Playgroup conquers Snowdon



Over £1,300 was raised on 4th September by 17 intrepid walkers aged 2 to 45 who made it to the summit of Mount Snowdon. Taking the less well known (so empty) Rangers Track (thoroughly recommended), the walkers set off at 8.20 from the car park and with only a few chocolate stops made it up by 11.15. The party was led by Andrew Baker, a consultant doctor, and apart from the amazing effort of the children, one of the first up and down was five-month pregnant Heather Pritchard. Frank Macdonald-Brown said "for a minute I was the highest person in Wales!".

About £800 will go towards the Overton Playgroup, with the remainder going to the selected charities of the walkers including Trust for African Schools and the Rainforest Trust.

Ramblings From the Rectory by David Lewis



Dear friends,

Summer has been quite eventful for me and our family. The birth of a grandchild, a little girl called Ashanti Jasmine, weighing 7lbs, brought great joy to us all and touched our hearts in August. The hope and joy of new life was really brought home to me as I cradled this few hours old little baby. Of course for 2 weeks in August I was also part of a group sent out to help establish a link with South West Tanganyika in Tanzania. The experiences we all shared touch all of our hearts and I would like to share some of them with you.

It was quite an experience! From the moment we stepped off our small plane in the Cathedral City of Njombe to be greeted by several hundred singing Mothers Union members and children to the time we said our farewells with the dawn chorus at Dar-es-Salaam airport our senses were assaulted in so many ways. It was a demanding journey, physically, emotionally and spiritually as none of us were unaffected by the deep faith in the harshest conditions of those we met. We were inspired by the hope and joy of the whole Christian community and in particular the dedication of the clergy whose self-sacrifice for their ministry humbled us. Where the land was not good enough to sustain the subsistence agriculture then the poverty means that the clergy do not even receive their salaries of £60 a month. School fees and medical fees cannot be paid and life may depend on a cow and a few chickens.

One of the places we visited was called Manda on the shores of Lake Nyasa. The drive from Njombe had been long, very bumpy and extremely tiring. As we arrived at our accommodation in the dark on the shores of Lake Nyasa, all we wanted to do was to find a bed to crawl into. However as we drove through the village and onto the shore, about 100 children and adults welcomed the two jeeps onto the beach. Our spirits couldn't help but be raised and our senses overwhelmed by the crowds of children cheering and waving palms. Camera flashes went off in the dark and the whole scene started to take on a very surreal aspect. The next morning we awoke to a magnificent landscape. The veranda of our cottage looked onto the shoreline of Lake Nyasa and we could see canoes, bird life, and people bathing in the water. The astounding scenery contrasted sharply with the difficult living conditions of the people living in Manda. Malaria was rife; mosquito nets were few and far between. HIV had taken its toll as had diarrhoea. Of those children who greeted us so enthusiastically the night before, you could not help but wonder what percentage would be dead in 10 years.

The infrastructure around Manda was almost nonexistent. You could see the potential for tourism, yet the reality was with no infrastructure or money that potential was just a dream. Fishing for the men had become increasingly difficult. The edges of the lake were over fished and no one had the boats to reach the fish that had migrated to the middle of the lake. For the clergy life was tough. Travelling to outstations meant miles and hours of walking. Often stipends were unpaid because of the poverty of the parishes. They worried for their children and asked for help with school fees. Living conditions were basic. Yet the comment from one cleric that he would still minister despite the hardships because his people needed him was truly inspiring. During our stay we experienced baptism and confirmation services involving around 80 and the faithfulness and joy and hope expressed in the worship touched all of our hearts.

As I settle back into parish ministry I think of Ashanti and the promise and hope her life holds, compared to those 100 children who met us on the shore of Lake Nyasa. That dreadful statistic which proclaims that a third will be dead in 10 years, strikes my heart. And yet the life of faith expressed in Christian lives and churches was so vibrant and giving, that it really does lift your spirits and give hope to your hearts. I wish that some of our churches had that same hope and joy and sense of giving and outreach that was so evident in the African church. It is an experience I will never forget.

My trip to Uganda Pt 1 by Carol Dykes

Firstly I would like to say a big thank you from myself and Groundlevel

Foundation Trust to everyone who sponsored me and gave donations; your support and generosity really helped – every penny counts.

I started my journey 2am Thursday 17th August from home and arrived at Kampala Airport Friday 18th 3am. We stayed one night in a hotel and then started our journey at 6am to Kumi in an old minibus. Thankfully we had a good driver who stayed with us! It took 12 hours to get to Kumi. We were all very tired, thirsty and hungry. On Saturday morning we sat down for a meeting with the pastor to sort out the agenda. We had gone over to complete the school which had been started at the end of last year. The school's name is Mercy School in the district of Pallisa about 50 mins drive from Kumi – not on a proper road – more like a goat path!

We were pleased we managed to complete the building but unfortunately not the painting. We laid out a football pitch and posts plus a netball court but we were gutted that we ran out of time to complete the playground. However we did manage to buy lots of equipment which they began to put up as we were leaving. We also left them bats and balls and skipping ropes etc. Prior to the charity building the school, the lessons were held under a mango tree! We have got a big piece of land and as the project is ongoing, we plan to build 6 more blocks of toilets and accommodation so that some of the orphans will have some education too. We aim to build an office, shop and dispensary which will help to run the school. They will be able to sell the crops they don't use and can become self-sufficient. *Further details of Carol's visit in next months Oracle* - - - -

Avenue Tree

Several members of the community have asked whether it was necessary to fell the beech tree in the Avenue. When branches fell off the tree advice was sought from the arboriculturalist at Wrexham Borough Council. The tree was inspected and found to be in a dangerous state.

Although covered by a tree preservation order, the Community Council was advised that planning consent was not required and that the tree must be felled immediately. When the tree came down the extent of rot in the trunk was evident and dangerous. The Community Council is committed to replacing the beech in the very near future, with an oak tree, which is far less prone to the sort of rot that beech is subject to.
