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

It's info time on bike security

The vast majority of bicycle thefts are opportunist thefts. It only takes a few seconds for the opportunist to take a bike which is not secured.

There are a number of bikes stolen each year from within peoples own properties, either from sheds or garages.

Follow our simple crime prevention tips to help keep your bicycle safe from thieves When you are out and about

- Get a good quality bike lock solid 'D' locks offer good protection.
- Lock it or lose it even if you just pop to the shops for two minutes, many thefts are opportunistic.
- Always lock your bike to an immovable object.
 Don't just lock the frame to the wheel.
- Leave your bike in a well-lit area where it can easily be seen by others.
- Remove anything that can't be secured such as lamps and pumps.

Register

- Permanently mark your bike using a police preferred product.
- Register your bike with BikeRegister website for free. <u>www.bikeregister.com</u>
- Take out insurance on your bike and be sure to cover for thefts away from home. Take a photo of your bike and write a clear description of it for your own records.
- Mark your bike contact a member of your local Neighbourhood Policing Team for further advice.

Securing your bike whilst at home

- If you store your bike in a shed or garage, fit a ground or wall anchor and lock your bike to it.
- Lock valuables together to prevent them being easily removed.

Dear Editor,



I write in response to Mrs Russ Latham's letter regarding Knolton Farmhouse Cheese Ltd obtaining planning permission for their drying plant. My letter is not about the pros and cons of the issue; the decision has been made. The issue that concerns me is the derogatory and ill-informed comment about the role of Overton Community Council in the process. I am not a member of the Council and my comments are obviously my own.

It is the responsibility of the Community Council to review local planning applications and make a recommendation to the planning authority, Wrexham CBC, which in turn makes the decision. In coming to a decision on its recommendation the Community Council's Planning Committee considers all comments made regarding an application, be they supportive or objections. Additionally members of the community have the right to speak at Council or Committee meetings. Clearly the Council can only consider the comments that are put before it. Having previously served on the Council I can say that in my experience the Council carries out this role in a non-partisan, transparent and honest manner and always strives to be fair to all parties involved.

We live in a democratic society which is based on diversity of opinion and the right to freely express these opinions within the law. Most issues divide opinion in some way and the political process seeks to resolve differences in a peaceful manner. At a local level the planning process, and the role of the public bodies involved in it, including the Community Council, conforms to such principles.

Finally, I find Mrs Latham's suggestion that those local people who dislike the view of the new structure should move away from the area arrogant in the extreme. This is the 21st century we're living in, not a 15th century feudal society. The village is no individual's personal fiefdom. We are all entitled to our opinions and to express them through the channels provided for that purpose.

Bringing back memories

I watched with interest today as the Royal Fleet Auxiliary ship RFA Argus left for West Africa, with Royal Marine and Fleet Air Arm contingents to support the on-going fight against the Ebola virus. It brought back memories of my own rather unexpected deployment to West Africa almost 25 years ago. In May 1990 I had flown out to Majorca to join the Fleet Tanker and helicopter carrier RFA Tidespring which was coming back from a six month trip. We expected to call at Gibraltar then spend a few months back in Portsmouth. A comfortable time alongside in the UK was anticipated, which suited me fine. As a ship's Communications Officer life doesn't get easier than that. As we approached Gibraltar we were diverted, without stopping, down to West Africa. A bloody civil war had erupted in Liberia and we were directed to standby off the coast to evacuate the Embassy and any UK citizens who might be able to take refuge there. We were joined by the Frigate Broadsword and some very business like looking troops from the Special Boat Service. My memory of the SBS is that they were all quite small wiry types, they spoke very little and seemed to unpack, check and repack their kit twice daily whilst eagerly awaiting the opportunity to go ashore to rescue the ambassador's daughter. Also joining us was an enormous contingent of US Marines aboard the largest helicopter assault ship I had ever seen.

We then spent almost three months trundling up and down a four mile "box" in the sea. The highlight of each watch was the slow turn. Anyone who has ever been in that part of the world will know that the weather is dull, sticky and thoroughly depressing. After a week we were bored. After a fortnight we had had enough. Two months in and having run out of tooth paste, fresh milk and vegetables we were near suicidal. What no one ever tells you about the military is the "hurry up and wait" reality of it all. My 24th birthday was spent in the doldrums in both senses of the word. There was no email in those days and post simply couldn't get in or out. My previous trip island hopping in the tropical wonderland of the Caribbean seemed a distant unreal memory. The highlight of our trip was a brief afternoon in the "stable" country of Sierra Leone next door. Visiting the capital, Freetown, was a culture shock to us all. Sadly soon after we left, that country too descended into a frightful civil war. Our deployment ended uneventfully. The US forces eventually evacuated all the UK citizens and we trundled home a few months later, our military never having received the order to "go in". Whilst there is no war on today, the deployment of our military to West Africa today involves very real and perhaps worse dangers and I am sure we all wish them well. Looking at all the eager fresh young faces laying out their kit out and boarding the ship, as Remembrance Day approaches, focuses the mind.

Friends of St. Mary's

The Friends of St Mary's recently held a small party in the Church when guests listened to a brief talk on the work that has been completed to the fabric of the Church and what was in prospect for the future.

In the last year there were remarkably low maintenance costs but this situation is not likely to be repeated because as well as more normal general maintenance costs, major capital improvements are being discussed including a toilet and kitchen facilities. It is hoped that considerable grants will be available for the toilet and kitchen facilities for this project but even so it will need a considerable sum added from church funds. PCC have ringfenced a reserve of funds for when there is an absolute need to preserve the fabric of the Church such as the roof.

A quinquennial survey was undertaken in 2011 and known defects over the next 5 years are expected to be costly plus unexpected major works at some time are inevitable with the age of this historic building. A reserve is always necessary in order to qualify for matching grants on items of heavy expenditure.

The Friends of St Mary's had a very good fundraising year but it remains a priority that the initiative should continue to ensure the future survival of the church, with the community continuing to act together to keep the building in good condition. Many churches have closed down because they have not managed to balance their books.

It is our responsibility and nobody else's, to hand on our heritage and the oldest building in our village with its timeless Christian message to the next generation.

Contributions are really so very much appreciated.

You may have noticed that the three large stumps (and roots) in the Millennium Meadow have disappeared!! After many months of trying to find a contractor (with the assistance of Ian Atkinson from All Things Trees) who was able to carry out the work the stumps were buried over a weekend.



Whilst the area where the stumps were situated is now level,

over the winter the soil will settle which may cause the area to become uneven with the possibility of some holes may develop. Overton Community Council recommends that walkers take additional care when walking through the Millennium Meadow and remain on the path where possible.

Net, Wooden Train with an engine and 2 carriages HAS ARRIVED.
