Carrier bag charge benefits community



It is a year on October 1st since the 5p charge was levied on all carrier bags in Wales. Before this at Overton's Corner Shop, Mike Pinder gave out 4000 bags a month to his customers. But over the last year this has dropped to 1000 bags a month, a 75% decrease which, as the legislation hoped, is helping to save the environment.

But it has also helped our community of Overton. Over the last year Mike and Karen Pinder have collected over £450 in the 5p's charged for the bags and they have donated this for the youth of the village. They recently presented a cheque for £502.80, including a 10% donation from Mick and Karen, to Overton Scout Group and it has been used to pay for the building of a wall of new storage cupboards in the Scout Hut. These are to be used by the Scouts, Explorer, Cubs, Beavers, Brownies and Youth Club who use the Hall on different evenings of the week, and means that other old cupboards can be disposed of, making more room in the Hall for the young peoples' activities. The cupboards have been built by local carpenter, Rob Lawrenson.

The 'Red Duster'



On the 3rd September the red ensign (known as the Red Duster) was flown from Overton's church flag pole. This flag was hoisted in remembrance of more than 35,500 officers and men of the Merchant Navy who lost their lives in the Second World War and 17,000 in the First World War and have no known graves other than the sea. The date is significant as on that day in 1939 the SS.Athenia, bound for Canada with 1417 passengers and crew was torpedoed 220 miles off the Irish coast with the loss of 118 lives, many of whom were children being evacuated to Canada away from the expected invasion of Britain. The Merchant Navy Association had 3rd September recognised as Merchant Navy Day each year and the Red Ensign can be flown from public and private flag poles throughout the UK. Without the Merchant Navy during WWI & WWII, Britain, as an island, would have been isolated and the lack of imported food, oil and raw materials would have brought the country to its knees and possible surrender. Britain owes a great debt to the officers and men who of the Merchant Navy who manned these defenceless ships in war-torn waters. It also remembers those who died in the Falkland's war with the loss of the "MV Atlantic Conveyor", "RFA Fort Grange", RFA Sir Tristram and the RFA Sir Galahad, the ship in which Simon Weston was badly burnt. Thanks to the Rector, Rev. David Child, for his kind permission to fly the flag on the church flag staff and the members of the British Legion for the purchase of the Red Ensign. Also thanks to the Rector for arranging the Service on 2nd Sept in St Mary's Parish Church to remember the Officers and men of the Merchant Navy of which he himself has a vested interest as an uncle of his was lost at sea while serving onboard a Merchant Vessel. The Service, conducted by the Rector was attended by members of the Overton British Legion and Scout Group plus the young children in the play corner doing a wonderful job making their paper boats. The service began with a poem read by Mike Marshall, ex Mariner, called "Heroes", Peter Rosselli spoke about the loss of ships and men of the shipping company T & J Harrisons of Liverpool in WWII, David Burton described the life of Cecily Benjamin, a WREN who was killed on a Merchant ship during the war and Mike Marshall told the story of the late Neville Scott, ex Mariner, who was Vice President of the Overton British Legion. The rector gave his sermon on a simple action of the Captain of the first Queen Mary whereby his action was precise and correct at all times, and to make sure on leaving and arriving in port, he made reference to a small piece of paper kept in his pocket which said 'Port is Left' and 'Starboard is Right' !

'I'm sorry' said the asylum seeker to the driver, 'I've only got £5 for your fare.' 'Don't worry mate, forget it, we done good' said the taxi driver, 'in fact, I'll drive you home for free.' As he was being driven home the asylum seeker wondered to himself, 'what does 'mate' mean, no one has ever called me that before.'

I like telling stories. Jesus used to tell stories. On occasions he plagiarized them – he just gave the ending a new and unexpected twist. Ah well!

New Pool Table

Overton Recreational Club have replaced their pool table with a competition standard table. At the same time the two snooker tables have been upgraded with new professional cloths.

The Cocoa & Reading Rooms were built in 1890. The room upstairs was the Reading Library & Parish Room and the room opposite was the games room. In 1908 a $\frac{3}{4}$ size billiard table was purchased from Ellesmere Men's Club for £15. It was made from a sailing ship's timbers as recorded on the plaque at the end of the table, and given to the village by Major Peel of Bryn-y-Pys Hall. By 1968 use of the room had declined and the Village Hall Management Committee locked the room to prevent it from being vandalised. To avoid losing the facility local people had a meeting to look into re-opening the room as a Club to revive interest in billiards and snooker. The Library was relocated to what is now the Parish Room and replaced by what is now the bar and television room. In 1969 the new bar and lounge was opened and villagers were invited to become members.

When demand for games of snooker increased a second snooker table was bought from "The Swallow Club" in Whitchurch for £25. The pool table was introduced during the 1980's to increase the range of activities offered by the club. All members are entitled to use the snooker and pool tables, whether they wish to play a friendly game or take part in a competition.

The club provides a safe family environment, and a facility for the whole village. Darts and dominoes are on offer and there are regular entertainment evenings with singers and comedians, bingo, and quiz nights. There are two large screen televisions showing all channels and Sky Sports. An application has been made for free wi-fi and a modern CD jukebox is in the planning. Membership for over 18's is £10.00 per annum and £4.00 for OAP's. The Football Club also operates from the Recreational Club with two teams playing in local leagues. Come & support them at the playing fields on Saturday afternoons in the season.

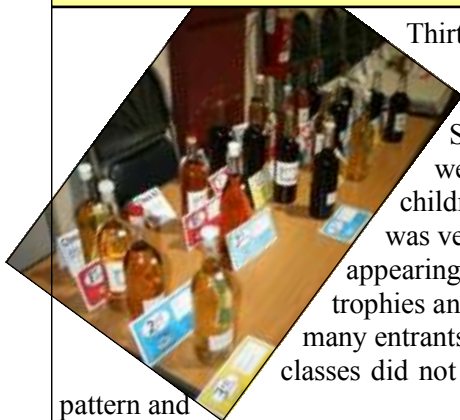
OVERTON 2012 PRODUCE SHOW

Over the August bank holiday weekend the Village Hall suffered two break-ins, mindless acts of vandalism. At the first there was a dry powder fire extinguisher set off - what a mess - the powder dries like cement dust. At the second we had 7 fire extinguishers stolen and the bar area smashed up. It was touch and go whether the Village Produce Show was able to go ahead. If it had not been the kind gesture of the Fire Control engineer who loaned us some extinguishers we would have had to close the doors. Fire Regulations and Insurance are very strict on a multi use building.

The Trustees have been left with huge expenses for reparation and installation of several measures to prevent this happening again. The police have asked for vigilance and for any other cases damage/theft to be reported immediately - like 2 of the floodlights outside the Church have been smashed only this week !!!! On a brighter note - the scaffolding that you can see is to enable work to repair and paint the outside of the Village Hall, Parish Room and Library over the next few weeks.
