# Seeds from St Mary's with Rev'd. Peter Mackriell

Thoughts normally turn to remembrance in November, but the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on September 8<sup>th</sup>



has plunged the country into nostalgia, thanksgiving and expressions of sorrow. All of these are also associated with All Souls on November 2<sup>nd</sup>, when many churches have services of reflection and prayer for the departed, and the national commemoration on November 11<sup>th</sup> and on Remembrance Sunday, which was so important to the late queen.

Such times of national reflection and shared sorrow bring people together – as the extraordinary scenes of queuing crowds in London have demonstrated. The Bishop of Southwark compared those walking to Westminster Hall to pilgrims – those of the past, no doubt, like Chaucer's merry band set for Canterbury, but also those who still walk to Santiago de Compostela in northern Spain. Pilgrimage is not just about a destination – it is also about the journey and those who you meet along the way. It seems that those people queueing in London have also been making friends.

Her Majesty the Queen has, as many attest, made a remarkable journey and made many friends. As we reflect on the example of those who have gone before us – the Queen, our own grandparents or parents, mentors and friends – I am reminded of the great prayer that we sometimes use at funeral services:

Grant us, Lord, the wisdom and the grace to use aright the time that is left to us on earth. Lead us to repent of our sins, the evil we have done and the good we have not done; and strengthen us to follow the steps of your Son, in the way that leads to the fullness of eternal life;

through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

As we journey on, we need 'wisdom and grace' to help us make the best use of the time we have; we need to leave behind the things that have gone wrong, the mistakes we have made and the opportunities we have missed; and we go forward as disciples of Christ, treading where he has trod.

Nostalgia, then, can help us value what has been good but shouldn't blind us to the mistakes that have been made; we can give thanks for the past but, if we are to live up to the example of the great women and men of faith, we must also move forward with hope for the future.

By the time you read this, the period of national mourning will be over and our lives will continue under a new King and a new government. I hope we don't forget the unity we have discovered as we have supported one another through the pandemic and, now, through this time of change. *Peter Mackriell* 

# Dear Editor,

When does a farmer's accidental deposit of straw from trailers become 'litter'?

The field adjacent to the Dee, was harvested in the first 2 weeks of August which, when transported through the village left a trail of straw, not just on the main highways but over the days and weeks, blown into sideroads, pathways and common areas. After 6 weeks we are still experiencing this 'litter'. Although it is a natural farm product - make no mistake it *is* litter - transported by man and machine and left on our roads and pavements. It is still in curbsides and on pavements, although admittedly not in such great quantities as in the first few weeks.

Any other product would have caused an absolute outrage but because we see it every year we tend to ignore it – but should we? If a normal householder had left even a tiny amount of such waste I am sure that he would have been pursued and possibly prosecuted!

I fully appreciate that it would be nigh on impossible to transport such volumes of straw without some flying off but surely the quantity that flies off could be mitigated relatively easily by sheeting attached to the ropes that already are pulled up and over when the load is tied down.

It poses the problem of who is responsible for cleaning it up, or much better still, preventing it from happening in the future - the farmer? Wrexham CBC? the OCC? or nobody in particular? Name & address supplied

When I came to the Mission Area at Advent 2018, followed by our move in February 2019, I honestly thought we would be here for ten years or more. Jo and I love the house in Sundorne, after all the improvements the diocese made to it, and I have spent many happy hours in the garden – trying to replace ground elder with something more beautiful. But two significant changes have led to our departure.


I came to Overton as part-time priest-in-charge whilst still working, in a teaching role, for Chester Diocese. I was also doing some freelance counselling work. In July 2019 I applied to be Head of Counselling Services in the same diocese, a part-time role to complement my work here. When I was appointed during lockdown it was relatively easy to do both my new jobs, working from home. Since restrictions eased, I have been out on the road much more.

Jo has now been appointed as priest-in-charge in the Tanat-Vyrnwy Mission Area and will begin her work in Llansantffraid and Llanfechain at the beginning of November. I will continue to have my office base in Overton until December and my last services will be on Christmas Day. In the new year, I will focus on my work in counselling and supervision – in Cheshire, where I work in four different locations, and freelance from home. I have been offered the Bishop's "Permission to Officiate" which will also allow me to help out in churches in the area.

We have time to say farewell, but I thought you might like to know a bit more about what we are doing. I am looking forward to all that we still have to share and especially to the Mission Area Advent Carol Service in Overton, at 4 p.m. on Sunday 27 November. *Peter* 

#### **Overton Bowler's Wonderful Season**

#### New book from Overton author


Rachel Harris' new book "Eirian the eel" was published with TAUK Publishing in September on World Rivers Dav.

Try the recipe for one of the winning exhibits -Prize winning Blackcurrant and Blueberry Cordial:

1kg Blackcurrants & 1kg Blueberries Put the currants and berries in a large pan with 750ml water. Bring to the boil slowly, crushing the fruit as it softens with a potato masher or wooden spoon. Cook until the fruits are soft and the juices are flowing, which should take around 30-40 minutes.

Pour through a jelly bag suspended over a large jug or bowl and leave to drip overnight. If you are hoping to enter your Cordial into a Show, don't be tempted to squeeze the bag as this will make the cordial cloudy. (It'll still taste nice though!)

The following day measure the liquid, and for every litre add 750g sugar. Heat gently to dissolve the sugar and bring slowly to a simmer. Remove from the heat. Pour into warm sterilised bottles and seal immediately with a screw top or a cork. The cordial will keep if sealed whilst hot, for several months if stored in a cool place. Once opened, store in the fridge.

At our September meeting our W.I. held a small memorial to commemorate HM Queen Elizabeth II, and drank a toast to our new King Charles III. We then heard of the adventures of one of our members who, with her husband, walked along the River Thames, from it's source to the sea.

Next month, on October 20th, we have Rob McBride, Tree Hunter and Campaigner for the protection of ancient trees in Britain. This meeting, like all, is open to non-members so if you'd like to hear of Rob's work, please do come along at 7pm.
