


## Pudsey is coming to Overton AGAIN!



## Shaping the future of our Library Service

The total cost of providing the current library service in Wrexham CB is £1.3 million. The service has now been tasked with reducing this cost by £300,000 over the next 2 years, a reduction of 23%. Their recent announced consultation says that they know that they cannot continue to deliver the library services as they are today and they want to hear from you about ideas on how the service should be delivered in the future. They want your feedback about ideas and any other suggestions you have.



Overton Library is at present open 15 hours a week and provides public computer access, local information, support for the Playcentre, and School, 4 local book clubs, e-books, e-audiobooks, e-magazines and e-comics, as well as books to borrow; an inclusive meeting place for everyone, young and old. You can take part and add your opinions by completing one of the forms at Overton library or by completing online at [www.wrexham.gov.uk/libraryreview](http://www.wrexham.gov.uk/libraryreview) The more Overton people who take part, the more it will show we want Overton Library.

At Messy Church in October we looked at the theme of generosity and we heard the story of a 5yr old boy named Fletcher who raised money so that he could buy pyjamas for someone in his community who needed warm clothes for the winter. It's amazing that he was able to do this as a 5yr old, but even more amazingly he even got some help from his little brother! Together they did odd jobs for family members and helped with the cooking at home to raise the money.

God has been very generous to us, and our Christmas celebrations each year help us focus on this as we thank God for the gift of a Saviour in Jesus. But God has blessed us in a million other ways too, and we're encouraged in the Bible not only to count our blessings but also to share them with others. Here's one way we could do that.

During November, Wrexham Foodbank is encouraging people to do what they call a Reverse Advent Calendar. Each day in November participants collect a food parcel until by the end of the month they have most of the constituents of a complete food parcel (with a few Christmas extras thrown in!) Then in early December they send these to the foodbank and the food is passed on to people who need a helping hand over the Christmas period. The foodbank has a number of distribution centres in the area and people travel into Wrexham town from all parts of the borough to seek help, and sad to say, demand is growing, with over 4,000 emergency food supplies given out to people in crisis last year. ## The Peel Mortuary Chapel and Cemetery

Following last month's article on the recent stabilisation of the Peel Mortuary Chapel, here is some of its history.


The sad story is that Edmund Peel aged 22 purchased Bryn y Pys in 1848, married the beautiful Anna Maria Lethbridge (*picture right*) in 1854 but she died in 1860. She was initially buried in Overton Church graveyard but Edmund's grief in losing his young wife resulted in his building of the mortuary chapel and cemetery, consecrated in June 1872. The Bishop gave permission for Edmund's late wife to be moved to the new site. Edmund Peel then gave the new cemetery to the parishioners of Overton.

All over Britain at this time the rising population meant old churchyards could not cope with the huge demand for burial space. It was a time of poor sanitation and cholera scares, (John Snow had discovered that cholera was transmitted by water in 1855). Edmund Peel's building of the chapel and cemetery was therefore responding to a real need for more space for our village burials.

Edmund Peel chose as his architect William Milford Teulon who founded the "City Church and Churchyard Protection Society" and was involved in the restoration of a number of churches - including St Mary's Overton in 1871. He also landscaped many parks including that at Althorp (Princess Diana's last resting place). The design advice for garden cemeteries recommended -

- a) location should be a distance from habitation for reasons of hygiene.
- b) aspect should be Southern and the site should be elevated and airy.

Edmund Peel commissioned celebrated stained glass maker Arthur O'Connor to make the windows, depicting "The Nativity," "The Baptism in the River Jordan" "The Angel at the Sepulchre" and many others. His was among the stained glass firms to exhibit at the Great Exhibition and their work is in many churches but locally can be seen at the "marble church" at Bodelwyddan.

danger of it being demolished but thankfully it remains one of Overton's many assets thanks to the work recently completed by the Church in Wales.

The location of the chapel with a wonderful view of the River Dee in those days was another deliberate choice in keeping with the design ideas of the day. The mid-Victorian growth of Romanticism, the appeal of the 'Natural' rather than the Classical became popular in poetry and music. The Hymns Ancient and Modern were published in 1859 and contains one with the first line "Where High the Heavenly Temple Stands" which must have been a perfect description of the Peel Chapel when viewed from the river below.

The Peel Mortuary Chapel and churchyard are a unique and important example of a Victorian phenomenon, one of the many institutions being developed as essential parts of 19th century society, like the workhouses, asylums, prisons, cottage hospitals and public parks. Their cemeteries were a new type of burial ground for the dead, bringing innovation in the development of landscape design, architecture, planting and social use. A few years ago there was a real

### Our Reading Garden – A Wondrous World



After working hard to raise funds last year, our Reading Den area on the Junior playground is now finished and so on 19<sup>th</sup> September we had our Grand Opening. We were fortunate to have the author Barbara Mitchellhill (*photo left*) with us for the day, sharing with us a fascinating insight into her new book, 'Secret Suffragette'. So what better person could we have to cut the ribbon on our Reading Den area than a published author?!

As well as the beautifully crafted Reading Shed, created by Rob and Scott Lawrenson, an eye-catching feature of the garden are two huge willow sculptures. Earlier in the week we'd had the pleasure of welcoming Sarah Hayes, Willow Artist, who, over the course of three days, worked with all classes so everyone played a part in the creation of the sculptures.

It was intriguing and fun to learn how to weave willow. Sarah has made many detailed creations in the past, and helped us make the characters of George and Bear from Sophie Henn's book 'Almost Anything'. The story is about a rabbit called George who doesn't

believe he can do anything, but with his 'magic' hat and the guidance of wise Bear, realises he can do almost anything. All year groups started their learning in September using this story because it links to Growth Mindset; something we all use to help us become the best learners we can be. It was thrilling to see the completed sculptures in situ in our Reading Garden.

We interviewed Sophie Hughes, age 11, from Year 6: "I found the willow art very inspiring, and the book 'Almost Anything' made me believe in myself more." Adelina Burton, age 7, said: "I found it interesting and it made me think a lot about being able to do 'Almost Anything'."

Many of last year's Year 6 pupils also made a return visit to St. Mary's to see the Reading Den and Garden, as they played a key role in its creation; they were thrilled with the final result! Mrs Williams, Year 6 Teacher, said it was lovely to see so many of the new Year 7's return to share in the experience. St Mary's pupils now have a quiet place to relax, in a wondrous environment, to promote a love of reading. What a great way to start the Term!
