

DIGITAL SWITCHOVER DEADLINE!




Overton is positioned right on the edge of three television regions and homes will have chosen to receive TV programmes from one of a variety of transmitters, from Wales, Granada or Central. Therefore there are different dates for the Digital Switchover according to which way your aerial points and which stations you watch.

The deadline for the Digital Switchover if you receive BBC Wales, ITV Wales, & S4C is **28th October 2009**,

for those receiving BBC Northwest and Granada, the deadline is **4th November 2009**.

and for BBC Midlands and Central (from the Wrekin transmitter) the deadline is not until **2011**.

So what does this mean for all of us? It means that if you still have an older analogue television, when the analogue signal is switched off you won't be able to receive any programmes. This doesn't mean you have to throw out your old TV. There are many ways to continue viewing and some of them are quite cheap. You should have received through the post the leaflet from Digital UK telling you in detail all the options. These can be divided into those that require a one-off payment and those that require a monthly subscription. The details are as follows: -

I'm pleased to report that crime remains low across our area. We did see a number of incidents of theft reported in the Penley area recently, all occurred during one night and many fell victim having left vehicles insecure and valuable items on display. Please make every effort to secure your property to prevent yourself becoming the victim of crime. We have anti tamper tax disc holders and many other crime prevention articles free of charge at Overton Police Station so feel free to call in and have a chat, maybe there is something that could be useful to you.

For those of you who are not aware the penalty for not wearing a seat belt has risen from £30 to £60. There are no penalty points attached to this fine but its still expensive. I would urge anyone who normally doesn't bother to belt up, you can't argue with the statistics, it could save your life. Also misrepresented registration plates have acquired the new fine of £60, no fancy italics please, or dodgy spacing, not only will it attract a fine, but your vehicle will also fail its MOT, also only English, Welsh, Scottish or EU flags on registration plates. If in doubt call in the station for a chat.

On the 31st July 2009, Chief Constable Richard Brunstrom retired from North Wales Police. Personally I will be sad to see him go, I'm sure some of you will disagree and I accept that many of his ideas were controversial and he was very often misquoted, but he made a major difference in the structure and reputation of North Wales Police, I believe a replacement will be chosen by October, I have applied but I don't hold out too much hope.

OVERTON MEDICAL PRACTICE

Welcome to Dr Amy Stevenson who will be with us for her 1 year training and to our new receptionist Jackie. Congratulations to Dr Rosie Fallows who has got married and is now away on honeymoon.

Now for a reminder about prescriptions. Internet use has taken off well but remember that the 48 hr rule still applies. If you go on line any time after Friday noon your request will not be dealt with until Monday at the earliest. The same applies to patients who put their repeat requests into the box in or outside the surgery over the week-end. We need 48 hrs to process prescriptions properly. Make sure you have sufficient medication to avoid last minute hassle, we all need to be aware in case unexpected illness catches us out.

We have noticed lately that more and more patients, who attend hospital, are bringing in their hospital pharmacy requests. These are the small A5 white and pink prescriptions issued by the hospital doctor or consultant. You should go to the hospital pharmacy to get them filled as the GP is not responsible for raising them and may need to wait until documentation is received from the hospital.

The practice will try to continue as much as normal and deal with the Swine Flu Pandemic. Routine appointments may not be so readily available and urgent appointments will only be used at the doctor's discretion. Please bear with us at this difficult time, we are planning for the worse scenario but of course hoping for the best!



B A C K F R O M L A M U R E T T E by Georgina Mason



We had a great send-off in Overton High Street in the early morning of 16th July as we headed off on our bikes for our twinned village of La Murette in south east France. A big thank you to all our supporters and of course to everyone who sponsored us on the 1,740 kms ride. We haven't yet got the final figures but it looks like each charity will receive the excellent sum of £500.

We rode a daily average of 90 kms which allowed us time to have plenty of breaks for picnics, sightseeing, admiring the view, reading roadside memorials, visiting churches, taking photos and even having the odd leisurely coffee in a pavement café watching the world go by. It's a great feeling to fly along a country road, listening to the birds or the sound of running water with the sun shining in a clear blue sky. We did indeed have that whole experience but for the first eight days we were rained on at some stage every single day. Luckily legs are waterproof and modern easy-dry fabrics meant we were never wet for long.

