Cheers to the Overton Beer Festival

Preparations are well under way for Overton's Inaugural Beer Festival due to be held in The Village Hall from 7.30pm until midnight on Friday October 3rd. A variety of delicious beers with superb malt and hop characters have been ordered and tickets are on sale for £6 each in The Corner Shop, Woodland's Café and from Peter Lynch on 710556 and Pene Coles on 710598. The ticket price includes the first half pint of beer and an artisan sausage in a bread roll. The sausages are being supplied by Overton butcher Mike Evans. All the money raised will be used for new equipment on the village playground.

Good reports for school & playgroup

Estyn has published the latest inspection report on St Mary's School, Overton. Clwyd South Assembly Member Ken Skates said: "This is a very positive report and one that pupils and members of staff can be rightly proud of, as I'm sure the parents and the wider community in Overton are. Of the many aspects highlighted as good, it was particularly pleasing to see pupils' behaviour described as 'first-class' and the quality of teaching noted as 'consistently of a high standard'. It is fantastic to see the majority of children making good progress and it reflects extremely well on the staff that the excellent care, support and guidance the pupils receive is not lost on the inspectors. I congratulate Mr Wyn-Jones and his team and would like to thank them for their continuing hard work and dedication to providing such a positive learning environment for children in Overton."

Earlier in the month Estyn also published the report on Overton Pre-School Playgroup and its current performance and prospects for future improvement were rated as 'good'. Mr Skates said: "The staff, and parents should be proud of the report. The Estyn inspectors highlighted many strengths and no important areas requiring significant improvement, with several areas rated 'excellent'. It's very positive and very pleasing. The report praises the standard of teaching, the learning environment provided, the care, support and guidance the children receive and the group's leadership, so it is really a tribute to manager Margaret Davies and her staff."

Dear Editor,

I read with interest the objections to the proposed expansion of the Knolton Cheese farm, close to my home at Knolton Bryn, and noticed the "protest poster" which suddenly appeared, then promptly disappeared, on the road out of the village.

As a relatively recent arrival to the village (I have been here just seven years) I suppose I am not qualified to say whether the character of the village is changing nor am I "in touch" with the various camps. There are two dairy farms between me and the village centre and just occasionally as I hurtle on my bike to practice the organ at St Mary's I end up being caught up in cow chaos on the lane. This is part of living in a rural area. Whether its tractors, muck on the road or hurtling cyclists, these are the hazards of living in such a beautiful part of the countryside. I doubt if a small expansion of the cheese farm is going to make much of a difference. There is however one thing which so far doesn't appear to have been raised in the debate. At the Ellesmere Food Festival last month I managed to eat my own body weight in free food samples from various stalls. The smoked Knolton cheese was the only one I dug deep in my pocket to buy and take home with me. Its absolutely delicious. I vote for expansion as soon as possible. Why has nobody raised the taste of the stuff with the planning department?

Toddlers and parents gave Una a lovely send off as she prepares for moving to her new church.


The group hand printed a T-shirt and Angie (from Cakery Bakery) made a fabulous cake.

Ellesmere Festival

The Canal & River Trust will once again open the historic Waterway Yard at Ellesmere as part of Ellesmere Festival 2014. Much of the Waterway Yard site is listed Grade II*, including the blacksmiths' and joiners' shop, dry dock and Beech House, the former head office of the Ellesmere Canal Company.

Ellesmere Yard is an important part of our waterway heritage. Once typical, it is now a rare example of an unspoilt and cherished canal scene. The Yard will be open on Saturday September 13 from 10am to 3pm and Sunday September 14 from 11am to 3pm. There will be plenty to see and do during the weekend. Resident blacksmith Rowan Taylor will be giving demonstrations at the recently refurbished forge using traditional techniques and producing bespoke items for sale. Boat trips will be running between Ellesmere Wharf (near Tesco) and the Waterway Yard (please note the water taxi is not accessible by wheelchair).

There will be activities for children, displays, exhibitions, the opportunity to comment on initial ideas for the future of the Waterway Yard and guided tours of some of the buildings will be available (need to prebooked). Come and see Saturn – a unique canal narrowboat. She is the last horse-drawn Shropshire Union Canal fly-boat, originally built to travel non-stop, day and night, carrying perishable goods. Over 100 years old, she has been fully restored to her former glory, not only to preserve her for posterity, but also to educate present and future generations about our waterways, narrowboats and horse-boat. Saturn is run and managed by the Shropshire Union Fly-Boat Restoration Society – a voluntary charitable group.



Other attractions at this year's Ellesmere Festival will include the annual art exhibition, a model exhibition featuring props from famous TV shows such as Dr Who and Thunderbirds, a Last Night of the Proms concert at St Mary's Church, a ride-on steam railway, craft and charity markets and street entertainment.
