yugoslavia, later on into Italy and finally into France. I was his radio contact in this country. He knew my voice and I knew his. That’s how it worked. He had an amazing voice. We didn’t meet face to face until after the war. We fell in love, maybe we were already in love, I don’t know.’

We talked some more. I left to see my other patients. She went to see her husband. I watched from a distance. She talked to him once more but this time he didn’t reply but somehow I knew that somewhere, somehow he still heard her.

So join us at the cenotaph and then in church on Remembrance Sunday. Join us in honouring and remembering not only those who gave everything but also those who risked everything and those who continue to risk everything on our behalf.