We used Map Nav to plot our route! Lightweight, foldable, portable and cheap, it was most effective at finding those small, quiet roads so beloved of cyclists. Before leaving home, we'd torn the relevant pages from an old Michelin Road Atlas, put them in a waterproof folder and then as we finished with them we just threw them away. That way we avoided carrying the weighty range of maps needed to cover a long and spread-out route. A map of our journey is available on twitter.com/franceorbust if you follow the link.

We were carrying full camping gear; tent, lightweight sleeping bags and mats, a couple of pans, a stove, plates, bowls and cutlery and it all worked well. We camped for fifteen nights in excellent campsites. Our first was on the River Severn. Our t-shirts emblazoned with Overton-on-Dee and La Murette caught the owner's eye and she asked us brusquely "leisure or charity?" It took a few seconds before we realised what she was asking. A free night was ours on the strength of our reply and an extra £11 was added to our funds.

We enjoyed the cycling of course but the best part of the trip has to be the week in La Murette itself. It was wonderful meeting old friends and making new ones. The group arrived on Sunday, the same day as us and the fantastic week began. It was the usual non-stop round of visits, activities, socialising and delicious food. We had wonderful cheese, amazing puddings, super salads, crunchy bread, creamy tarts, fresh juicy peaches. Diane and Chloe even had fresh figs from the tree in the garden for breakfast. We swam in a lake and canoed, visited a silk worm farm, an organic vineyard, a pottery and the biggest challenge of all which made the cycling seem like a piece of cake, a tree-walking circuit which had us swinging through the trees like monkeys! Terrifying but exciting. The children (and Katharine!) being fearless, had a ball.

OVERTON'S STUNT RIDER by Euan Stevenson



Many local people are probably not aware that we have a star of films and television living in the village. Roy Richards, of Salop Road, has that claim to fame, through his skill as a horse-rider. Roy was brought up in Welshpool and started his "love-affair" with horses from the age of 9, when he started to ride on his uncle's farm. He became such an accomplished rider, that at age 12 his uncle challenged him to "break-in" one of his most spirited horses, with the promise that if he was successful, he could keep the horse. Roy managed to master the animal and they soon formed a partnership that was to win prizes at many local shows and jumping events. At age 14, he even had a brief experience as a jockey and rode in several races.

Roy's father decided however that it was not easy making a living with horses, so Roy went off to farming college and temporarily said "good-bye" to horses. At age 22 however, he was approached by a stunt-man, who had been told of his ability as a rider, to see if he fancied becoming a "stunt - rider" in his spare time. He first had to prove his mettle by staying on the back of a specially selected "bucking bronco". Roy passed the test (although his thighs were extremely painful afterwards) and was soon riding regularly as a stunt-rider.

For more than 20 years now, he has been performing in shows all over the UK and Europe. Anywhere that jousting / wild - west / trick - riding or chariot racing is in a show, Roy will probably be taking part. He has loved having the opportunity to see almost all of the UK, and much of Europe, but the work has involved long hours and much travelling. Roy was soon sought after as a stunt horseman in films and T.V. His T.V. work covers many shows, such as "Boon", "The Sharpe series", "Sherlock Holmes" and "Time Team". His most vivid memory is the work he did on the most expensive T.V. commercial ever made - do you remember the Guinness advert where waves in the sea magically become real white horses? The films he has appeared in are too numerous to list, but include "Willow", "First Knight", "Robin Hood - Prince of Thieves", "Braveheart" and "Gladiator".

Roy recently worked on the Keira Knightley film "Duchess" and on "The Picture of Dorian Grey". Working with many people who are household names has been an experience for

Roy who says that Sean Bean, Richard Harris, Richard Gere and Val Kilmer were great to work with, although he is less complimentary about Mel Gibson and Russell Crowe! Roy sometimes gets fed up with the long hours, the travelling and the injuries, but still gets a buzz out of performing in the arena, and hopes to carry on with his exciting hobby for another 5 years or so. His next assignment is in September, for the TV show "Midsomer Murders".
