The shed in the corner was falling to pieces, the fence around the allotment was barely standing, and the whole place was completely covered over with weeds. The man set to work, and soon after he'd started the local minister looked over the fence and said to him, "May God help you make this the allotment of your dreams!" The man didn't say anything, but carried on with his work.

A few months later, the preacher stopped by again, and the place was completely different. The shed had been rebuilt, the fence had been repaired and the ground had been cleared and dug over. Now crops were planted out in neat rows and everything seemed to be flourishing. "That's amazing!" said the preacher to the gardener. "Look what God and you have accomplished together!"

But the man who had worked so hard on the allotment didn't like the idea that God was getting the credit for all his hard work. He looked hard at the preacher and said, "Yes, Reverend, but remember what the place was like when God was looking after it on his own!"




Cheaper travel for teenagers

Ken Skates AM is encouraging young people in his constituency to register for a new Welsh Government scheme which will give them a third off bus travel from September.

The Welsh Government is offering people aged 16-18 reduced bus fares. The Welsh Young Persons Discounted Travel (WYPDT) scheme is designed to help young people travel to and from training and employment more cheaply, but has been extended to cover all their bus journeys from September 1. Anyone aged 16-18 in Clwyd South is encouraged to register for the new WYPDT Scheme Card via gov.wales/mytravelpass

Ken Skates said "Travel costs can be a real barrier for young people and sometimes stop them getting a job or gaining the skills they need to find work. This scheme will help change that by making it cheaper for them to get about."

Finding out about Fracking



As part of the Overton Community Council July Drop-in, a presentation explaining fracking and associated drilling was given. Several organisations who are in favour of fracking were invited to attend the drop-in, to ensure an even balance of opinion, but unfortunately none were able to attend. However presentations were made by anti-fracking campaigners Chris and Jean Hesketh of Frack Free Dudleston and Chris and Yellowbelly from Earth Family. These groups have been working together to keep the community of Dudleston free from unconventional gas exploration.

They explained that Overton also sits within an area that has already been granted a PEDL (Petroleum Exploration and Development Licence), but no application is underway to explore for methane within the parish of Overton at present. The closest area subject to a planning application is Land North West of Brooklands Farm, Dudleston, Ellesmere SY12 9JG, which is approximately 3miles south-west of Overton. A company called Dart Energy have applied for a "temporary operation for exploratory borehole and associated infrastructure" there. This would, if granted, result in 102 days of disruption to the local area, with a 27m high drilling rig operating 24hours a day for up to 60 days. That application is currently awaiting appraisal at a Planning Inspectorate Public Inquiry, but the access licence Dart had agreed with the landowner has lapsed, which will make it almost impossible for the drilling company to gain access to the land.

Chris Hesketh gave a short presentation explaining the PEDL system and the different unconventional gas extraction methods available, (shale gas, coal bed methane production and underground coal gasification) and the environmental and health implications of the country permitting widespread unconventional gas extraction. There was also a discussion about the far better alternatives, which are also forecast to be significantly cheaper than unconventional gas from the 2020s. He explained how the drilling application has been fought by the community of Dudleston as a whole, with Frack Free Dudleston working on the paperwork to reject the planning application, and Earth Family putting themselves as a physical barrier (since July 2014) to prevent the drilling company gaining access to the land until the access licence lapsed.

The Earth Family representatives brought a display board illustrating how the campaign has been run, with details of the various planning meetings and paperwork put in by Frack Free Dudleston and also photographs of their encampment, fondly named "Castle Dudleston". They answered questions from the public wanting to know how they survived living in a field without electricity or running water for the last 12 months. Now that the licence has lapsed, the "Protectors" from Earth Family are taking down their homes and returning the land to its original state so that the landowner can once again graze cattle on that part of the field.

Latest News: The drilling company (Igas) have announced they are not going to pursue the application to drill in Dudleston, they've given up! So Frack Free Dudleston have officially won! There is hope for communities under threat from fracking, if everyone pulls together, they can be beaten!
