Seeds from St Mary's

Returning from holiday after a fortnight, it was inevitable that my garden would look rather neglected. Nature takes its course – and whilst the clematis and roses continue to ramble in a pleasing way, the grass grows and the weeds multiply. At the same time, the nights draw in and there's an Autumnal nip in the air. As our harvest festival approaches, we supplement our church flower arrangements with produce from farms, allotments and gardens – and we are very aware of the changing seasons.

In the news, the Brexit crisis deepens, the Bahamas try to recover from tragic storms and there are disturbing pictures from Hong Kong. And in our own context, children start new schools or classes, young people leave for university or start their first job, parents face empty nests, challenges at work remain to be faced and illness stirs up fears of our own mortality. The changing seasons only serve to underline that we live in a world of change. As one of the most popular funeral hymns puts it – rather starkly – “Change and decay in all around I see...”

I often hear people say that they don't like change, but the falling leaves remind us that change is inevitable and fighting it is futile. As my first summer in the Rectory draws to an end, I can't stop the annuals dying and the perennials shrinking back. But what I will be doing is putting some new bulbs in the ground so that there is spring colour to look forward to. I won't fight the changes in my garden but I will invest in the future. Even in the face of death, there is hope.

The hymn continues, “Thou changest not, O Lord, abide with me.” The tulip, daffodil and crocus bulbs hide in the ground, unseen, ready to produce their display in good time. God is invisible to us, but his unseen presence gives strength to those facing changes and challenges, and hope to us all. May Autumn's decay remind us of the new life that is to come.

Changes at St Mary's

Change your bus pass

Transport for Wales announced in June that Concessionary Travel Cards are to replace current bus passes for over 60s and disabled. Old-style cards will still be valid for travel and offer the same benefits until 31 December 2019.

You will need to change your old-style card to the new-style between now and 31 December 2019. You can apply for a new Concessionary Travel Card on line on www.tfwwales/travelcards,

telephone 03003034240 to ask for a paper form or get one from the Library.

If you have a computer why not ask friends or neighbours who are over 60 who have not got access to a computer if you can help them complete the application on-line. It is much easier on-line, postal applications have to send documentation, on-line applications do not.

To reapply, you will need the following information to hand; the 18-digit card number printed on the front of your (green) bus pass, your date of birth, the postcode your current card is registered to, and your National Insurance number.



Green bin charges update

In light of cuts to local government funding, WCBC will be charging £25 per year to empty your green bin from April 1 2020. If you want the council to continue emptying your green bin from April 2020, you'll need to pay online or by card over the phone - details will be available nearer the time. Any additional green bins will also cost £25 per year to be emptied.

The Peel Mortuary Chapel and Cemetery

The rediscovery of the architectural form and detail from beneath the ever encroaching vegetation growing over the standing remains of The Peel Chapel has been one of the most rewarding aspects of the recent works that have been taking place at the cemetery. Now that the repairs are nearing completion, it is possible to reflect on the challenges that Smith Building and Conservation Ltd. have encountered during the last couple of months. They have methodically cut back vegetation to gain access to the site in the first instance, before then tackling the extensive growth of ivy, the saplings and deeply rooted perennial weeds that were beginning to dislodge the stonework in key locations.

Once the walls were clear, it was very pleasing to see that the overall condition of the chapel structure was good. There were obvious locations where care and attention was necessary and this began by recording the position of stonework within the walls, before dismantling small sections to remove the most invasive roots, and rebuilding in lime mortar. A key aspect of the work has been to ensure that water is prevented from entering the top of the walls for the foreseeable future and so a softer and more flexible lime-based mix has been specified to replace the harder cementitious mix previously used. A similar mix has been used to rebed coping stones and for general repointing purposes.

We were hoping to reuse more of the existing stonework that had been dislodged from the building during episodes of anti-social behaviour and thrown over the retaining wall into the woodland below. Whilst this detective exercise has been successful in part, it was also necessary for new stone to be introduced to repair one of the corner piers. It was our intention to reinstate some of the lost architectural details at the doorway into the chapel but this was not eventually possible because the original pieces could not be located.

The Representative Body of the Church in Wales sincerely hope that the Chapel of Ease (Peel Chapel) within its wonderful setting can again be enjoyed by the community of Overton on Dee.

Danger Point

On Tuesday 10th September, Year 6 went on an exciting trip to DangerPoint in Talacre.

Danger Point is an award-winning interactive visitor centre on the North Wales coast, where children and adults can learn about safety. Designed like a film set, Danger Point visitors journey from the home to the beach, and many more real-life scenarios, to raise awareness of dangers and how to stay safe in everyday life.

Pupils learnt about keeping safe in any situation, from dangers in the home, gas safety, road and rail safety, to the dangers of smoking and staying safe online: the experience was wide-ranging. As it was Gas Safety week, the class had a special add-on to the experience and learnt about the dangers of carbon monoxide – the silent killer. Make sure you have a working carbon monoxide detector in your home, as well as smoke alarms, and test them weekly!



We interviewed Erin Hayward, aged 10 from St. Mary's: "My favourite part of Danger Point was the Home setting; we had to put hoops on where we thought the hazards were in the living room and kitchen. Danger Point was so much fun!"

At the start of the day Year 6 took a quiz to see how much they already knew about safety and, at the end of the day retest, the results had gone up massively based on what the pupils experienced during the day! We are grateful to the Gas Safety Council who fully funded this trip to raise awareness during Gas Safety Week.


